
SNAG ESCAPES! JAN. 3, 1978 EHRENREICH ISSUES ACT!

THE SNAG'S' LIFE STORY

While the new FWR building (1970) was being constructed, Frank Pitkin, Professor of Forestry, and others were deciding on what kind of object to put in the large space in the west stairway. Ideas included a live tree or a Paul Bunyan statue before they decided on a snag, which would present little problem in terms of upkeep and maintenance.

The snag couldn't be just any ol' snag! It had to be one with a certain diameter and height, and have "character." Two days were spent in the late summer of 1970 searching the St. Joe National Forest for "the snag." Finally, atop Freezeout Ridge east of Clarkia at 6,000 feet they found it! Gray and weatherbeaten, limbs twisted and complete with bright green moss and woodpecker holes, the ancient white bark pine truly had character.

Removal had to be performed with utmost care to avoid damage or destruction. To prevent a crash landing, chains with canvas padding were secured around the base of the snag and about 15 feet up, and attached to the crane of a logging truck. Then the Snag was cut and carefully lifted onto the truck padded with bales of hay. Securely fastened down, the trip to Noscow began.

The building's foundations were just completed when the SNAG arrived. For installation, a hole 10 feet deep was dug where it was to stand. Cement was poured into the hollow SNAG to a height of six feet and steel rods were then inserted for support. A crane then lifted and erected the SNAG in place . . . a symbol of the College of FWR!
