A Survey of Custer County Residents Concerning Community Issues, Facilities and Services: General Summary

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Preface

I would like to thank the people of Custer County, Idaho who generously gave their time to respond to this telephone survey. The survey was funded by the Commissioners of Custer County and conducted by the Social Science Research Unit of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology, University of Idaho under the direction of Prof. John Carlson and Barbara Schnabel. Survey results are available to all interested members of the general public.

Introduction

This report briefly discusses the responses of Custer County residents to a telephone survey conducted during April 1998. The survey gathered initial information from county residents about community services, infrastructure, land use, and general community concerns. The survey was requested by the Custer County commissioners to assist their comprehensive planning efforts during the next year. Public meetings will follow this survey to further examine the opinions of residents and to incorporate those opinions into a formal county planning process.

This report has four sections. First, the sample and survey method is discussed. Second, the survey attitude and opinion data concerning general issues in Custer County are highlighted. Third, the general demographics of the survey sample are presented. Finally, the full text of the survey instrument is provided.

Sample and Survey Method

A statistically random survey sample of 750 Custer County residents was drawn by Survey Sampling, Inc. of Fairfield, CT. These 750 telephone numbers were then contacted with a letter or postcard informing them that an interviewer would be calling in the next few weeks for a survey of their opinions about issues facing the county.

All 750 households were contacted by telephone for the survey. The survey completed 451 interviews. An additional 64 people refused to participate, and 140 people were ineligible for the survey because their telephone was disconnected, they had moved, were deceased, or the number was for a business. Finally, 95 households in the sample could not be reached after five (5) attempts each. The overall response rate is 74% [451 / (750-140)] and the overall cooperation rate is 86% [451 / (451 + 64)].

The geographic breakdown of the completed interviews by zip code is presented in Table 1.

The majority of the respondents come from the Challis area and the fewest are from the Ellis area.

The interviews were conducted by the Social Science Research Unit of the University of Idaho. The telephone survey consisted of series of general questions about community issues, land use, community services and facilities, resource management, housing, transportation, recreation, and educational facilities, all in Custer County. General demographic information was also gathered to build a profile of the respondents. The average interview lasted just over 20 minutes, with the fastest interview taking 9 minutes and longest being 75 minutes.

Attitudes and Opinions: The Survey Data

The intent of this survey is to provide initial information about attitudes and opinions of Custer County residents toward a variety of issues. The issues are related to the county comprehensive planning process as required by Idaho statute. This survey is intended to serve as a first approximation of community opinion, and the planning process that is carried out will include public meetings designed to further expand many of the opinions gathered here. Each of the major areas contained in the survey are presented below. Percentages are used in each table to allow comparison across responses and questions.

General Community Issues

Respondents hold varying degrees of concern for a set of issues facing Custer County communities. Over 50% of the respondents feel that two issues are of serious concern: the availability of good jobs for young people and that important community decisions are being made outside of the county. In addition, maintaining the current economic base, protecting the quality of

local streams and rivers, and maintaining family and individual income levels are serious concerns to 40% or more of the respondents. Developing local businesses with diverse products, maintaining income levels, and the general appearance of the community at least are of moderate concern to 40% or more of the respondents. It is interesting to note that over 40% of the respondents feel that the quality of local drinking water is not a concern.

Land Use in Custer County

A series of questions concerning land use are presented in Table 3. These questions have been used in a series of state and local surveys in Idaho since 1974 and predictably measure the preservation attitude people hold toward land use. These questions address both private and public land. Over 70% of the respondents feel that the agricultural land base should be maintained.

If the "agree somewhat" category is added to this, then almost 90% of the respondents favor maintaining the agricultural land base. This support for agricultural land does not extend to irrigating more of it: 52% of the respondents think we have enough irrigate farmland. Over 60 % of the respondents agree that sufficient wild and scenic rivers, wilderness, and roadless areas have been set aside. Over 75% of the respondents at least agreed, and almost 48% strongly agreed, that the current land use guidelines and controls in Custer County should be maintained.

Community Services and Facilities

Respondents were asked to judge how adequate they thought a general set of community services and facilities are in Custer County. Their responses are presented in Table 4. More than 70% of the respondents feel that the availability of water, local libraries, local airport facilities and the local fairgrounds are currently adequate. Local health care facilities are seen as inadequate by almost 62% of the respondents, and the number of senior care facilities is deemed inadequate by almost 54% of the respondents. Finally, 31% thought more day care facilities are needed in the county.

If a respondent indicated that one of four general local facilities (libraries, airports, fairgrounds, health care) were "less than adequate" they were asked, "What is less than adequate about _____?"

These "open-ended" questions are extensive but yield some general attitudes that are useful.

The hours, the number and quality of books, funding, and physical space for local libraries are the primary reasons for judging these facilities to be inadequate. The airport facilities are criticized for upkeep, small size, high cost, lack of services, and because people have to drive elsewhere for commercial flights. Respondents feel that local fairgrounds are inadequate due to age, poor condition, lack of funding, distance to many areas of the county, inadequate size, or are nonexistent in their communities. One respondent humorously described the roads on the fairgrounds as "18th century" and therefore "subject to the weather."

The adequacy of health care facilities generated over 275 additional comments from respondents. Basically, these facilities are inadequate due to a lack of physician(s), lack of services on nights and weekends, travel to hospitals, lack of elder care, over-reliance on EMT's for medical help, and the lack of 24-hour care. The number and consistency of these responses indicate that this is an obvious concern to people in Custer County.

Resource Management Issues

Respondents were asked a set of attitude questions concerning resource management in Custer County. This set of questions is designed to measure a general attitude to the mix of resource uses respondents agree are compatible. Responses to these questions are presented in Table 5.

With the exception of keeping land in open or green space even if it has a high value for other uses (26% neutral), respondents hold strong attitudes toward resource management. Over 90% of the respondents either agree or strongly agree that recreation is compatible with other uses of natural resources. In fact, taking livestock grazing, wildlife management, mining, and recreation together, respondents agree or strongly agree that these uses of natural resources are compatible. Over 50% disagree or strongly disagree that we need to build more roads to provide greater access to undeveloped areas. Nearly 65% of respondents felt that local people should decide the mix of uses for natural resources.

Housing, Transportation, and Recreation Services and Facilities

How Custer County residents view current and future housing, transportation and recreational needs is extremely important. Survey respondents rated the adequacy of these services and facilities with a short set of questions presented in Tables 6,7, and 8. The availability of low and moderate-income housing is the greatest concern among residents (Table 6), with 37% indicating that it is less than adequate. Respondents go on to say that there is not enough affordable housing and what is there is not always in decent shape. Other comments include a lack of rental housing, limited housing for seniors and the need for zoning.

Overall, people feel that housing in Custer County is adequate. This also holds for roads and bridges.

Table 7 indicates that over 36% of the respondents feel that roads are less than adequate, but only 14% find bridges to be inadequate. Repair, maintenance and safety issues are the dominant comment from respondents listing roads and bridges as less than adequate. Additional transportation issues include

suggestions concerning bus service or public transportation between towns.

Most respondents rate the recreation facilities and services in Custer County to be adequate.

Local recreation sites for visitors, access to outdoor recreation and wildlife-viewing areas are rated as more than adequate by over 25% of the respondents in Table 8. Advertising local historical sites, developing local recreation businesses and local events to attract tourists are ranked as less than adequate by 25% or more of the respondents. The comments by those rating recreation facilities and services as less than adequate were quite varied. These can be placed into two very broad categories: recreation facilities for youth and the inadequacy of local infrastructure such as campgrounds and hotels to capture visitor spending. Additional comments are made about attracting tourists and focus on a lack of advertising and promotion. Access to outdoor recreation draws comments about access to public lands via road closures, and restricted access to rivers via private property. Similar reactions are offered with respect to access to wildlife viewing.

Educational Services and Facilities

Survey ratings for educational facilities and facilities are presented in Table 9. Again, the majority of respondents feel that education is adequate in Custer County. The obvious exception is

educational opportunities for adults. Over 65% of the respondents feel that these opportunities are inadequate most feel these opportunities do not exist. Local ability to pay for schools was also deemed less than adequate by 30% of the sample. Many of the people surveyed no longer had children in school and this raised the percentage answering the questions as "unsure" well above the same answer for previous items.

Those seeing education as inadequate focus their comments on a general lack of adult education opportunities. They also comment on how prepared students are for college and the workplace, the lack of money to fund schools, and the need for access to technology, both for adults and students.

Conclusion

This evaluation of the survey data from Custer County is very brief. However, these answers point to a variety of issues that provide a starting point for a planning process. Some of the issues are generic and common: road maintenance, lack of money for facilities like libraries and schools, and gaps in transportation services. But other issues are vital to life in communities. Most notable is the inadequate rating of health services, housing, and the capture of recreation dollars. The people of Custer County have indicated the issues that are important to them and this information provides the foundation for additional public meetings and the planning process.
