PREPARATIONS FOR DEBATE

State College Chooses Affirmative of Closure Question

Experienced Teams Will Meet Each Other in the Contest with W. S. C.

W. S. C. has chosen the affirmative of the question, "Resolved, that the United States Senate should adopt a closure rule." The debate will be held early in December at Moscow. The Pullman team was chosen last spring and consists of Miss Elizabeth Pryor as leader, and Messers Chapman and Price. This will be the first time in the history of Idaho's debates of a girl leading the team opposed. All of the W. S. C. debaters have had considerable experience in debate, and the contest in December is looked forward to with much interest.

The Idaho team will be selected next Saturday afternoon when Bruce Mudgett, Ludwig Gerlough, R. O. Jones, Fred Lukens, Oliver Price, Bennet Williams, J. D. Matthews, and W. K. Gwin will compete for places. Mudgett has had considerable intersociety and Preparatory debate work. Matthews has been a member of several intercollegiate teams, having been a member of the winning team at Seattle last year. Jones was a member of the team which defeated the Lewiston Normal in his freshman year, and was a member of the trio against Washington last spring. The rest of the contestants have not as yet represented Idaho on the platform but have done a great deal of society work.

Hazing in Oregon, O. A. C.

As a result of a hazing scene on Oct. 4th at the Oregon Agricultural College, in which a student narrowly escaped serious injury with a knife, the student body of that institution has unanimously condemned hazing in all its forms. Their action was taken at an assembly said, by the O. A. C. Executive, to have been attended by over 1,000 students, graduates and members of the faculty. President Kerr delivered an address which aroused a great deal of enthusiasm and at his close the students passed these resolutions:

"Be it resolved, that we, the students of the Oregon Agricultural college, deeply regret the unfortunate occurrence of Friday night, Oct. 4th; and that we place the stamp of our disapproval upon all such actions; and

"Be it further resolved, That we individually and as a body, do all in our power to prevent this practice of hazing in any all forms whatsoever, and that any person or persons guilty of such conduct be considered an enemy of the institution and unworthy to remain in connection with the same."

This emphatic action of the O. A. C. students was brought about largely by the garbled reports of the affair circulated throughout the state by the newspapers. Influential papers in all parts of Oregon gave the affair much prominence. The passage of the resolutions has likewise received widespread attention, such papers as the Portland Oregonian editorially commending the course adopted.

Varsity Easily the Victors

Show Complete Mastery of New Formations and Great Improvement in Team Work.

Heavy Club Team Take Small End of 22 to 0 Score.

The Varsity football team fulfilled all expectations and easily defeated the husky Spokane Athletic Club bunch on the local field Saturday. The game was fast and replete with sensational plays.

Idaho made most of her gains on line bucks and tackle around tackle plays. Her formations were a puzzle to the visitors and they had difficulty in diagnosing the plays. For Idaho Armstrong was the star player and carried the ball a total of 91 yards. Savidge played a star end and was accredited with 54 yards. Most of his yardage was the result of three beautifully executed forward passes with Small starting the play. Small and Thornton also made a pretty gain of 15 yards by a forward pass. Here Smith carried the ball 46 yards in four attempts. He was simply invincible. Johnson's return of punts was spectacular. The team showed great improvement over smaller games. The line held like a stone wall on bucks and the back field got into action with accuracy and lightning like rapidity.

For Spokane Wiley Lasater, the old Whitson star, played a great game at fullback. He was the best defensive player on the team. Varnell at halfback was the chief ground gather and also played a good defense. Tilly, the ex-Idaho half, made the largest gain for Spokane, one of 15 yards around Idaho's left end. Spokane was in poor physical condition and frequently delayed the play by calling for time.

The game:

Lasater kicks 45 yards and Armie returns the ball 15. Small and Savidge negotiate a 20 yard gain by a forward pass. Spokane is penalized 5 yards for offside play. Small makes 10 yards and then Idaho tries a short kick with no gain. Keyes and Thornton make 15 on a forward pass. Small makes 5 but fumbles. Spokane's ball.

Tilley is held for no gain and Spokane fumbles on next play. Idaho's ball.

Small makes 15, Johnson 3, Keyes 5. Idaho fumbles and Spokane gets the ball.

Spokane kicks out of bounds on Idaho's forty yard line. Idaho fumbles a forward pass and is then penalized 5 yards for offside play. Tilley circles Idaho's left end for 15 yards. Lasater fails to gain thru the line. Tilley is thrown for a loss of 2 yards. Spokane kicks 30 yards to Small who returns the ball 8. Savidge and Small make 13 more by forward pass. Armstrong tears off 6 and Johnson 3 1-2. Keyes makes 3 but Idaho fumbles on next play and lose 5. Keyes punts 40 yards and Idaho regains the ball. Johnson

bucks line for 4 yards and Armstrong carries the ball 6 for a touchdown. Time 10 minutes. Small misses goal.

Lasater kicks off, 35 yards to Small, who returns 10. Idaho fails on forward pass and is penalized 15. Keyes kicks 20 to Mulvhill.

Lasater makes 4, Varnell fails to gain and Tilley 3 but fails to make it on first down. Idaho's ball. Keyes kicks 25 and Idaho is penalized 15 for offside. Lasater fails at center and Tilley makes 4. Spokane kicks out of bounds on Idaho's 20 yard line.

Idaho is penalized 15 for an illegal forward pass. Armie gains 10, Keyes 5 and then kicks. Spokane's ball. Malcolmson gains 6. Savidge leaps over the line and "smears" the quarter on next play. Spokane kicks over the line for a touchback. Keyes kicks out 40 yards and Mulvhill is downed in his tracks by Savidge. Spokane kicks to Small who returns kick and Smith who is off side, catches the ball. Spokane punts and Small again returns punt. Spokane punts 30 yards to Johnson who returns the ball 5. Small makes 2 and then Savidge gains 20 by a forward pass. Johnson makes 2. Idaho kicks and regains ball. Small gains 10 and Keyes 2. Time is called with ball in Idaho's possession on Spokane's 35 yard line. Score first half, Idaho, 5, S. A. A. C. 0.

Perkins replaces Pauls at left guard for Idaho. Small kicks 35 to Varnell who makes a beautiful return of 25. Spokane fumbles but regains the ball and Varnell gains four. Idaho blocks punt and Spokane regains the ball. No gain. Mulvhill fails to gain and kicks to Johnson who makes a beautiful return of 25 yards. Small carries the ball 15, Keyes 2, Armie 10, Small 4 and Small fails at drop kick; and Spokane kicks out of bounds. Spokane kicks out again and Keyes returns 15 yards. Armie gains 12 but fumbles and Spokane secures fumble. Spokane punts 30 and Small returns 10. Idaho fumbles in next play but regains ball for 5 yard gain. Small carries 3, Armie 10, Keyes 15, Armie 5, Keyes 1, and Armie 5 for touchdown. Time 12 minutes.

Spokane kicks off 35 yards and Small returns to the center of the field. Small gains 8 and Idaho is penalized 5 yards for holding. Johnson carries the ball 9, Keyes 3 making first down, Armie gains 25, Smith 1, Armie 4, Smith 6 and first down. Spokane is penalized 5. "Herc" carries the ball 8 and goes over for a third touchdown. No goal. Time 5 minutes.

Spokane kicks off 35 yards and Small returns 15. Small gains 20, fumbles and regains ball. "Herc"

SCRUBS PLAY THE VARSITY

Regulars Given a Hard Battle by the Second Team

Varsity Shows Great Improvement in Form, Speed and General Teamwork

The scrubs held the first team down to ten points in a game of fifty minutes duration at the park Saturday, Oct. 12. Both touchdowns made by the Varsity were flukes and there should have been no score.

The scrubs were strengthened by six Varsity substitutes and Stokesberry, the big tackle. Their line was heavier than that of the Regulars and they knew the first team's signals. Nevertheless, they were a formidable bunch and gave the regulars a hard tussle.

The Regulars' first touchdown came in the first half when the scrubs attempted a drop kick from the thirty yard line. The kick was blocked and Thornton, the Regulars' speedy right end, picked it up and sprinted eighty yards for a touch down. It was a clear fluke and the good natured crowd howled in protest. Their sympathies were all with the Scrubs and they supported their favorites by some lively rooting.

The second touchdown was made in exactly the same manner this time Montgomery serving the points.

The Regulars showed great improvement since the Spokane High game. They have improved one hundred per cent in general team work and have made great gains in speed. They had their new plays completely mastered and some of them made a great hit with the crowd. The line-up will be slightly changed, Stokesberry going to his old place at guard, and Mucker playing tackle.

Several new men showed up well on both teams. Hayes at guard for the Regulars showed promise of rapid development. He is new at the game but is heavy and steady and showed his grit by continuing in the game after a gash had been cut in his forehead through a collision with Numbers. For the Scrubs Numbers and Lundstrum gave some pretty exhibitions of tackling. Johnson played a good guard while Cooke made a fine showing at center. He was especially good in getting out of his position and blocking shift plays. The Scrub back field Leonard, Numbers, Appleman and Williams was light but fast and at times pierced the Regulars' line for long gains.

Coach Middleton made his first appearance on the field after an illness of two weeks and was well pleased with the game. The line-up of Saturday's game:

John D. Rockefeller recently announced that he will donate \$600,000 to the University of Chicago Library building fund if \$200,000 is raised by other means. This will make his total gifts to Chicago for the last two years \$6,500,000.

Denver University is rejoicing over the fact that their football team scored against the University of Colorado recently for the first time in fifteen years. The game was a victory for Colorado by 29 to 4.

The University of Oregon will this year have an enrollment of about 400.

Preps Organize Foot Ball Team

The Preparatory students have met and organized a fast foot ball team, containing a majority of last year's

players. Garland Manspeaker has been chosen as manager and Frank Graham will captain the team. The first game of the season will be played next Saturday, when they will go up against the Lewiston State Normal. From all appearances the teams are well matched and a good game is expected.

Manager Manspeaker is carrying on negotiations with the high schools at Lewiston, Clarkston, Garfield and Colfax.

Idaho's Prex Married.

James A. McLean, president of the University of Idaho, was married on the 5th at Moscow. The name of the favorite lady was Miss Mary V. Robinson.

Rooters' Club.

Estel Hunter, who was elected president of this year's rooters association, has developed a new scheme for this season. By his plan there are to be three branches of rooters, two for the men and one for the ladies. Each club will have forty or fifty members who will congregate in a compact body at each game and give out Idaho enthusiasm by the barrel full. Heretofore the yelling has been too ragged to be very effective because there was no definite organization of any kind. Robert Claye and P. S. Savidge have been chosen leaders of the clubs. These bodies of enthusiasts will meet at stated intervals and practice. They will have a prominent place at the games and will have officers and everything found in an up-to-date organization.

Where is the Leak?

Recent information from the office of Dean Eldridge shows that the total registration for the present University year several days ago passed the 400 mark. This is a very gratifying increase over the enrollment of the year 1906-1907. The percentage of increase is also greater than it has been for some years past. President MacLean, in his address at the first assembly, predicted an increase of 12 per cent. over the enrollment of last year, but the percentage of increase is already far ahead of that. A most interesting incidental fact is that, while the Dean's office reports a registration of over 400, the last receipt for Students' Association Fee issued by Registrar Jenkins was No. 392. This shows that ten or a dozen students have registered without paying the \$2.00 fee which the Regents require of all who enter the University, and which goes to the treasury of the A. S. U. I. Last year a few students escaped the payment of the fee, but more are working the scheme this fall. It is probable that measures will be taken by the authorities to detect those who have eluded Bursar Jenkins and to compel payment of the \$2.00.

Freshmen Receive Challenge

On Tuesday of this week the president of the Freshman class received a letter from the president of the Freshman class at W. S. C. asking for an interclass football game. He mentioned that it had been customary to have interclass base ball games and track meets between the two institutions and wished to know the attitude here concerning such a movement in the way of football. GAVE GOOD ADVICE

Rev. J. M. Hupp Delivers Address at Assembly

"The best way to insure a strong finish in the race of life is to get a good start," was the theme of an address delivered by the Rev. J. M. Hupp of the Moscow Baptist Church at assembly last Wednesday. The speaker amplified this thought by a number of injunctions relating to conduct, among the most interesting of which was that no student should ever smoke cigarettes, and that he is foolish who indulges in a cigar. "If you smoke at all," said the speaker, "smoke a pipe; but even that is not necessary." Mr. Hupp touched on other temptations of student life, and then turned his attention to the studies taken. Be wary in your study of the sciences, was the gist of his advice on this point. He declared that unguarded scientific study is likely to lead to skepticism, and stated it as his belief that any teacher is unworthy of his office who will permit a student's scientific studies to plant the seed of doubt in his mind.

The assembly was opened by a pleasing vocal solo by Miss Anna Kiefer. This was followed by Rev. Hupp's address, after which the meeting was turned over to President Young of the A. S. U. I. who gave a short talk on the need of more spirit in college activities. "Two years ago," he said, "we held the championship in football, while we had no better material in the team than we have now, the only difference being in college

spirit." T. E. Hunter then emphasized what Young had said and added that, "in order to do good rooting we must practice just as the football team must practice." He then proceeded to form a "rooter's club" which consisted of two divisions of about forty members each, with "Cap" Claye and Paul Savidge as leaders.

PLAN JUNIOR PROM.

Class of 1909 Already Preparing for Their Big Dance.

A Junior Prom Committee consisting of Howard David, Edna Dewey, Robert StClair, Mabel Wilkinson and Jewett D. Matthews, was appointed last week. WANT TO REFORM ATHLETICS

Washington Proposes "One Year" Rule and Conference

Proposition to Eliminate Freshmen From Athletics Not Favored at Idaho

President James A. McLean is in receipt of a letter from George Spirk of the staff of the "Pacific Wave," University of Washington, asking his opinion on the adoption of an agreement between Idaho, Washington and Oregon, eliminating freshmen from all athletic teams, and on the establishment of an annual conference between the three universities for arranging schedules for football, track, debate, etc. President McLean, when asked last Saturday as to his opinion of proposed innovations, stated that he favors a yearly conference for the adjustment of intercollegiate schedules for athletics and debate contests, but is opposed to the adoption of the "one year" rule, debarring freshmen from participation in intercollegiate contests. The rule, he believes, is not adapted to conditions as they exist at Idaho. The primary object of it is to prevent the entrance into college teams of any athletics of the "ringer" type. Unless the athletic teams concerned in the operation of the rule are partly composed of men who receive pay for their services, directly or indirectly, or who are not bona fide students of their respective universities, no such rule is necessary. There has been an evil in the past, consisting of the playing of "ringsters," whose inability to do real college work kept them in the freshman or sub-freshman classes, and who lost interest in their institutions as soon as the season was over. But, at present, and for several years past, said Dr. McLean, Idaho's teams, at least, have been free from any such players. There is, therefore, no necessity, so far as the University of Idaho is concerned, for the adoption of any rule designed to prevent ringsters from intruding into college athletics.

It is understood that Coach Middleton agrees with the president in opposing the "one year" rule.

No communication from Washington has been received by the Athletic Board, so that body has taken no action in the matter. The president of the Board, in discussing the matter, said that he favored the plan of a conference for arrangement of schedule, judging, however, from his statements on the rule debarring freshmen from athletics, it is not likely that this feature of the proposed change will meet a very cordial reception on the Athletic Board.

The matter brought to the attention of Pres. McLean is being considered very thoroughly at the University of Washington. The following is an extract from the "Pacific Wave" the

Washington student paper, of Oct. 15.

"This plan has had the approval of many of the faculty and of almost all the captains of the various athletic teams of the University. Besides this there has been much favorable expression in this regard from the students generally. To allay whatever feeling there might be that the question was a local one, the opinion of President Campbell of the University of Oregon, expressed in a communication to the wave, was published. This letter also gave evidence of the fact that the question has been before the faculty and students of that University for several years, and indicated that no step had been taken there for its adoption for the reason that it was thought best to first ascertain what action, if any, would be taken by the other Northwestern universities.

"The fact that the attitude of the Wave is that of the majority of the Student body and that they are desirous of bringing the three Universities into closer touch for the betterment of athletic relations and conditions, was very clearly shown by the resolutions adopted at the nominating convention of the Associated students held last Thursday noon. The resolutions are as follows:

"Whereas, There is no union of interest between the Universities of the Northwest in matters pertaining to the eligibility of Varsity contestants, to the arrangement of schedules in athletics and other intercollegiate affairs such as debates and oratorical contests, and,

Whereas, Matters of this kind could be satisfactorily arranged and decided by student representatives meeting in an annual joint conference at some central point, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Associated students of the University of Washington here assembled, do petition our Board of Control to take steps at once to bring about such a conference of the Universities of Idaho, Oregon and Washington for the purpose of discussion and taking action upon matters of intercollegiate interest, and, be it further

Resolved, That we recommend to the Board of Control that the first conference be called at the time of the regular triannual track meet between the Universities in question which is to be held here in the coming spring."

Proposition to Give Addresses

At the next annual meeting of the National Association of State Universities which is to be held in Washington, D. C., November 18, 19, and 20 of this year, President McLean is to give two addresses. One will be on the subject of "The Length of the College Course," and the other will be a brief paper on "A Form of Building Contract." Dr. McLean's experience gained during recent and present building operations at Idaho is likely to make the latter paper particularly valuable.

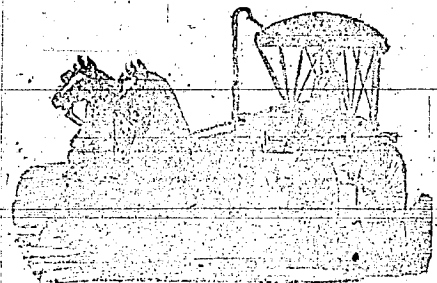
