The play, one of the most brilliant of the comedies of George Bernard Shaw, is marked by scintillating wit, keen characterization, and more dramatic action than most Shaw plays. The satire, which is refreshing rather than bitter, is directed against militarism. Shaw holds that the donning of a soldier's uniform does not immediately change the character of the wearer, that soldiers are rather human beings who do not like to get killed if they can help it, that the real soldier does not care much for heroics. The play is the basis for the popular musical comedy, "The Chocolate Soldier."

### Y. W. C. A. Girls to Give a "Circus."

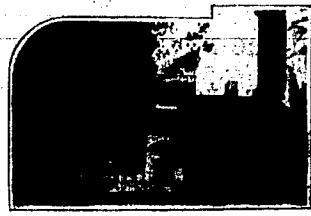

## IDAHO WINS 5-0 VICTORY OVER WHITMAN COLLEGE

### Classy Game Despite Its Being Played In Snow --- Punting A Strong Feature---A Few Notes.



IDAHO scored her first intercollegiate victory this season when

on a snow covered field, she managed to push over a touchdown in the first quarter, after twelve minutes of play. Although the weather was miserable for a football game, there being about six inches of snow on the ground, and the temperature was about 20 degrees above zero, the game itself was fast. There were about one hundred and twenty-five spectators at the game.

Burns started the game by kicking off to Niles, who returned the ball to Whitman's twenty-five yard line. At this point Whitman pulled off their most sensational gain, a run of twenty-five yards on a fake punt, by Niles. Things looked bluer for Idaho at this point than any other time during the game. By several line bucks and quarter back runs, Idaho pushed the ball up to Whitman's thirty yard line, where E. Perkins got away for a thirty yard run through a broken field. Hillman kicked out to Perkins on the fifteen yard line, directly in front of the goal posts, but owing to an accident in letting the ball touch the ground before Hillman was ready to kick, the goal was missed. Burns kicked off again to Niles, who returned the ball to Whitman's thirty-five yard line.

The second quarter started off in a kicking duel between Phillips and Niles. Whitman tried a whole side shift, the whole team with the exception of the center and Niles running out to the left side, but Burns hit Niles behind the line and caused him to fumble, Knutson recovering the ball. Idaho tried a place kick. The ball was blocked by the Whitman team but Harris managed to fall on it. The first half ended with the ball on Whitman's thirty-five yard line.

During the time between halves the spectators tried to keep warm by running around the field single file.

The second half started by Burns kicking off to Niles, who returned the ball to the twenty-five yard line. Hillman punted to McDonald, the little quarter back, who nearly got away for a touchdown had not Buffington tackled him in one of the prettiest plays of the whole game. Whitman tried an on-side kick but Perkins got the ball on Idaho's ten yard line and Phillips punted back forty yards, putting the Idaho goal out of danger. Whitman made another punt to Perkins on Idaho's twenty-five yard line, and Phillips again punted, the ball being received by Niles, who, when he started to run, slipped and slid on his back about five yards. Niles and Hillman exchanged punts. Whitman could not make their yardage and was again forced to punt. The quarter ended with Whitman in possession of the ball on Idaho's fifty-five yard line.

The last quarter, like the third, developed into more or less of a punting game. Idaho got the ball close to Whitman's goal but lots the ball on downs. Niles was hurt during this quarter in the last four minutes of play and had to be carried from the field. It was learned that he had broken open a blood fester on one of his hips. The game ended with the ball on Whitman's thirty yard line.

The mid-semester warnings, now known as "merry-go" are out visiting at the Theta Mu Epsilon house.

Since last Thursday afternoon many students are wondering concerning the purpose for which the new gymnasium, commonly known as Lewis Hall, was erected. On that date the ground was covered with about six inches of snow, and Lewis Hall was badly needed for football practice as the Whitman game was only two days off. The military authorities were requested to permit the team to use the hall for practice. The request was refused point blank and the team was forced to hold a very unsatisfactory and almost valueless practice in the snow and sleet on the campus.

Of course military drill should always take precedence over mere football practice since football is a matter of so little importance and drill so valuable and necessary a part of a college education. But, nevertheless, it is difficult to see just where the military department acquired its authority over Lewis Hall. At the time that funds were being gathered for the construction the contractors received the impression that the building would be used primarily as an adjunct to the athletic facilities of the University. Certainly none of them supposed that the new building was intended primarily for use as a drill hall. Nevertheless the impression seems so prevalent in our local military circles that the students of the University are so enamored of things military that they were willing to contribute to the erection of a building for the use of the military department. If not how can the incident which occurred last Thursday afternoon be explained?

# NEW A. S. U. I. BY-LAWS

Some Slight Changes Will Probably Be Made—Keep This For Reference.

## ARTICLE I.

Section 1. Seventy-five members of this Association shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. The order of business in meetings of this Association shall be as follows:

- (1) Call to order.
- (2) Reading of minutes of previous meeting.
- (3) Reports of standing committees.
- (4) Reports of special committees.
- (5) Unfinished business.
- (6) New business.
- (7) Adjournment.

Section 3. Robert's "Rules of Order" shall govern this Association in all cases where they are applicable and in which they are not in conflict with the Constitution and By-laws of this Association.

## ARTICLE II.

### Awards of Honorary Insignia.

Section 1. The University athletic insignia shall be a white "I" nine inches in height, two inches in width, with the blocks four inches in length by two inches in width. It shall be awarded by the Athletic Board as follows.

(1) To any member of the Association who shall have played in the first line-up of two intercollegiate football games in one season.

(2) To any member of the Association who shall have played in three intercollegiate baseball games in one season.

(3) To any member of the Association who shall have pitched one entire game, or fifteen innings in one or more games, in any one season.

(4) To any member of the Association who shall have won five points in a dual intercollegiate track meet, or who shall have won three points in a triangular intercollegiate track meet, or who shall have won one point in a conference meet, or who shall have won ten points in a season.

(5) To any member of the Association who shall have played in four intercollegiate basket ball games, in three of which he shall have been in the first line-up.

Section 2. A five-pointed red star of such dimensions that it may be inscribed within a circle one inch in diameter shall be awarded to members of the Association who shall have won the university athletic insignia in two branches of athletics, two stars if in three, three stars if in four.

Section 3. A five-pointed red star of such dimensions that it may be inscribed within a circle one and one-half inches in diameter shall be awarded to the captains of first teams.

Section 4. Stars shall be worn on the upright of the "I."

Section 5. The second team insignia shall be a white block "I" seven inches in height, one and one-half inches in width, with blocks three inches in length by one and one-half inches in width, with an "A" three inches in height on each side. It shall be awarded as follows:

(1) To any member of this Association who shall have won one point in an intercollegiate track meet.

(2) Who has played in one intercollegiate baseball game.

(3) Who has played on a second team. The Athletic Board shall decide who are second team men.

Section 6. The University debate insignia shall be a gold "I" five-eighths of an inch in height, three-sixteenths of an inch in width, with blocks three-sixteenths of an inch in width by three-eighths of an inch in length, and having the word "Debate" inscribed vertically upon the upright section of the "I." The debate "I" shall be awarded by the Debate Council to all members of this Association who shall have represented the University in any intercollegiate debating contest.

## ARTICLE III.

### Management Of Funds.

Section 1. The dues of individual members of this Association shall be three dollars for each semester, payable at the time of registration.

Section 2. Special assessment may be levied against all members by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting which has been duly called and at which a quorum is present.

Section 3. For a period of six years dating from the first semester of the college year 1938-1909, a fee of one dollar shall be paid at the time of registration in each semester by each individual member of this Association. The money accruing from this fee shall be used for the payment of principal and interest of a debt incurred by the purchase of an athletic field.

Section 4. The fee of three dollars per semester shall be applied in the following proportions among the several student activities:

(1) Athletics—including football, baseball, track, basketball and tennis—fifty-five percent.

(2) Debate—eighteen percent.

(3) Argonaut—twenty percent.

(4) The remaining seven percent turned into the Miscellaneous Fund.

Section 5. At the end of each collegiate year all money remaining in the treasury shall be turned into the Miscellaneous Fund.

Section 6. All revenues derived from the gate receipts of athletic contests conducted under the auspices of this Association and all other revenues accruing from activities conducted by

the Athletic Board shall be placed in the Athletic Fund.

Section 7. All rentals accruing from the Athletic Field shall be applied to the payment of the debt on the Athletic Field.

Section 8. All moneys accruing from activities conducted under the auspices of the Debate Council shall be placed in the Debate Fund.

Section 9. All funds accruing to the management of the Argonaut from any source whatsoever shall be placed in the Argonaut fund.

Section 10. All funds accruing to this Association and not included in the preceding sections 6 to 9, inclusive, shall be placed in the Miscellaneous Fund.

Section 11. All funds shall be deposited in a bank designated by the Executive Board as hereinbefore provided. Each fund shall be deposited as a separate account.

Section 12. All expenditures from the Athletic Fund shall first be recommended by the Athletic Board or by the Graduate Manager.

Section 13. All expenditures from the Debate Fund shall be first recommended by the Debate Council.

Section 14. All expenditures from the Argonaut Fund shall be first recommended by the Business Manager of the Argonaut.

Section 15. After a recommendation for the expenditure of money from any of the above mentioned funds has been duly made upon such regulation blank forms as the Executive Board shall prescribe for that purpose, the Executive Board shall at their next regular meeting consider the recommendation and if it is approved by a majority of the board, the expenditure shall be made in the following manner.

(1) The Treasurer shall make out a check upon the fund from which the appropriation is made for the amount appropriated.

(2) The following features shall be essential to the validity of all checks drawn upon A. S. U. I. funds:

(a) Signature of the A. S. U. I. Treasurer.

(b) Signature of Faculty Representative on the Executive Board.

(c) Signature of the representative on the Executive Board or the department from whose fund the appropriation is made—except, that in case of appropriations from the Athletic Fund the signature of the Graduate Manager shall be required instead of that of the representative of the Athletic Board; and further that in case of appropriations from the Miscellaneous Fund the signature of the President of the A. S. U. I. shall be necessary.

(d) Reference to the recommendation for expenditure hereinbefore mentioned in Section 15 of this article. The reference shall be made to the number of the voucher.

(e) Clear indication of the fund upon which each check is drawn.

(3) The Treasurer shall tender the check so made in payment of the bill for which the appropriation was made.

Section 16. The Treasurer shall keep an accurate and complete account of the receipts and expenditures and

assets and liabilities of each separate fund of the A. S. U. I. He shall also number consecutively the vouchers drawn against each fund and shall file the same as a part of the records of his office. All the aforesaid accounts and vouchers shall be, at all times, open to the inspection of any member of the A. S. U. I. in the office of the Executive Board. The Treasurer shall give bonds in the sum of not less than three thousand dollars. The cost of said bonds shall be paid from the Miscellaneous Fund.

Section 17. Each department shall submit to the Treasurer on or before the tenth day of each month, a report in the form prescribed by the Executive Board, of the outstanding liabilities of that department up to and including the last day of the preceding month, except that the report of the Athletic Board shall be made by the Graduate Manager. Failure to make such report within the time specified shall be cause for the forfeiture by the delinquent department of five per cent. of its share of the A. S. U. I. fees for the semester in which the default occurred.

Section 18. On or before the fifteenth of each month the Treasurer shall submit to the Editor of the Argonaut a complete itemized statement of the assets and liabilities of each A. S. U. I. fund and an itemized statement of the receipts and expenditures of each up to and including the last day of the preceding month for publication.

Section 19. The Editor, Business Manager, and Assistant Business Manager of the Argonaut shall be compensated for their work at the following rates:

(1) The Editor shall be paid two dollars per regular issue.

(2) The Business Manager shall be paid two dollars per regular issue, and in addition shall receive fifty percent of the net cash profits of the paper.

(3) The Assistant Business Manager shall be paid at the rate of twenty-five cents per hour for all the time which he spends in managerial work in connection with the Argonaut.

#### ARTICLE IV. Amendments.

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended in the same manner as the Constitution.

#### ARTICLE V.

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect on the first day of the second semester of the collegiate year 1911-1912.

There has also been some talk of a Law School Agricultural School game. These two departments should put out good teams, and they should be pretty evenly matched.

It is certainly a part of a college professor's work to mix with the students and to attend student activities. Especially is this true in a small college where there is an opportunity of becoming acquainted with every student in the school. How can a Professor have the best interests of the college, which means the best interests of the students, at heart unless he shows some interest in student activities, which are more than half of the students' college life.—Continued.
