## EDMUNDSON TO OLYMPIC GAMES

Idaho Boy May Enter World Competition at Stockholm Next Summer.

The Seattle Times pay Clarence Edmundson of this city a high compliment as a gentleman and an athlete. Mr. Edmundson is a son of Mrs. Emma Edmundson of this city and a brother of deputy state horticultural inspector, Clifford Edmundson. The Times article says:

Clarence Edmundson, the greatest half mile runner ever produced in the Northwest, is now a teacher in the Broadway High School and is coaching the basketball team of that school. He recently married and is now a full fledged citizen of Seattle. Edmundson is the man who ran Gissing of the New York Athletic Club literally into the ground here in 1909. Before the race the writer asked James E. Sullivan of the A. A. U. if Gissing was the best man in the East, for if Edmundson won, we did not want the usual excuses made. Sullivan replied that in his opinion Gissing was fully as good as Sheppard and if Edmundson beat him he was entitled to full credit. Edmundson beat Gissing so far that day that the New York man looked to be outclassed. Gissing ran himself out and fell fainting at the tape and had to be carried off the track.

Last July in Pittsburg Edmundson met the great Sheppard, and had him beaten when within reaching distance of the tape. Edmundson looked back over his shoulder, his foot slipped in some loose earth and he fell on his head, Sheppard passing him and winning

## FOOTBALL SEASON ADDS \$618.98 TO ATHLETIC FUNDS

### Graduate Manager Larson Submits Report of Finances in Connection With the Past Football Season.

Moscow, Idaho, January 13, 1912.

To the Faculty Athletic Committee and to the Athletic Board of the University of Idaho:

Gentlemen:

As graduate manager I hand you herewith my report on football, and also a general statement of finances up to January 1st, 1912.

The report consists of a total list of receipts and an itemized list of expenditures, each expenditure having a number that refers to a voucher that is attached hereto and made part of this report. There is also, where it was possible to get one, an itemized account of the articles for which the voucher was spent. These itemized accounts are also attached and made part of this report.

From a study of the report it will be seen that the season was a success financially in a small way, ending with a surplus of \$453.18. All games except those with Gonzaga and Whitman paid for themselves. The manager went behind \$46.55 on the Gonzaga game and \$311.10 on the Whitman game. The extreme weather conditions probably caused the poor attendance at the latter game.

Besides the receipts listed in this report the graduate manager expects to receive \$165.00 from the University of Oregon to cover the loss due to the cancellation of that game.

## PACIFIC INTER-COLLEGIATE MEET

Plan to Enter All Pacific Coast Teams at Berkley, May 6th.

Graduate Manager Larson is in receipt of the following letter from Mr. Milton F. Farber, Graduate Manager of the University of California, regarding a Pacific Coast Intercollegiate meet to be held at Berkley on May 6th.

Berkley, California,  
January 25, 1912.

Graduate Manager,  
University of Idaho,  
Moscow, Idaho.

Dear Sir:

The suggestion has been made that the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate meet, for the past two years held at the University of California, would result in greater stimulus to track athletics on the coast were the invitation to compete extended to a larger number of track teams. To do so on the same basis as the meet of the past two years would so increase the costs of the meet that remoter colleges would find it impossible for them to enter teams. I take this opportunity of presenting to your consideration a proposal intended to meet the difficulties of the situation so that better competition, without seriously affecting the financial arrangements, may be attained.

(1). Invitations to enter track teams shall be sent to each of the following colleges or universities: The State Universities of Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Nevada and California, Stanford University, Oregon Agricultural College, Pomona College, University of Southern California and Washington State College.

(2). The net receipts of the contest shall be apportioned among

**AT ASSEMBLY.**

The last Assembly was devoted to the reading and adoption of the By-laws to the new A. S. U. I. Constitution. The laws were discussed and adopted by a mere handful of students, not over thirty-five or forty being present. Very few sections as drawn by the Executive Committee, were amended. The section relating to the honorary insignia, was amended to include the presentation of a sweater to every athlete making his first "I." Hereafter a sweater will be awarded with the first letter whether it be made in football or some other branch of athletics.

Another section pertaining to the "Miscellaneous Fund" might be of interest to those who did not attend Assembly. Hereafter all surplus money will be retained in its own fund at the end of each semester instead of being turned into the Miscellaneous Fund as heretofore. One exception, that of the surplus money in the Argonaut fund, was made to this provision. In the case of the Argonaut fund, the surplus cash will be turned

in at the end of each semester as usual. If otherwise, the business-manager would receive an undue amount for his services, subtracting half from the profits of the paper each semester.

The section pertaining to the expenditure of the athletic fund was amended to the effect that no appropriations will be made for tennis except for inter-collegiate tournaments. It is probable that there will never be an occasion for a tennis appropriation, unless the spirit of the students in regard to athletics makes a remarkable change for the better.

Speaking of spirit! What is the matter with the attendance at these Student Assemblies? Such a spirit of indifference in such matters as the adoption of A. S. U. I. Constitutions is certainly nothing to be proud of. Can it be that no more than a double score of students in the whole institution have the interests of the student body enough at heart to desire a voice in the adoption of a new Constitution which is so pertinent to their government as members of the A. S. U. I.? Every student in the University should

take enough pride in his membership in the A. S. U. I. not only to desire, but to demand a voice in its management. Students who had no suggestions to offer could at least have come out and voted "Yes" with the crowd and gone away with some knowledge of the future management of the A. S. U. I.

The School of Practical Agriculture has a class in Robert's Rules of Order.

The publicity office in charge of Mr. Toll is doing effective advertising for the University. Long articles, plentifully illustrated, of the Department of Physical education, Writing and Military Department have been sent out to the various papers of the area at Lewiston, Coeur d'Alene, Weiser and Boise. Mr. Toll is now preparing a long write-up of the military traditions for the Idaho Daily Statesman which will soon be published.

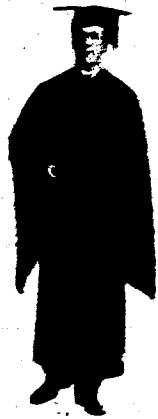
