The women of the sewing and designing class of the Home Ec. department under the direction of Miss Bigelow, will stage the first alluniversity style show in the auditorium Friday evening. An admission of ten cents will be charged to cover the cost of putting on the show?

The show itself will be divided into two groups. The first part of the program will consist of a talk on the laws of good dressing, and the points made in the talk will be illustrated with living models.

The second part of the program will be the actual style show itself. In this number a large display of college clothes will be shown, all exhibited on living models. The numbers shown will consist of sport clothes, suits, coats and wraps; afternoon dresses, evening gowns and summer styles. The Fashion Shop is cooperating with the department and many garments made by the department will also be shown.

A runway is to be constructed from the stage into the auditorium which will give everyone an excellent opportunity to study the models closely. The chief purpose to be accomplished by the show is to dissinminate information about correct clothes for college girls, and incidentally to entertain the audience with an unusually good program.


