FASHION DEPARTMENT TO HOLD STYLE SHOW

HOME EC. DEPARTMENT WILL STAGE EXHIBIT OF LATEST COLLEGE STYLES FRIDAY.

The women of the sewing and designing class of the Home Ec. department under the direction of Miss Bigelow, will stage the first all-university style show in the auditorium Friday evening. An admission of ten cents will be charged to cover the cost of putting on the show?

The show itself will be divided into two groups. The first part of the program will consist of a talk on the laws of good dressing, and the points made in the talk will be illustrated with living models.

The second part of the program will be the actual style show itself. In this number a large display of college clothes will be shown, all exhibited on living models. The numbers shown will consist of sport clothes, suits, coats and wraps; afternoon dresses, evening gowns and summer styles. The Fashion Shop is cooperating with the department and many garments made by the department will also be shown.

A runway is to be constructed from the stage into the auditorium which will give everyone an excellent opportunity to study the models closely. Recodified Constitution To Be Submitted For Adoption At Student Assembly Wednesday

The recodified constitution of the Associated Students of the University of Idaho will be read before a student assembly Wednesday. The constitution as recodified is the work of a large committee appointed from representative groups and from all the representatives of the major activities of the campus. This committee has been at work on the constitution for many weeks. Several meetings have been held in which the entire committee were present to thrash out all the conflicting ideas.

The constitution as it now stands, is a highly constructive piece of school legislation. The results of many years' experience at the University in student affairs, and the best of the student constitutions of other schools of the West have been combined in the present document. It provides for a student government which is truly "student government," yet maintains the highly elastic and workable system of the former document.

The revised document follows in full:

A. S. U. I. Constitution Recodified 1921

Preamble
We, the students of the University of Idaho, in order to provide an organization for the regulation of all matters of general student concern, do ordain and establish the following constitution and by-laws:

ARTICLE I. Name and Membership

Section 1. The name of the organization existing under this constitution shall be, "The Associated Students of the University of Idaho."

Section 2. All registered students in any department of the University of Idaho shall be eligible to membership.

Section 3. Members of the A. S. U. I. shall be entitled to one subscription to the University Argonaut and admission to all events given under the auspices of the departments of the A. S. U. I. and one vote in all meetings of the association at which they are present and one vote at all elections.

ARTICLE II. Meetings

Section 1. The regular meetings of this association shall be held upon call of the president, notice of which shall be posted two days before the time of meetings.

Section 2. The president shall call a meeting upon the request of two members of the executive board, or upon the receipt of petition signed by twenty-five members of the A. S. U. I.

ARTICLE III. Officers

Section 1. The general officers of this association shall be: President, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. The president and vice-president shall be chosen from the membership of the incoming senior class. The secretary and treasurer shall be chosen from the membership of the incoming junior and senior classes.

Section 2. The departmental officers of this association shall be the members of the board of supervisors, except the faculty member thereof, the editor of the University Argonaut and the yell king.

Section 3. The general officers shall constitute the executive board.

Section 4. The board of supervisors shall consist of a secretary elected by the student body, all managers, viz: Athletic, Argonaut, debate, glee club, and any other that may be elected from time to time, and a member of the University faculty recommended by the executive board and appointed by the president of the University.

ARTICLE IV. Duties of Officers

Section 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of this association and of the executive board. He shall call all meetings of this association as heretofore provided in Article II. He shall act as manager of the miscellaneous fund but shall not be a member of the board of supervisors. He shall be responsible for the proper execution of the work of all departments provided by this constitution. He shall appoint all committees. He shall have all powers and duties necessarily incident to the office of president.

Section 2. The vice-president shall perform all duties of the president in his absence or disability.

Section 3. The secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the association and of the executive board, and at the close of the collegiate year shall file the above mentioned records with the bursar of the University together with all official documents, contracts and records of the office. He shall notify each member of the executive board of the time of meeting of said board. He shall keep a list of all members of the association and of the officers.

Section 4. The treasurer shall receive, expend and keep a record of all monies of this association as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE V. Elections

Section 1. There shall be a primary election and a general election.

Section 2. Candidates for office with the exception of departmental managers may be placed on the ballot for the primary election by nominating speeches at a meeting of the A. S. U. I. held not less than one week nor more than two weeks prior to the date of election. Other nominations may be made at any time within twenty-four hours previous to the opening of the polls of the primary election, provided that a petition bearing the signatures of at least twenty-five members of the A. S. U. I. endorsing the candidate, be presented to the president, provided however, that departmental managers with the exception of the graduate manager of athletics, shall be nominated by the executive board, at least one week before election, and said board shall nominate not less than three candidates for each office.

Section 3. The primary election shall be held on the third Thursday in April.

Section 4. The general election shall be held on the first Thursday in May.

Section 5. The two candidates for each office receiving the first and second highest number of votes respectively in the primary election shall be the candidates for that particular office on the ballot for the general election.

Section 6. The Australian ballot shall be used in both the primary and the general elections.

Section 7. All elections shall be conducted by the executive board in accordance with the following rules:
1. The polls shall be open from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m. the day of the election.
2. There shall be at all times at the polls, one inspector, one ballot distributor, and one clerk.
3. The ballot distributor shall give but one ballot to each voter.
4. The clerk shall keep an official poll book which must be certified to by the secretary of the A. S. U. I.
5. No one shall be allowed to vote unless the secretary's books show that he is a member of this association.

6. The ballots shall be counted under the direction of the executive board immediately after the closing of the polls, and the results of the election shall be posted as soon as the count is completed.

7. There shall be no electioneering within fifty feet of the polls.

8. No proxies shall be voted at any A. S. U. I. election.

9. The candidate receiving the majority of the votes cast shall be the officer elect for that particular office.

10. In case of disputed qualifications, or irregularities in marking ballots the executive board shall be the sole arbiter.

11. In case of a tie vote there shall be a new election for the particular office or offices within one week.

Section 8. The associate editor of the Argonaut shall be elected in January and May of each collegiate year and shall hold office for one semester as associate editor and the following semester as editor.

Section 9. All officers elected under this article, shall, unless otherwise herein provided in this constitution or by-laws, take upon themselves the duties of their respective office on the first Monday in June. They shall be installed in a meeting

called for that purpose on the date aforesaid and shall take an oath of office before the president of this association, to support the constitution and by-laws of this association.

ARTICLE VI. The Executive Board

Section 1. The executive board shall consist of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer of the A. S. U. I.

Section 2. A meeting of the executive board shall be called by the president on the first and third Wednesday of each month.

Section 3. Recall, the executive board may be dissolved as provided by this constitution.

Section 4. The executive board shall require the board of supervisors to submit a report at the end of each month for all expenditures authorized.

Section 5. The executive board shall require each manager to submit a tentative budget of the probable expenditures for his department at the beginning of each semester provided, however, that the graduate manager of the athletics submit same at the beginning of each athletic season. It is further provided that until this tentative budget has been submitted and approved the treasurer shall have no authority to issue a check against that particular fund falling to be budgeted.

Section 6. Final authority for expenditures of A. S. U. I. funds shall rest with the executive board, that is, any unwarranted expenditure authorized by the board of supervisors may be vetoed by the executive board, provided that immediately after such veto has been made, the question shall be brought before the student body and their majority vote shall be final.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the executive board to prescribe and require the various departments to adopt uniform forms for vouchers, budgets and managers' reports.

ARTICLE VII. The Board of Supervisors

Section 1. The board of supervisors shall consist of a secretary elected by the student body, all the managers, viz: athletic, Argonaut, debate, glee club, and any other that may be appointed from time to time, and a member of the University faculty recommended by the executive board and appointed by the president of the University.

Section 2. The secretary of the board of supervisors shall file a copy of all requisitions authorized by the board, and shall make a report to the executive board at the end of each month of all expenditure authorized.

Section 3. All expenditures except those made from the miscellaneous fund shall be authorized by the board of supervisors and all authorized requisitions shall be signed by the chairman of the board.

Section 4. The faculty member shall be chairman of the board of supervisors.

ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. All managers with the exception of the graduate manager of athletics, shall be elected in the usual manner, provided, however, that all nominations shall be made by the executive board, as provided for in Article V.

Section 2. (1) The athletic manager shall be required to furnish a bond of \$5,000.
(2) The Argonaut manager shall be required to furnish a bond of \$500.
(3) The debate manager shall be required to furnish a bond of \$500.
(4) The glee club manager shall be required to furnish a bond of \$2,000.

Section 3. All salaries, with the exception of the graduate manager of athletics, shall be paid out of the respective department funds.
All bonding fees shall be paid out of the respective department funds.

Section 4. Standard requisition forms showing the amount and purpose for which expenditures are to be made shall be filled out in triplicate by each manager, when funds are desired, who shall present same to the chairman of the board of supervisors for approval. When approved a copy shall be left with the secretary of the board of supervisors, a copy retained by the manager and a copy submitted with the manager's signature to the treasurer who shall draw a voucher

against said account.
Section 5. Each manager shall turn all money collected from whatsoever source, as gate receipts, admissions, etc., over to the treasurer who shall credit the manager's department with the amount.

Section 6. In case the treasurer shall call for a report from any manager, and this said report is not turned in to the treasurer within three days thereafter, the treasurer shall refuse to issue any further checks for that department until the said report has been received. In case of such failure to turn in a report the treasurer shall notify the executive board of such delinquency at the expiration of the said three days.

ARTICLE IX. Treasurer

Section 1. The treasurer shall be elected as per the A. S. U. I. constitution provided, however, that no candidate shall be considered who has not had at least one year of accounting or the equivalent in practical experience.

Section 2. The treasurer shall be placed under a bond of \$5,000.

Section 3. The treasurer's salary shall be one hundred dollars (\$100) per year, payable at the rate of fifty dollars (\$50) per semester.

Section 4. A standard requisition duly authorized and signed by the chairman of the board of supervisors and by the manager involved shall constitute authority for the treasurer to issue a voucher for the amount authorized by the requisition, provided, however, that in the case of an expenditure from the miscellaneous fund the requisition shall be signed by the president of the A. S. U. I., and further provided that if in the opinion of the treasurer any expenditure is not in accord with the tentative budget submitted by the manager to the executive board, the treasurer shall call the matter to the attention of the executive board within twenty-four hours, and the issuance of said voucher shall be postponed until authorized by the executive board. The executive board shall act upon such matters within twenty-four hours after official notification by the treasurer.

Section 5. All vouchers must be signed by the treasurer and any voucher not so signed shall be void.

Section 6. The tentative budgets submitted by the managers and the monthly report submitted by the board of supervisors to the executive board shall be secured by the treasurer and same used in checking manager's accounts.

Section 7. The treasurer shall make a complete financial report to the executive board each month for their approval, and he shall cause the approved copy to be published in the third issue of the Argonaut for that month.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to report any irregularities to the executive board.

ARTICLE X. Department of the Argonaut

The University Argonaut shall be under the control of the editor, associate editor, and business manager.

Section 2. The editor shall have power to appoint such additional members of the staff as he shall deem necessary, and to determine their duties. He shall also have power to remove from office any of said appointees who fail properly to perform their duties.

Section 3. The editor shall determine the policy of the paper.

Section 4. In order to be eligible for election as associate editor, a student: (1) Must be a person in the incoming junior or senior classes. (2) Must have served creditably for at least one year on the Argonaut staff. (3) Must have one year of journalism in any recognized university or college or the practical equivalent thereof on the Argonaut or any other newspaper.

Section 5. A vacancy in the position of editor shall be filled by the promotion of the associate editor. A vacancy in the position of associate editor shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 6. A vacancy in the position of business manager shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 7. A vacancy in the position of secretary shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 8. A vacancy in the position of treasurer shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 9. A vacancy in the position of chairman of the board of supervisors shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 10. A vacancy in the position of secretary of the board of supervisors shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 11. A vacancy in the position of secretary of the board of supervisors shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

Section 12. A vacancy in the position of secretary of the board of supervisors shall be filled by the executive board from candidates meeting the qualifications of Section 4 of this article.

UNIVERSITY'S BIG BASEBALL SCHEDULE

IDAHO WILL PLAY GAMES WITH LEADING CONFERENCE SCHOOL THIS SEASON.

The University of Idaho's completed baseball schedule calls for 17 games, 8 of which will be played on the university diamond, David MacMillan, assistant director of athletics and baseball coach announced today. "Under the present schedule, somewhat different from the preliminary one framed earlier in the year, Idaho will probably open the season with two games with the fast Gonzaga aggregation at Spokane on April 29 and 30, Coach MacMillan said, "Gonzaga has always turned out creditable baseball teams and although it is early in the season, we must be going at top speed if we hope to bring home the laurels from them. "Our few preliminary practices show that we must go through grueling workouts for the next month, especially in this true of the infield work. The material is fair but several men will have to be developed within the next thirty days. The pitching staff has been working steadily at indoor practice but it is too early to appraise the value of the material we have. We will suffer through the loss of "Bum" Broshars, pitcher, who on account of bar examinations, will not be out this year."

"The usual high expense incident to such a trip where there are but few engagements will make any profit impossible," said Mr. Turner. "Especially since we are compelled to pay the copyrighters a royalty of \$50 a night, but there seemed unusual interest in the play at Coeur d'Alene and we are confident the venture will be successful."

When presented here Wednesday evening, the varsity players were given a reception seldom accorded an amateur company. For nearly two hours the crowded auditorium was kept roaring with laughter and it is possible that a second show will be given to accommodate those who were unable to get seats Wednesday night.

The plot is one of an ex-soldier, still in uniform, stumbling into the family and family troubles of a certain Mr. Wheeler. For safety's sake Clarence is given a position in the house where he soon becomes one of the family. Each member of the family is embroiled in difficulties of his or her own and falls on Clarence for advice.

Presented recently before New York and Chicago audiences, "Clarence" was one of the most talked of plays of recent years and is still in the height of popularity. There is a talk of a southern Idaho trip, since the show has been so successful, but as the end of the semester is not far off, this will no doubt be impossible.

THE U. OF I. AND ITS NEW HEAD

Nowhere in the United States does education offer a larger opportunity for statebuilding and social service than in the young communities between the Rockies and the Pacific. To no western university is there offered a finer opportunity than to the University of Idaho. The inaugural address of its new president indicates that he has open eyes for his great chance.

Among other statements he declared that the university's most valuable service consists in teaching its wards how to take their place, when grown, in a busy commonwealth. It is the training school, not of any one class, but of the entire citizenry. It is through and of and for the people. If in any community of Idaho, which sends a larger proportion of its graduates from high schools to colleges outside of Idaho than does almost any other state, it is considered inadvisable to send its boys and girls to the state's university, then it behooves the taxpaying stockholders of the varsity to know the reason why and provide the remedy.

President Upham in these words took the University of Idaho home to the bosom and interest of every citizen of Idaho. He contributed to making every man and every woman in that state realize that its university is their personal concern. It is every taxpayer's business as a good citizen to interest himself in the affairs of the university. As he supports it intelligently and actively or without such support, so will it flourish or decline. Its foundations run coterminous with the boundaries of Idaho. It is a service to public welfare that Dr. Upham has rendered through his utterance of these simple truths.—Spokesman-Review.

THE RECODIFIED CONSTITUTION

The constitution of the A. S. U. I. has been completely recodified by a representative committee appointed from the student body, and consisting of members from every group and from every major activity on the campus.

This committee has completely revised the old constitution, and has carefully thought out and deliberated upon every revision. As it now stands, the recodified constitution is probably the most representative document ever placed before the student body of Idaho. The friends and foes alike of former amendments and proposed changes were on the committee which drafted the present document, and have come to an amicable agreement on its present terms.

The present constitution as recodified, provides for full student control, with provisions which will expedite all business transactions, and still maintains stability and continuity of operation. Every student should make it a point to thoroly read and consider the recodified constitution, which is printed complete in this issue. It will be read before the student body tomorrow.

In our opinion, there should be no active opposition to this recodification. The committee which devised it was of sufficient size, and of such diversity of interests, that it is truly a representative document, and its adoption should be little more than a matter of form.

A WORTHY PROJECT.

It is said that a motion will be offered before the student assembly Wednesday, for the purpose of having a committee appointed to provide ways and means of equipping the "Y" but for a more complete student use. The plans at present are but little

more than tentative, but it is hoped that a pool table and other equipment can be secured so that students will have a place to congregate for a purely social time, and enjoy themselves. This is a move in the right direction. There is no place at the present time on the campus where students may go to spend a little leisure time, with pleasure or enjoyment.

A good social center where all students may meet on a common footing for a social time, is one of the most needed institutions on the campus. The Argonaut promises its aid in putting this project through.

RECODIFIED CONSTITUTION TO RESUBMITTED FOR ADOPTION

(Continued From Page One)

ARTICLE XI. Recall
Section 1. Any general or departmental officer of this association may be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of the student body, provided however, that departmental managers with the exception of the graduate manager of athletics, shall be recalled upon the recommendation of the executive board.

ARTICLE XII. Final Adjudication
Section 1. Any act of any officer, committee, or department existing under this constitution may be repealed by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting of this association.

ARTICLE XIII.
Section 1. No addition, alteration, or amendment may be made to this constitution, neither can any part of it be repealed, suspended or waived, except by a two-thirds majority of all votes cast at a regular meeting or at a special election called for that purpose.

Section 2. All amendments shall be voted upon by ballot.
Section 3. An amendment may be proposed to this constitution at any meeting of the association when it shall be read for the first time. Such proposed amendment must be voted upon not less than one week nor more than two weeks after the first reading.

Section 4. The secretary of the A. S. U. I. shall cause a copy of the proposed amendment to be posted and also to be published in the first Argonaut issued after the first reading of the proposed amendment.

ARTICLE XIV. Athletic Board

Section 1. The athletic board shall consist of seven members of the A. S.

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City and State.....

U. I. elected as hereinbefore provided, and the graduate manager of athletics, who shall have no vote.

Section 2. The officers of this board shall be president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer. The officers shall be elected at the first meeting in each collegiate year. The officers shall assume the duties and responsibilities usually appurtenant to their respective offices.

Section 3. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. No person shall be eligible for membership on the athletic board who is not an official "I" man.

Section 5. Vacancies on the board shall be filled by the board.

ARTICLE XV. General Provisions

Section 1. The term "post" wherever used in this constitution and by-laws shall be interpreted to mean publication on the official university bulletin board.

Section 2. The semester dues for the members of the A. S. U. I. shall be known as the "A. S. U. I. fee."

Section 3. The departments of the A. S. U. I. shall be as follows: Department of the Argonaut, department of athletics, department of debates, department of glee club, and the department of the miscellaneous fund.

7. Adjournment.

RECODIFIED CONSTITUTION TO BE SUBMITTED FOR ADOPTION

(Continued from page two.)

white "I" nine inches in height, four and five-tenths inches across the top of the insignia and the width of all the bars shall be one and eight-tenths inches. The length of the upright bar shall be five and four-tenths inches. The official sweater shall be red with a "V"-necked collar, with above insignia upon it and with a one inch white stripe on the left sleeve for every letter won in that branch.

2. Captains of athletic teams in each branch of sport shall wear, sewed over the stripe of the left sleeve of the official sweater, a star of such size that it may be inscribed in a circle of one-inch radius, and of the color hereinafter prescribed for said branch.

3. The official track insignia and sweater shall be the same as that of football with the exception of the color of the stripe on the left sleeve. The stripe shall be blue.

4. The official baseball insignia and sweater shall be the same as that of football with the exception of the color of the stripe on the left sleeve, the stripe shall be blue.

5. The official basketball insignia and sweater shall be the same as that of football with the exception of the color of the stripe on the left sleeve. The stripe shall be green.

6. The official wrestling insignia and sweater shall be the same as that of football with the exception of the stripe. The stripe shall be black.

7. Every person winning an honorary athletic insignia shall receive one regulation sweater with the insignia upon it each year.

8. To any man who has been granted the official insignia and sweater by the athletic board, his choice must be the same as to color of the sweater and the color and size of the "I." It shall be awarded by the athletic board as follows:

a. To any member of the association who shall have played in the first line-up of two conference intercollegiate football games or who shall have played six (6) full quarters in conference intercollegiate games in one season.

b. To any member of the association who shall have played twenty-seven (27) innings in conference intercollegiate basketball games in one (1) season, or who shall have

pitched eighteen (18) innings in one or more conference intercollegiate games in one season. An inning shall consist of a time of team at bat and a time of man in field, and no half innings shall be considered, except the first half of last inning, which shall be considered as a full inning when the game is won without it being necessary to play the last half of the inning.

c. To any member of the association who shall have won five (5) points in a conference and dual intercollegiate track meet, or who shall have won three points in a triangular conference intercollegiate track meet, or who shall have won any one point in any conference meet, or who shall have won ten (10) points in conference meets in any season. To any member of the association who shall have won first place in any dual conference cross-country race, second place in any triangular conference cross-country race, or third place in any conference cross-country race.

d. To any member of the association who shall have played in four or more conference intercollegiate basketball games in three or more of which he shall have been in the first line-up.

e. To any member of the association who shall have wrestled in three (3) or more intercollegiate wrestling contests in two of which he shall have won his match, or who shall win one (1) match by a fall or falls in any intercollegiate amateur wrestling tournament.

Section 2. A red blanket six feet seven inches (6 ft. 7 in.) by five feet two inches (5 ft. 2 in.) and having in its center on one side a white I whose upright bar is nine inches by two and seven-eighths inches and whose blocks are seven and one-half by three inches, shall be awarded to any member winning an insignia in any one branch of athletics three or in three different branches of athletics.

Section 3. A star which can be inscribed in a circle of two and seven-eighths in diameter will be awarded to each member who is awarded a blanket for each insignia awarded to him. These stars shall be placed on the blanket so awarded.

The different branches are represented by different colored stars as follows:

1. Orange for football.
2. Blue for baseball.
3. Green for basketball.
4. Slate for track.
5. Black for wrestling.

Section 4. An additional star of

the above specifications shall be awarded to captains of first teams and shall be placed on the upright of the "I" on the blanket.

Section 5. No person shall have a vote for captain unless he has been awarded the official insignia in that branch for that respective season.

Section 6. The University debate insignia shall be a gold "I" five-eighths inch in height and three-sixteenths of an inch in width having blocks three-eighths (3-8) of an inch in width and having the word "Debate" inscribed vertically upon the upright section of the "I." The debate "I" shall be awarded by the executive board to all members of this association who shall represent the University in any intercollegiate debating contest but not more than one such emblem shall be awarded to one person.

Section 7. All freshmen recommended by the coach of their particular major sports shall be awarded an official certificate of merit, signed by the president of the University, the athletic director, and the coach.

Section 8. To any member of the association to whom the official "I" shall have been awarded in one or more major sports, there shall be also awarded, on the Campus Day during his senior year, or at the end of his college career one certificate bearing the name of the member to whom the award is made, the branch or branches in which the official "I" has been awarded to such member, the years of such award, and signature of the director of the department of athletics, and the signature of the president of the University. Each member of this association, at the time of the awarding of his first "I" in major athletics shall be awarded the official silver "I" pin, which shall entitle the owner when no longer a member of this association to admission to all events given by or under the auspices of said association the same as if he were a member thereof. The expense of the foregoing awards shall be borne by the athletic fund.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The A. S. U. I. dues shall be eight dollars and a half per semester.

Section 2. If a member discontinues his college work within two weeks after date of registration, his dues may be refunded with the exception of a fee of twenty-five cents, provided that all such claims for refund are approved by the president and the treasurer of the A. S. U. I.,

before they are honored by the bursar. At the time of such refund the subscription to the Argonaut and the season ticket to athletic events shall be cancelled.

Section 3. Members who are registered as graduate student, candidates for an advanced degree, shall pay the A. S. U. I. fee which shall entitle them to a subscription of the Argonaut.

Section 4. Persons not registered in office of the dean and receiving no college credit for their work shall not be considered eligible to membership in this association. This clause shall be interpreted to include students in the department of music whose work consists of practically music only, night students in shop work, members of the faculty taking college courses but not looking toward a degree, and persons attending classes merely as auditors or visitors.

Section 5. The dues of members registered in the school of practical agriculture and six months commercial courses in dairying shall be one-half (1/2) of the A. S. U. I. fee for each registration which shall entitle them to all privileges of the association during their period of registration.

Section 6. The A. S. U. I. fee shall be apportioned in the following manner: From the total receipts of each semester the treasurer shall appropriate fifty dollars (\$50) for his own salary. The remainder shall be apportioned among the several student activities as follows:

1. Athletics	76.6 per cent
2. Argonaut	8.3 per cent
3. Debate	6.9 per cent
4. Glee Club	6.2 per cent
5. Miscellaneous	2.1 per cent

Section 7. The editor, business manager, and assistant manager of the Argonaut shall be compensated for their work at the following rate:

1. The editor shall be paid at rate of seven dollars and fifty cents (\$7.50) per issue.
2. The business manager shall be paid at the rate of five dollars (\$5.00) per issue.
3. The business manager shall appoint such assistants as he may choose and pay them at the rate of not to exceed fifty cents (50c) per hour for all time devoted to such position.
4. In addition to the regular salary paid to the business manager, he shall receive thirty per cent (30%) of all moneys collected for advertising during the current year over and above the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars.

5. Article three (3), section five (5) of the by-laws, that is the section above stated shall take effect at once on the adoption of this constitution, except that the business manager shall be compensated at the present rate of two dollars (\$2.00) per issue for the remainder of the current year and shall receive one-half (1/2) of all moneys left in the Argonaut fund at the end of the current year and in arriving at such amount the editor's salary shall be considered at the rate of three dollars (\$3.00) per issue.

ARTICLE IV.

Interclass Song Contest and Stunt Fest.

Section 1. This contest shall be known as the Inter-Class Song Contest and Stunt Fest and shall be held on the evening of the day of the interscholastic track meet and the proceeds be donated to the interscholastic committee.

Section 2. Each regular four-year class shall be allowed to enter a team, the membership of which shall be selected from the regular roll of membership of the respective classes as shown by the records in the office of the dean of the University faculty. The selection of the respective teams shall be made by the respective classes in such manner as such classes shall deem proper.

Section 3. The evening's program shall be divided into the separate contests, a song contest and a contest that shall consist of songs and dramatic productions or both.

Section 4. The song contest shall consist of two songs by each class, the words of which shall be original and related to college life in general. Three copies of the words and music of each song shall be made and presented two weeks before the contest, to the chairman of the A. S. U. I. executive board, who shall give each song a number as a means of identification and send it to the judges of the contest. Two months before the contest, the president of the A. S. U. I. shall post a notice on the bulletin board stating the rules of the contestants.

Section 5. Upon the request of the president of the A. S. U. I. the head of the music department shall appoint three judges who shall judge according to the merits of the song and its presentation. Judges shall be present at the song fest. The judges may not be chosen from members of the A. S. U. I. These judges of the song contest shall class the songs as first, second, third, etc.

Section 6. To the class securing ation.

the first place in the song contest shall be awarded the prize of \$25, to the person or persons, composing the best song \$25. This fund to be taken from the miscellaneous fund of the A. S. U. I.

Section 7. In the stunt contest the performance of each class shall be limited to 20 minutes and shall consist of songs and dramatic productions or either. The words of such songs or dramatic productions shall relate to some phase or phases of college life at the University, the words thereto to be composed by the class or members thereof, presenting the same.

Section 8. The order of presentation on the evening of the contest shall be: Freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

Section 9. Each class shall be permitted to select as a coach anyone whom it may desire, provided that no class shall be permitted to name as its coach anyone officially connected with any department of the University in which instructions are given in dramatics or music.

Section 10. The winners of the stunt fest contest shall be determined by three judges who shall be chosen by the president of the University, provided that the name of all judges shall be withheld until the night of the fest. Anyone over twenty-one years of age and not a student in the University of Idaho, or not at the time of acting as coach of any of the competing classes shall be eligible to act as judges.

Section 11. The name of the winning class of the stunt fest each year shall be engraved on an appropriate trophy cup to be purchased by the A. S. U. I. and placed on permanent display in the trophy room of the University.

Section 12. Each class shall bear the expense of its own performance: Provided, that any general expense incurred in the presentation of the contest shall be borne in equal shares by the classes participating.

ARTICLE V.

These by-laws may be amended in the same manner as the constitution.

ARTICLE VI.

General Validity

Unless otherwise stated in special sections of this instrument and applying to special parts thereof only, the whole of this constitution and by-laws shall take effect from theday of, 1921, and continue in effect until repealed, or set aside by the act of this association.
