COLLEGE EDUCATION ADDS YEARS TO WOMAN'S LIFE

College women, as a rule, live longer than their less educated sisters. A study covering a study of the death rates of all the women graduates from colleges and of women in general shows that the death rate among the college graduates was only half as high as the others. This is explained by the insurance companies in three different ways.

First there is the selective effect of all colleges; those physically unfit to pursue studies usually drop from the advantage of better home environment and more opportunities for physical exercise than other women. Finally, after graduation many of them enter professional pursuits, where the risk of death is at a minimum.

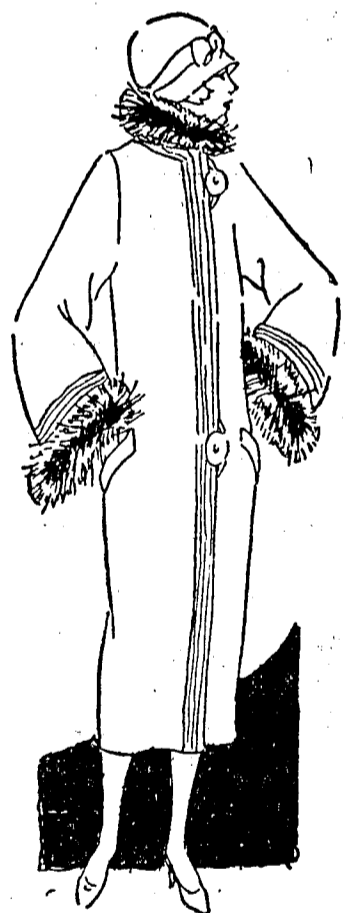

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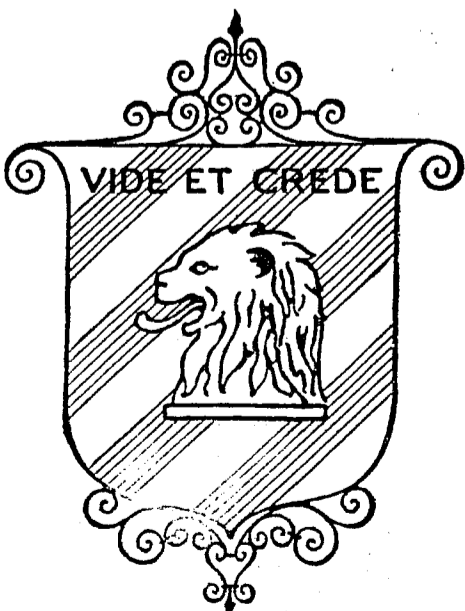

Moscow. Bullding New Bleachers.

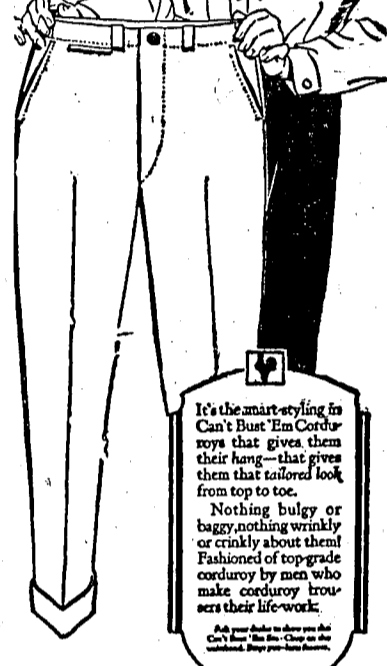
New bleacher sections are being constructed at MacLean field, large enough to handle the largest crowd in the history of the school.

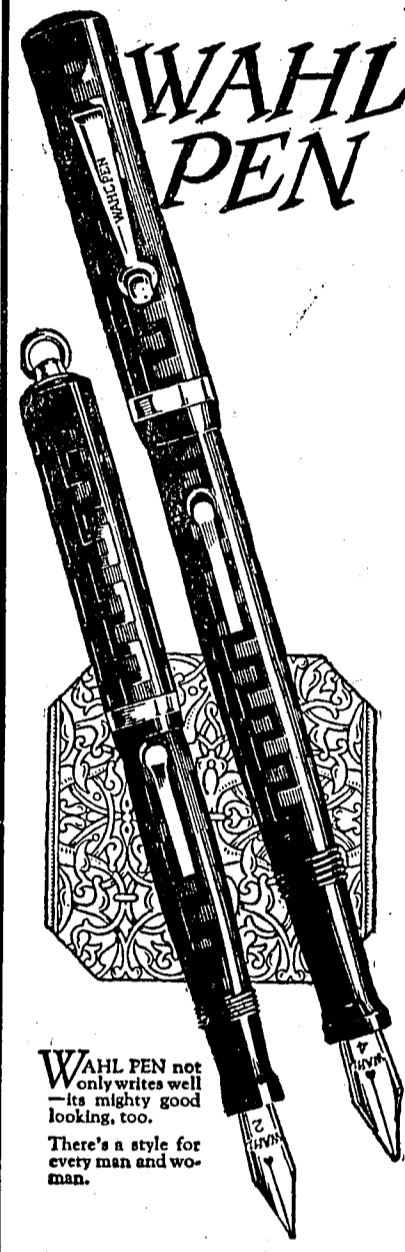

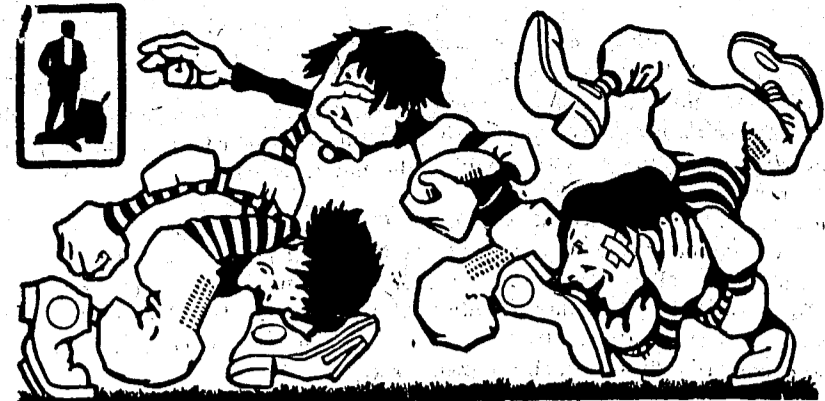
