### **MATTY'S WARRIORS** HAND LACING TO **MONTANA BEARS**

Vandals Solve Grizzlies' 41 to 13 Score

Idaho Vandals slipped Montana Bears a 41 to 13 drubbing Saturday the Idaho State Federation of Womat Missoula, upsetting dope that held that Idaho was in for a proper cleaning. The Vandals started strong in the first period and always were they in the lead. A stone wall defense, backed by a speedy backfield that skirted Montana ends for repeated gains, sums up the story of Idaho's victory.

Early in the second period Larry Quinn, considered by most authorities as one of the fastest and most consistent tackles in coast football, was taken from the game with a fractured collar bone. This is his last season of Idaho varsity football. Montana's first touchdown came after. Quinn had been taken from the game.

#### Idaho Line Heavier.

Four of the Vandals' half dozen touchdowns were earned only after the ball was pushed down the field by gruelling line bucks and an occasional pass, while the other two were dished out when the Bear line wavered and fell back. The Idaho line, a little heavier than Montana's, had little difficulty in bowling over opposition and there were but few scrimmages ended that there wasn't a gain of some kind, ranging from one yard to above fifty. Few passes were tried by Idaho. The pass seemed the Bears' only offense and it paved the way for both touchdowns-the first in the last part of the scond period and the other in the third quarter. Gonzaga Bulldogs Trim W S. C. Cougars, 14 to 12; Idaho Trounces Montana, 41 to 13: California Calls Out Reserves

Coast football last Saturday was again made interesting because of promiscuous upsetting of previously mixed dope pots.

Perhaps the greatest surprise of all came when the Gonzaga Bulldogs slashed their way to a 14 to 12 victory over the Washington State college Cougars Saturday afternoon. Coach Dorais' men started a bewildering offensive from the opening gun and after a long range punting duel between Stockton, Gonzaga and Lynch. W. S. C., during which the Bulldogs gained considerable ground, Zeb Stockton pulled a play that electrified the already wild rooting sections. The team was lined up on the 40-yard line and Zeb pulled a pass to Flaherty, who stood beyond the goal line. This came seven minutes after the game was started. Gonzaga's victory, won only by a margin of two points, was made possible by Stockton's booting for the
