## "WE ARE DETERMINED TO WIN"

# OLD GRADS RETURN HOME

### ALUMS TELL CROWD OF IDAHO'S SPIRIT IN DAYS GONE BY

#### Rooters Form at "I" Bench and Serpentine to Downtown Corner; Governor Moore Unable to Appear

"We are determined that somehow tomorrow in that 60 minutes of football we will win for Idaho."

Those were the parting words of "Matty" Mathews, the guiding spirit of the Idaho eleven; before he took his team with him to rest for the grueling 60-minute period this afternoon. They were uttered last night from a truck surrounded by nearly two thousand howling Idaho students, all in a frenzy of excitement over what will be the biggest game ever played on MacLean field.

"I will speak for the team," Mr. Mathews said, pointing to a quiet group of men beside the truck. "This is the pride of Idaho—the best she has to offer. We are determined that somehow tomorrow in the 60 minutes of football we will win for Idaho."

Idaho spirit of days gone by was recalled by a man who donned mole-skins and Idaho red nearly a quarter of a century ago. William E. Lee, now a member of the state supreme court, exhorted the rally crowd to their best in backing the team when it goes against the Trojans this afternoon. To the team he said: "All eyes are on you—much depends on your efforts between the whistles. You are playing for Idaho." Arthur Rodgers, who played on Vandal elevens in '03, '04 and '05 recalled pep as it was shown by Idaho students when he was waiting for the whistles to start games when Idaho

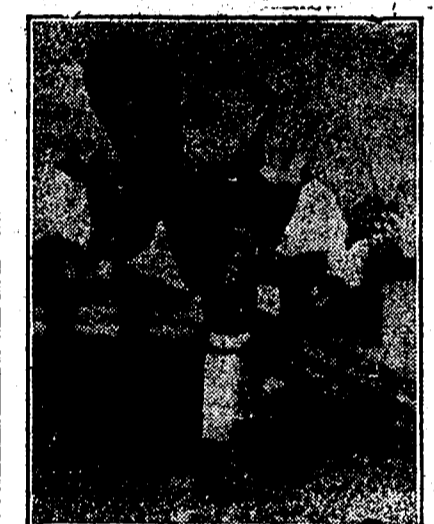

### FOUR TEAMS IN RUNNING FOR COAST CONFERENCE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Only four teams, Idaho, California, Stanford, and Washington remain in the running in the Pacific coast conference race. The three latter teams are the only ones Idaho does not play in their conference schedule, and there is a chance that they may "kill themselves off" in the race for the title.

Food for thought for Idaho fans would be Washington State College defeating Washington, California defeating Stanford, and Washington defeating California—maybe. Then if Idaho defeated U. S. C., Montana, and O. A. C. they would be riding with the pennant—maybe.

This will be a big week in conference circles Oregon playing Stanford at Palo Alto, Montana vs. Oregon Aggies at Corvallis, Washington State vs. Washington at Pullman, and Cal-

### IDAHO VISITORS TO FIND SHELTER

#### Housing Committee Reports That Homecoming Crowd Will be Well Cared for

"An earnest attempt is being made to accommodate, as conveniently as possible, all visitors to the University for the Home-coming game," said John O. McMurry, chairman of the housing committee in an interview today.

According to Mr. McMurry a canvass of the entire city has been made for rooms with the resultant listing of approximately 300 rooms and probable accommodations for 500 guests. This is exclusive of hotels, halls, fraternity and sorority houses. It is planned that the houses on the campus will take care of an additional 300.

### FAST SIGNAL DRILLS POLISH BOTH TEAMS FOR INLAND EMPIRE'S GREAT GRIDIRON CLASSIC THIS AFTERNOON

At two o'clock this afternoon a team of fighting Idaho Vandals battle an invading horde of Trojans from the University of Southern California in the greatest football battle ever scheduled in the Inland Empire. Under-dogs on the dope sheet, the Vandals are grim and determined, and have no prediction to make outside the fact that "Idaho will fight."

Both teams went through a final polishing-up signal drill yesterday afternoon. Last night they rested in secluded quarters away from the excitement of hundreds of alumni and fans in town, the vanguard of thousands expected today.

With one exception the Vandals will be at full battle strength. Irving ("Chick") Terry, guard, received a badly injured knee in the Gonzaga game and it is doubtful if he will be in the Idaho lineup. Terry is one of the few returning linemen from last season's team and has been going strong this year. Orvil Jones, two-year substitute, will probably take Terry's guard position. Jones is light, weighing less than 160 pounds, but is built close to the ground and hits hard.

The Trojans are also suffering one injury. Charles Boren, halfback, being left at home with a badly twisted knee received in the Stanford game.

Idaho fans may expect anything in the game. Southern California has stolen the Vandals' thunder as the passing team of the coast this year, and has won practically all its victories by the overhead attack. The Trojans use the huddle system of calling signals.

Idaho, usually feared for its forward passing attack, has yet to open up with an aerial offensive. Oregon and Washington State college both were defeated by a straight running attack. This afternoon they probably will do anything—which is unexpected.

Rollin Farmin, who attended Stanford last year and who held the Pacific intercollegiate championship at 170 pounds is scheduled to go six rounds with Jim Rafter of Boise, a freshman at the university.

### CAMPUS CROWDED; 12,000 WAIT FOR HOMECOMING GAME

#### Largest Group of Football Fans in the History of the University Are Gathered

for Battle  
Host for 12,000 football fans, assembled from all parts of the northwest—that is the capacity of the University of Idaho today as the huge crowd of graduates, parents and visitors wait for 9 o'clock and beginning of the Homecoming classic between the Idaho Vandals and the University of Southern California Trojans. All roads lead to the University today, and a continual stream of automobiles are still bringing Vandal boosters to witness the first Trojan invasion into the Inland Empire. Special trains from Boise, Wallace, Lewiston, Spokane, and Seattle are resting on the tracks of Moscow where their Pullman sleepers are used as quarters for the thousands of passengers.

Fraternity houses, dormitories, churches, and private homes have thrown open their doors to care for those who are not able to find accommodation at the hotels and traffic officers from the R. O. T. C. corps of the University are stationed at every corner to direct the crowds. University and city organizations have co-operated to care for and entertain the host of visitors and Moscow is thronged with the largest crowd of its history.

### JONES HAS ONE OF MOST POWERFUL SCORING ELEVENS ON PACIFIC COAST

Coach Howard Jones has developed one of the most powerful scoring teams ever playing under the University of California colors—a team which has run up 280 points to 15 scored by opponents so far this season. The Trojans have played six games, won five of them by overwhelming scores, and lost one to Stanford by 4 points.

The Trojans started the season with a 74 to 0 win from Whittier college, then followed U. S. C. 33-California Tech 0, U. S. C. 80-Pomona 0, U. S. C. 28-Utah 2, U. S. C. 9-Stanford 13, U. S. C. 56-Arizona 0. Howard Elliott, Trojan quarterback, stands first among the point scorers of the Pacific Coast conference football teams with 10 touchdowns and 4 field goals, for 63 points, to his credit. Mort Kaer, another Trojan quarter, is second with 9 touchdowns for 54 points.

Coach Jones has a habit of developing winning teams. While at the University of Iowa his teams won Big Ten championships for two consec-

five years. His Iowa team defeated that of his more famous brother, Tad Jones, at Yale.

The team Jones has brought to Moscow to battle the Vandals is a colorful combination. Speaking of their 56-0 victory over Arizona last week a Los Angeles paper says in part:

"Coach Jones injected Lefebvre into the lineup as a fullback. The little French flash came through with a bang. He ripped and tore his way through the Wildcat forward wall almost at will. With him Bill Cook, quarter, ran riot, along with Drury, half, and Elliott, Orsatt, Thompson, and Laraneta."

The men of Troy may also have their weak spots for the article continues:

"The game with the Vandals next Friday at Moscow may go far toward determining the success or failure of the Trojan season. Jones knows that his tackle berths are weak but he saw nothing yesterday to help him build defense."

### COMPLETE EXTERIOR BUILDING ON HOUSE

Phi Gamma Delta Will Have New Home by December 1

Exterior work on the new \$60,000 home of Phi Gamma Delta, national social fraternity at the University of Idaho, is rapidly nearing completion, according to James Burnett and Marshall Blair, both of Boise, members of the committee in charge. The stucco finish and laying of the slate roof are all that remain to be done on the outside of the building. Although plans call for the entire completion of the house by December 1, additional work on the interior will probably delay moving in until the holidays, it was stated.

The new fraternity home is old English in design—of the late Tudor period. An old English garden will be built back of the house and walnut furniture of the Tudor period will form harmonizing effects with the building, both within and without. The house is being built on the corner lots owned by the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity at the intersection of University avenue and Elm street.

Approximately 40 men will be accommodated by the new house. Special features of design and construction include "spiral" chimneys, steel casements for all windows, antique leaded glass in lower front windows, and special clay shingles. The brick for the house was specially ordered by the architects and was laid in a peculiar "Dutch bond" style. Contrary to the usual American bond which gives a horizontal and vertical line effect, this style gives a criss-cross parallel effect.

Whitehouse and Price, Spokane, are the architects; Larson Brothers, Spokane, are the contractors; Powell and DeLong, Moscow, are handling the

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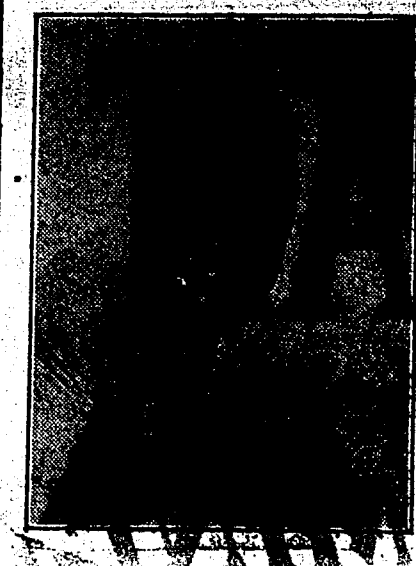

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

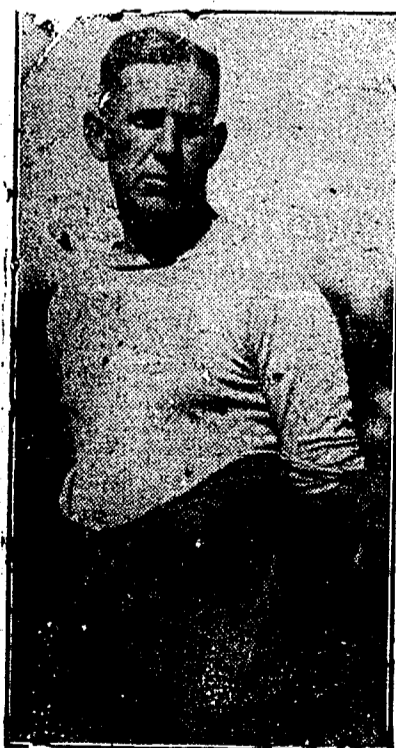
### JUPE PLUVIUS SPOILS STUDENT TENNIS

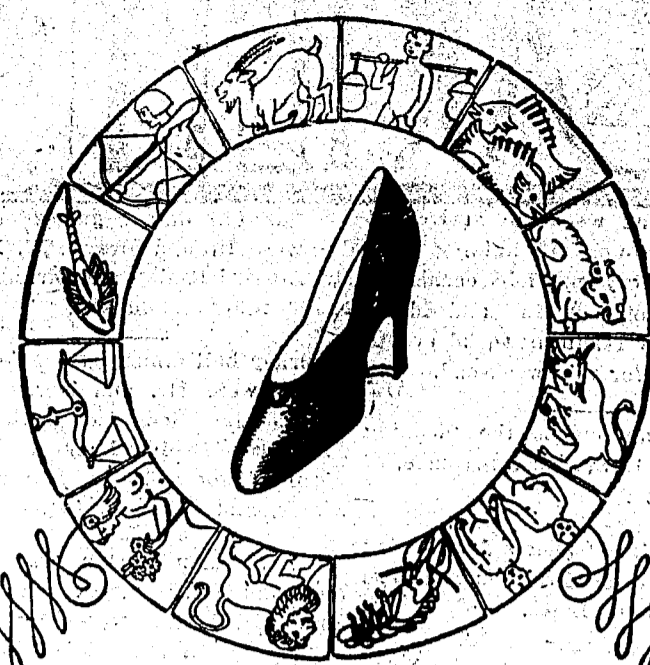
