## FAST SIGNAL DRILLS POLISH BOTH TEAMS FOR INLAND EMPIRES GREAT GRIDIRON CLASSIC THIS AFTERNOON

At two o'clock this afternoon a team of fighting Idaho Vandals battle an invading horde of Trojans from the University of Southern California in the greatest football battle ever scheduled in the Inland Empire.
Under-dogs on the dope sheet, the Vandals are grim and determined, and have no prediction to make outside the fact that "Idaho will fight."

Both teams' went through a final poilshing-up signal drill yeserday afternoon. Last night they rested in secluded quarters away from the excitement of hundreds of alumni and fans in town, the vanguard of thousands expected today

With one exception the Vandals will be at full battle strength. Irvin ("Chick") Terry, guard, recelved a bady injured knee in the Gonzaga game
and it is doubttul if he will be in the IIaho lineup. Terry is one of the fe returning linesmen from last season's team and has been going strong this returning hnesmen from last season's team an has
