

SCIENCE DOUBTS ON EVOLUTION

Noted Scientist Declares Monkey to Man Theory All Hokus

Chicago,-Science is smarting from slaps administered by Dr. R. A. Millikan of the University of Chicago, Nobel prizewinner and internationally famous physicist. Dr. Millikan, who opened a new era in scientific investigation with his exploration of the atom, avers that dogmatism burdens science as well as religion, and declares the developments of the last quarter century of all the physical sciences should teach men of learning to be "more modest and thoughtful."

"The pathetic thing is that we have scientists who are trying to prove evolution, which no scientist can ever prove," he declares. "Now I do not want you to think that I am on the other side; I am not. I am only asking for more caution."

Other scientists are afraid Dr. Millikan's remark will be misunderstood and taken as a refutation of the theory | Brigham Young University of evolution. In the main, however, they agree with him.

They regard evolution, they explain, as an historical truth, no more and no less demonstrable by experiment than any other historical fact-such as for example, that Washington crossed the Delaware.
