engaged in extra-curricular activities agree. But immediately. disagreement ensues over the definition of an education. The acad emic viewpoint is that studies are the only worth while education and
should have the preference. The activity must come second and b should have the preference. The activity must come second and be they get more practical benefit from their participation in things in which they are interested and from which they can get real experience.

They further argue that some latitude should be conceded them because their poor grades can frequently be attributed to too much time ;pent on some outside work. Participation in such things as music, publications. dramatics, stock judging and all sorts of managerial positions are beneficial, they say, and are frequently of much more practical value than any theoretical study could be. Thus far the
argument for activities is sound. But when activities such as athletics, musical comedies and other puirsuits of little value as far as later use rules to protect studies.
