New Structure Embodies Latest Developments in Design and Furnishings

The hall, erected at a cost of approximately \$100,000, will be named in honor of Mrs. Gertrude L. Hays of Boise, a former regent of the University, as a tribute to her long service as regent and her progressive leadership in many activities. Hays hall will be ready for occu-

pancy when college opens in the fall-It was financed by a bonding system, as two other university resi-dences were financed. The bonds will be paid for by funds accruing from rental and at the end of 15 years the building becomes the property of the

state. The hall has its design inspired from the English collegiate style as rendered by skilled architects in the more recent architecture. Its style is so suited as to be in harmony with the adjoining Forney hall. What was an ugly spot is rapidly being changed by the building and its intended surroundings into a lovely location.
