She wore slippers of gilded cobra and carried a shower bouquet of orchids and carnations.

After their return from a honeymoon trip to Death Valley they will make their home in Troy, Idaho, where Captain Buchanan has been stationed to take charge of the National Guard."

On expiration of that period she was appointed for a full term of six years. Mrs. Hays was a member of the nominating convention of the democratic party of the state held at Pocatello in 1905.

When America entered the World war she was appointed, from Washington, D. C., State Chairman of the Women's Committee of National Defense. She was appointed by the

governor to be a member of the State Council of Defense and served on the executive committee throughout the war period. She was on the executive board of the State Food Administration, also of the War Service Stamp Board. She served on the Home Service section of the 844 Cross executive committee and the Women's Liberty Loan committee for Idaho. In 1920 she was a member of the board of the Ada county public health nurses association.

Mrs. Hays was chairman of the building committee of the Columbian club during the last year when the club house was erected.
