

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

RIFLE SHOOTING 'A' MINOR SPORT

Several members of the team come before the executive board Tuesday night and put the proposition before the board. In their argument they showed that the team represents the university in several matches fires with schools all over the country. The team competes in such national shoots as the Hearst Trophy match, shooting against 200 of the best teams in the country. Many telegraphic matches are on the schedule during the school year.

But, before the members of the team can compete in such matches there are sevaral months of practice. In fact each member of the club works about six months out of the nine in order to attain the highest possible degree of perfection. It is true that the workputs experienced in this branch of sports are hardly as strenuous as others, but cover a much longer period.





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
