WENDT ENTHUSES OVER IDAHO SPIRIT

Declares Enthusiasm and Forward-Looking Spirit Exist Here

Dr. Gerald L. Wendt, director-elect of Battelle Institute of Columbus, Ohio, declared that an enthusiasm and straight forward-looking spirit exists on the Idaho campus.

"One of the interesting discoveries one makes on such a tour as this is the general similarity in the colleges of the country," said Dr. Wendt.

"At first sight the student body in Washington looks exactly like that in Maine. One gets, at first, the impression that students and faculty, too, are standardized and almost interchangeable.

"Eager For Life" Here: "At the University of Idaho, I find enthusiasm and a rare forward-looking spirit. There is no tendency to sit back comfortably on past accomplishments, no excess of pride, no false confidence in the perfection of the world and of the college.

"Such an atmosphere is indeed most congenial to the research man who lives in the future, like the pioneer. That pioneer spirit everywhere still activates our country. Things do not stand still. In the industries, for example, there has been in recent years a marked change in the types of training demanded.

"I have often wondered why so few American college men go into that science as a profession. Constant improvement is expected in the telephone. The radio is still an infant. Television will soon have its first birthday. Progress in these fields is built on physics by physicists and, indeed, it is from physics that the engineering of the future has always come."

Opportunity at Idaho: "It would seem to me that the eager, youthful atmosphere of the university of Idaho there should be great opportunity for work in the sciences, especially for those students who wish to work in the professions whose breath of life is the future. I feel that the most forward-looking of the sciences are chemistry and physics, the future applications of which will be best made by those who have a mathematical foundation."
