Medieval Collegians Said to Be Similar To 'We Moderns'

Students who think of medieval days as the dark age in which there was constant strife and very little development should be compelled to take a course which would instruct them regarding the intellectual impetus of those days, is the belief of Professor L. J. Poetow, of the University of California, who spoke to a group of students and professors on the subject of medieval universities and colleges.

While there is no reference to such terms as campus, stadium, deans and finals; the aim of education in those times was just as definite as that of the present day. The modern college man dreams of becoming the president of a bank, while the medieval student had aspirations to obtain a bishopric. The college professors were controlled by the student, who imposed fines when he failed to meet his classes or failed to cover all of the material in the day's assignment.

The early universities were not organized groups, but consisted merely of the professor and the scholars. Class meetings were held in the home and universities migrated from town to town, colleges were organized.

maintained by endowments from wealthy citizens. All the students were expected to live in these colleges then Paris is known to be the home of the medieval college.

According to Professor Poetow, the same problems governing our modern campus existed in those times. Fathers looked back to the day when they were going to school and wondered what the younger generation were coming to. A letter written by a medieval school boy to his father revealed the fact that demands for more funds was as frequent occurrence then as it is today.

Professor Poetow feels that the big mistake of the age was the discouragement of the use of Latin. It is his hope that Latin may still become the universal language, and he feels that this is not an impossibility. Professor Poetow obtained his Ph. D. from the university of Pennsylvania. He studied later in Paris and became instructor of history at the University of Colorado. In 1925-6 he engaged in research work in Paris on sabbatical leave. He is a member of the American History Association and Phi Beta Kappa. He edited and translated the *Battle of the Seven Arts* by Henri D'Andeli. Mr. Poetow has been at the University of California since 1919.
