DEFERRED PLEDGING

TONIGHT representatives of the fraternities and sororities on the campus will meet with the faculty committee appointed by President Kelly to discuss further the feasibility of a deferred pledging system for the University of Idaho.

Since the first meeting three weeks ago, the question has been the source of discussion and argument by students who are members of Greek letter organizations and many who are not.

The purpose of the investigation is merely to find out the facts, not to make a radical change in the existing system. If any changes are made, students themselves will be responsible, and not the administration.

Student representatives who attend the meeting tonight will leave their groups best by expressing what they honestly believe. If they favor the plan proposed, they should say so without hedging.

Campus Loyalty Is Key To Honor System, Belief

Prof. C. W. Chenoweth Supports Merits of Plain But Points Out Necessity of Wholehearted Cooperation

(Editor's note. In reply to The Argonaut's request for opinions on the honor system in the University of Idaho, Prof. C. W. Chenoweth, head of the department of philosophy, has prepared the following article, the first of a series to be published in The Argonaut in an effort to revive interest in the honor system. An investigation conducted among Idaho students and faculty members two years ago indicated sentiment was then unfavorable to the establishment of the honor system.)

The extent of one's loyalty will determine the extent to which he is willing to assume responsibility. The honor system will work in any institution where the first loyalty of its members attaches to the largest entity, the whole institution. It will not work where loyalty is pulverized and apportioned piecemeal to the various units within the larger one.

New Phone Service Aids Group Houses

More accommodating telephone service has been installed on the campus by the Interstate Utilities company. All group houses on the campus are connected through an automatic switch board at the telephone office with the second trunking service of the company.

Each telephone in a house has a separate number. The numbers increase according to the floor the phone is located on. Only one number is listed in the book, but when this number rings and the line is busy, the call will be automatically switched to the phone with the next highest number. The phone in use does not ring, so there is no inconvenience to those talking.

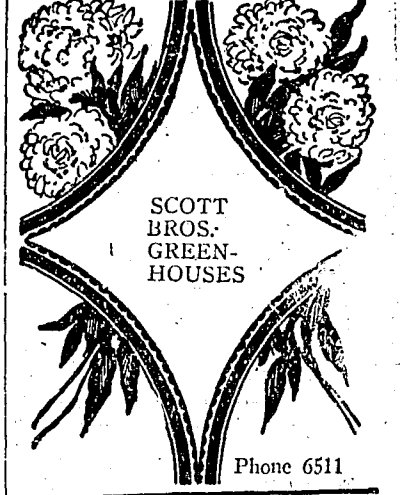

A line to be installed on the first floor will connect the two phones with the automatic switch at the central office. When the down stairs phone rings, and one of the other phone of the upstairs phones are busy, the call can be switched to the other. The person answering the phone can do this at a switch in the telephone booth.

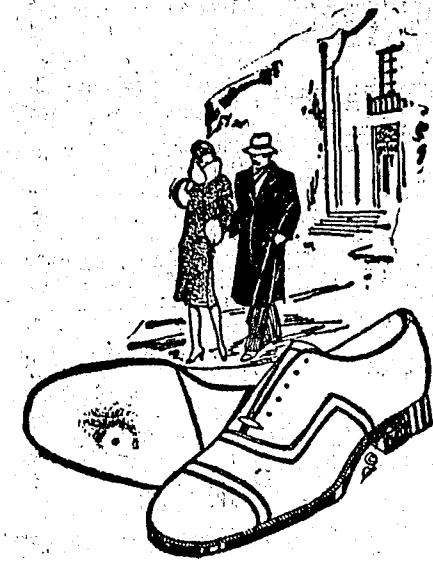

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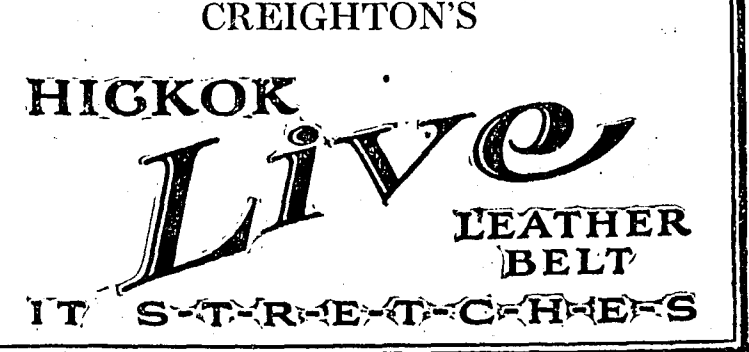
