HINES COMMENDS MILITARY UNIT

Idaho R. O. T. C. Passes in Review Before Area Commander

"The biggest thrill of the year in military," said students and officers alike when Maj. Gen. John L. Hines, commander of the Ninth Corps area, with headquarters at the Presidio of San Francisco, reviewed and inspected the R. O. T. C. unit yesterday at MacLean field. Several hundred students in the bleachers applauded, when, for the first time in the history of the university an officer with the rank of second in command to General Hines, awarded the silver and gold to the company preserving the best kept line in passing the review. Stand. Company H, with Captain Fritz B. Peterson, was the winner. Pass in Review.

On the reviewing line with Major General Hines were Col. E. R. Chrisman, President F. J. Kelly, Lieut. Col. Asa L. Singleton, assistant chief of staff of the Ninth Corps area, and the regular officers of the Idaho military department. The major general awarded rifle emblems to the eight high men or the rifle team for the past year. These men are Paul Croy, John Croy, Erval W. Johnson, John S. Crandall, Harry L. Yost, E. Werner, C. L. Talbot, and K. Platt. Before the review yesterday, the visiting officers inspected the new ordnance and supply department in the Memorial gymnasium. Major General Hines commenting very highly on the precision of Sergeant Lonnie Woods in the care of his department.

Thirteen women students were honored by Major General Hines with rifle awards for outstanding work in this year's matches. Alta Tupper, Lillian Woodworth, Lucile Glindeman, Dorothy Perkins, Elsie Geddes, Virginia Cornell, Dorothy Kienholz, Lorraine Christensen, Lois Larkam, Margaret Fowler, Helene Hifficker, Opal Garrett, and Elsie Warm were given awards, the major general complimenting them on their interest and deeming it "a privilege to award them prizes for their marksmanship." VANDALS TO MEET SOUTHERN BRANCH

First Grid Battle Against Tigers, Thanksgiving Day at Pocatello

The Vandal grid team will meet the University of Idaho Southern Branch Tigers this fall on Thanksgiving day in the first competition between the two state institutions, according to arrangements announced this week by George Horton, graduate manager. The Vandals are to play an exhibition game with the Pocatello eleven on the return trip from Los Angeles where Idaho meets the University of Southern California, November 23. Scheduling of the game with the Southern Branch will give southern Idaho football fans an opportunity to see the Vandals in action, Mr. Horton said. There has been considerable agitation in southern Idaho for a University of Idaho game and an attempt has been made each year to schedule a game, he said. Coach Leo Calland, new Vandal mentor, was well pleased with the situation on his recent trip through southern Idaho and much in favor of a game with the Southern Branch, Mr. Horton indicated. Because of the trip to Los Angeles the week before Thanksgiving it was possible to schedule the Pocatello game for the return journey. The Vandals will end the season with the game at Pocatello.

With the arrangements completed for the Southern Branch game the Idaho football schedule for this year is complete. Mr. Horton said. The Vandals will play nine games this fall, five of which are Pacific Coast conference contests. Idaho opens her season at Moscow September 28 against Montana State college. October 12 Idaho plays the University of Montana on MacLean field here. The Vandals go on the road the following week and, playing at the University of Oregon at Portland October 19, Idaho is scheduled to meet Oregon State college at Corvallis October 26. November 9 will see the annual clash between Idaho and Washington State college at Pullman. Gonzaga travels to Moscow November 16 for her game with Idaho. The game with U. S. C. at Los Angeles November 23 is the last conference game.

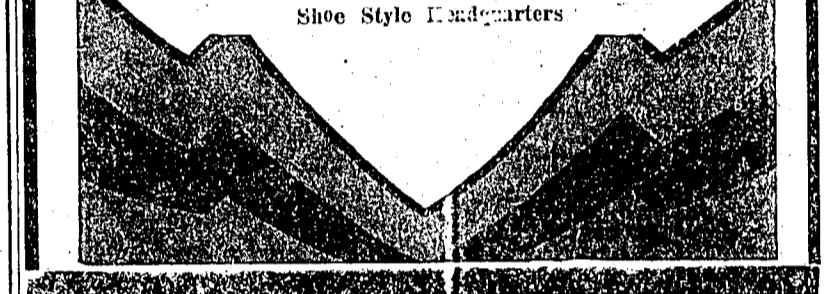

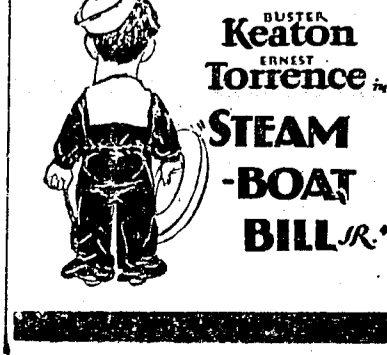

VANDAL GRIDIRON PROSPECTS BEST IN YEARS, BELIEF

Coach Calland Will Have Full Slug of Reserve Material Next Fall

VETERANS LOOK GOOD String of Experienced Men Will Lead Varsity Eleven; Three Backfields

When Coach Leo B. Calland issues the call for football men next September 15, he will be answered by a turnout of the best material in Idaho's history for several years.

Two and possibly three complete backfields will be available, with Hanford, Owens, and Peterson looking among the leaders for the quarterback assignment.

Kirk Chalked For Center. Kirkpatrick two year center, will probably hold down the pivot position with Spaugy and Jay Christians in reserve.

A May prediction is that every man who makes the varsity next fall, will have to play his best football showing all his might and hustle to prevent someone on the bench taking his place.

COAST TRACK MEET CINCH FOR HUSKIES

Washington Sure of Northern Division Title; Idaho May Place

The University of Washington, with its troop of dash, hurdle and distance stars and weight tossers, is given a big edge in the northern division Pacific Coast conference meet at Eugene next Friday and Saturday.

Idaho's chances for point placings are slim, but the Vandal situation is not all bleak. James O'Brien is rated as among the best high jumpers of the northern conference, being beaten out this year only by Carter of Oregon State after both men had cleared 6 feet 2 inches.

Idaho Chances Slight. Idaho's chances on the track are entirely conjectural, but critics on the coast do not rate the Vandals high on any event below the two-mile.

Oregon has strength in the discus, broad jump, mile, and hurdles. Oregon State has power in the high jump, quarter and half-mile events, and the pole vault.

IDAHO REEF MYTH SAYS LEO CALLAND

Coach Breaks Into Print With Denial That Vandals Are Heavyweights

"Idaho beef" is a myth, Leo Calland, new Vandal grid coach, told newspapermen upon his return to Los Angeles, according to a report carried in the Desert News of Salt Lake City.

The Los Angeles dispatch follows: "Idaho beef" is a myth, however, pointing out that his first string would probably average 185 pounds a man which is expected to be lighter than the average of other coast conference teams.

Two boys from southern California look like good bets for first-string jobs, according to Calland, these being June Hanford, former star athlete at Manual Arts high school, and Jack Booker, who used to play for Glendale high.

Calland's team will have two captains next season in Huff, who is playing inside halfback, and Diabl, left tackle. Diabl is one of the two Idaho men bounding the scales over 200 pounds. He weighs 202 pounds.

Bill Kershtnik, 215-pounds giant, who played fullback for Idaho last year was shifted to outside half during Calland's spring practice session, but he will probably be used also at full occasionally.

Kershtnik playing the outside half, he should have one of the strongest offensive tackle driving combinations in the conference.

Calland would not say what his probable starting lineup would be next season.
