

ITH the semi-annual guessing contest less than three weeks away the Question of honesty in examinations is being brought to the front. It is an old story, this "pony riding" and bluffing. It never will cease to be a problem. The faculty is concerned with it is as much as the students; they have been students themselves in the near or remote past and know that cribbing is a favorite passage to a flunkless record. It can't be weeded out entirely but a fittle word or two about the spurned Honor System won't do any harm.

The question was discussed to some length at the recent national student convention at Stanford university. Arguments pro and con were submitted with reports of the system's success or failure at institutions which had attempted to let fundamental honesty be the chief guide in all quizzes and assignments. Colleges were neither urged to adopt the system or reject it by officials of the convention. Each school can decide for itself the merits or disadvantages of the honor plan.

Two years ago agitation for its adoption at Idaho was started by a small group of students. A series of articles pointing out the main points of the system were printed in The Argonaut. 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
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


