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Alas! Poor California

SAD days have come for our neighbors across the bay. Traditions are going by the boards at the University of California. Freshmen there are showing a disinclination to wearing of "dinks", and, surprising though it may seem, they are daring to smoke and "queen" on the campus.

All this The Daily Californian points out in mournful terms as it urges the sophomore class on to bigger and better things in the matter of discipline. It must have been with real shame that California second-year men read, "If means are not taken at once to justify the sophomores in their weak enforcement, we can believe either of two things: that California's hardy sophomore athletes are not so hardy or the sophomore class is poorly led."

It was back about 1923 that Stanford decided its sophomores had something better to do than spend their time applying the water cure and similar treatments to those freshmen who did not approve of the campus-dictated style of frosh headwear and behavior. It was likewise thought that freshmen might have more important duties to attend to than that of acting as subject matter for the sophomore treatments and experiments.

So, freshmen hats were forgotten and freshmen discipline was abolished. Strangely, the University has managed to get along without these "traditions." Stanford Daily

Stanford is not the only school that has found that it can get along without a silly set of rules which dictate campus styles and manners for its underclassmen. Practically every large eastern institution has relegated these hangovers from barbarism to the ash heap where they belong.

It is about time for Idaho to decide that its lettermen have something more important to do than guide freshmen and others who do not approve of the campus dictated style. The lettermen don't want the job and they don't observe the traditions themselves but they can and will enforce them until the students relieve them of the task or start lopping off some of these customs which were imported while the university was young so that Idaho could keep up with other schools which about this time, were beginning to discard theirs.

When students at Idaho finally see the light and start throwing away traditions they will do well to cut the whole list which attempts to meddle with student dress. Aside from being irritating, these rules are extremely unnecessary. One doesn't have to look for a green hat to spot a freshman nor does one have to find a bareheaded person in cords to spot a senior—if his four years in college have done him any good.

THE special ASUI election to be held tomorrow will give those interested in student body affairs an opportunity to show their sincerity. Although, through lack of nominations, there will be no choice, it is the duty of every student to cast a ballot in order that those elected shall not be at the mercy of the disgruntled in the future.

After campus politics become more interesting, it is embarrassing to them to have a 319 vote cast up as argument that they did not deserve the office. The polls are open to all ASUI students. GIRLS PRACTICE HOUSE KEEPING

Girls Are Required to Manage House One Month

A 30-day examination testing their ability to cope with the many problems of home management is required of home economics students at the University of Idaho. They must spend a month at a completely equipped practice house before they can graduate.

These girls work in groups of three, with each group so organized that every phase of home management is undertaken during their stay. They alternate at the major tasks, such as ordering food, cooking and serving the meals and acting as housekeeper. During the last week the girls "solo" or have complete charge of the house for one day. For their last three days they perform all the duties as a group, thus learning cooperation as well as initiative.

and buy all the food, keeping the cost to 50 cents a person per day. This is the amount allotted by economists for American families with incomes from \$1500 to \$2000 a year. Each week from one to three guests are entertained. In addition each group gives one major social function, which may take the form of a dinner, tea, luncheon or breakfast.

A feature of the University of Idaho practice house is that it is conducted at the home of Miss Katherine Jensen, head of the home economics department. In this way, better acquaintance and understanding between the girls and the faculty are established, and a closer friendship between the graduating class and the head of the department results.
