DELTA TAU DELTA TO INSTALL GROUP THIS WEEK-END

Beta Chi Will Become Delta Mu of National Fraternity

Elaborate ceremonies will feature the installation of Beta Chi as Delta Mu chapter of the national fraternity of Delta Tau Delta this week-end. Installation proper will not commence until Saturday, but a formal dance will be held tonight at the Elks' temple. Novel lighting effects have been arranged especially for the affair. The installation ceremonies, starting Saturday morning at 9 o'clock in the Masonic hall, will be in charge of two teams. One is composed of alumni from Seattle, and the other is a team of active members from the University of Washington.

Officers Will Be Present. Executive members of Delta Tau Delta who will be present are Edwin P. Jones, Seattle, vice president of the western division; O. L. Ferris, Los Angeles, representative of Norman McCleod, president, who was not able to make the trip; and Robert C. Davanport, New York, traveling secretary. A large group of Delta Tau Delta's are expected from colleges in the neighboring states.

As a part of the installation program Saturday, a luncheon will be served at the Moscow hotel. That evening a formal banquet will be held at the hotel.

Speakers will include President M. G. Neale, representative of the faculty; Charles Graybill, representative of the student body; and Abe Goff, representative of the local business men. The toastmaster selected for the occasion is J. J. Sullivan, Seattle, who was a prominent Republican national committeeman at the last presidential election.

Reception Is Sunday. Sunday is the day scheduled for the reception of faculty members, students, and townspeople. It will be held in the afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock at the fraternity's home.

The installation of the new chapter of Delta Tau Delta will mark the initiation of 36 active members and 14 alumni. Dr. J. A. Kostalek and Dr. Carl von Ende will be among the latter group. Dean E. J. Idings is to be the chapter advisor.

The granting of a charter to Beta Chi by Delta Tau Delta ended a period of seven years' petitioning. It is the last local fraternity on the campus. Organized in 1924 with 23 members, it is now composed of 46 active members and pledges and has about 75 alumni. Beta Chi will make the 75th active chapter of Delta Tau Delta, and the eighth western chapter. The national was founded at Bethany college, West Virginia, in 1859. It has a total membership of about 25,000.

Many Delts Prominent. The names of many prominent men are on the rolls of Delta Tau Delta, numbering such persons as Alvin Duer, president of the national interfraternity council; Victor M. Cutter, president of the United Fruit company; Bishop William Manning; Branch Ricky, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals; Glenn Frank, president of the University of Wisconsin; Roy O. West, secretary of the interior under President Calvin Coolidge; and F. J. Kelly, former president of the University of Idaho.

the interest the students would take in the plans for religious education next year. Forty-two were present.

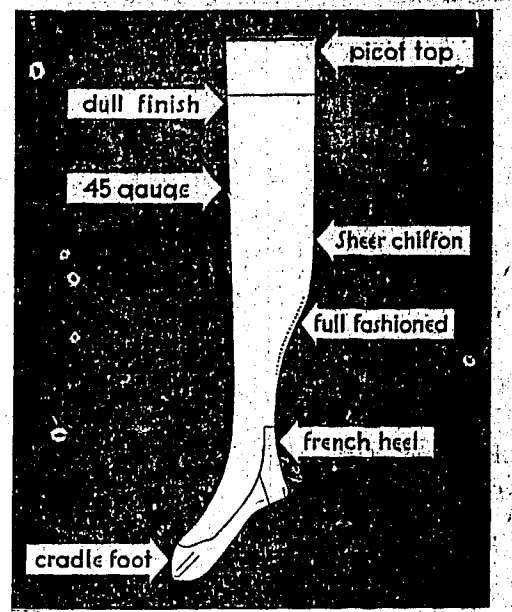

Will Hold First Water Carnival in University Tank Next Week

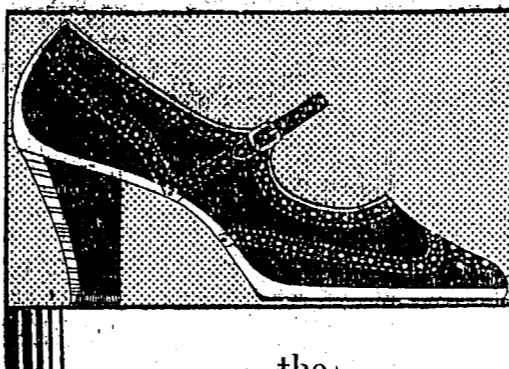

the Ad building. Clown Stunts. The carnival will consist primarily of demonstrations in life saving, clown stunts, and exhibition swimming.

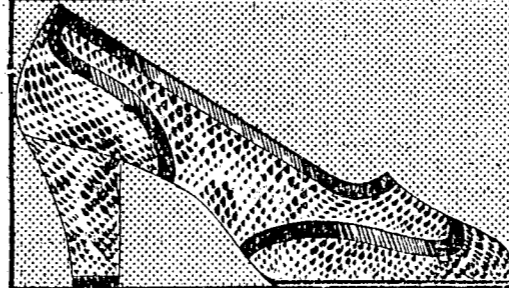

A million and a half dollars, the largest sum ever given in one lump to a college, has been donated to Carleton college by the General Education board of New York.



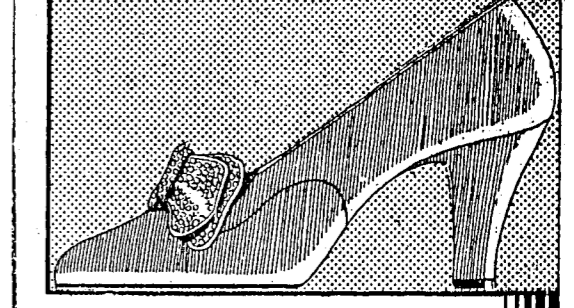

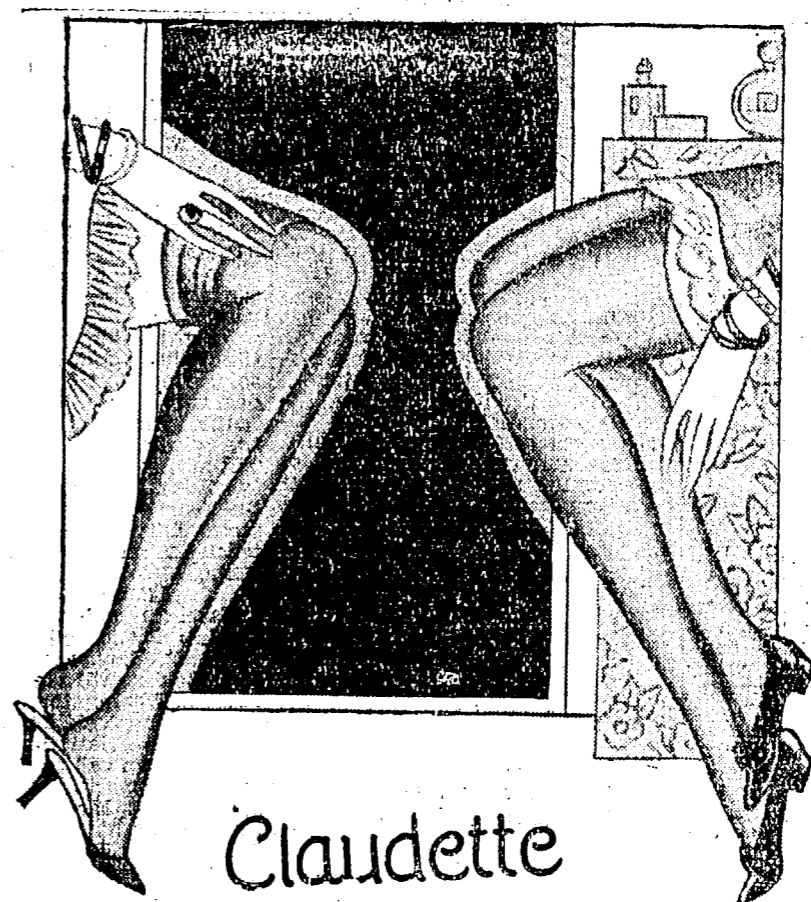
