Looks at the Pictures

FINN AND HATTIE is the story of "Mr. and Mrs. Haddock", characters of Donald Ogden Stewart's recent book, telling of their adventures abroad. Leon Errol and ZaSu Pitts portray the comical couple, and Mitzl Green is their most provoking youngster. Mitzl has been making rapid advances in the film world and does very fine work but at times, as in this picture, it borders on smart-aleckness. While on the continent, Mr. Haddock develops too much attention to a countess but is adequately dealt with by Mrs. Haddock.

DAYBREAK is a highly sophisticated drama adapted from a Viennese play by Arthur Schnitzler. Ramon Navarro and Helen Chandler have the leads. Jean Heisholt, William Blakewell, Glenn Tryon, and Captain George de Rielave complete the cast. In addition to acting, the latter gave valuable technical advice and drilled the actors in the innermost secrets of the Austrian drill manual in pre-war military ways.

JOE E. BROWN in "Going Wild" is the attraction now showing at the Vandal. He seems to have discovered a new method of learning to fly. He is a newspaper man who is mistaken for a famous author of an aeronautical story and is thereby practically forced to fly a plane in an air race. By rigging up a Murphy bed with ropes and the handle of a vacuum cleaner, he tries to learn enough to handle a plane. Laura Lee, Ona Munson, Lawrence Gray, and many stunt flyers aid in this comedy.

HELL'S ANGELS, Howard Hughes' four-million dollar air classic, is showing at the Vandal the first part of next week. While the company was on location at Oakland airport and in the midst of a sham battle consisting of fifty airplanes, two of the planes collided in mid-air. Both planes were crashed but the pilot of one reported to his parachute and made a safe landing and the other safely "rode" his plane to the ground with minor damage. Fortunately, the entire accident was caught by the camera, so that a real smash-up will be seen among those so carefully planned and executed.
