## STOUGH TEACHES PHOTO PROCESS

Ten Students Enrolled For Course in Photo Study.

Ten students are enrolled for a course in photographic technique under the instruction of Dr. H. B. Stough, head of the zoology department. Only ten students are enrolled due to the limited laboratory equipment. The equipment is adequate and gives the student practical experience in all lines of photographic technique. The class has one hour of lecture each week and three hours of laboratory.  
This is a one-year course, the

first semester being devoted to taking pictures, developing negatives, making prints, copying and making slides. The second semester will be devoted to orthochromatic study, photomicrography, and color technique.

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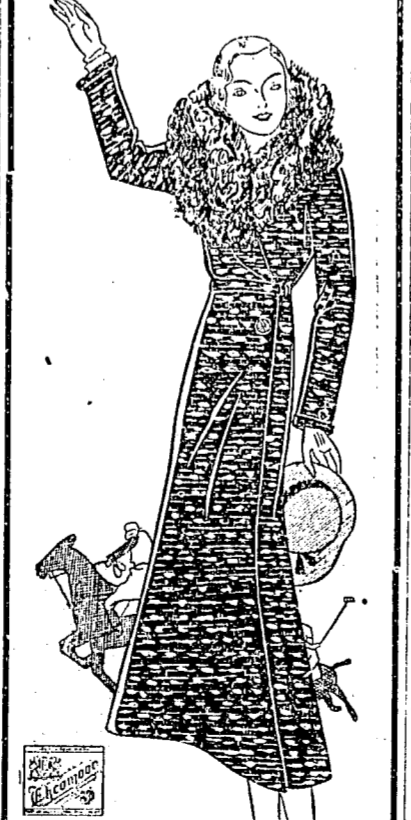
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
