Football alone showed a profit, though slightly less than for the year 1929. It contributed \$1,140,568 to the gross revenue of \$1,225,121 realized from all sports during the year.

MC BIRNEY RUNS **IDAHO'S AMATEUR RADIO STATION**

Operated During Two Years

Nestled in a remote corner of the building behind the engineering building, is Idaho's amateur radio station, For nearly two years students of the campus have been unaware that Harold McBirney, a junior in the electrical engineering school, has been operating this amateur station and communicating with various other short wave stations in the United States and Canada In order to operate a station it is necessary for one to have a station license, issued by the Federal Radio commission. McBirney is the only student on the campus who has one of these licenses and

is therefore the sole operator of W7UQ.

To be able to operate a station one must first obtain an operators' license, and then he may apply for a station operators' license. The main requirement for this license is that the applicant be able to send

and receive 10 words a minute. Amateur licenses are issued for a period of one year. At the termination of this period radio laws require that the operator either renew his license or have it cancelled. 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Cutting College Expenses

Stringent economy in regard to group house dances as being enforced at Whitman college is oil for the thinking apparatus of students in other schools. That the movement may be widespread is indicated by the recent announcement of President E. O. Holland of Washington State college, in which he gives 10 points, similar to those of Whitman, for reducing social expenses.

Cutting out all formals, limiting program dances, lowering the orchestra cost, and omitting the decorations and other small items seem, on the surface, quite the logical steps to take during present hard times. At Idaho -and the situation is no doubt the same at other schools-at least threefourths of the students have been effected to some extent by the depression. They are economizing in little ways which they would not feel necessary

But lowering expenses on a wholesale scale is something else. In many cases, the students themselves will suffer, either directly or indirectly, the violation.
