### Philippines Plan Christmas Gifts With Glee and Secrecy

With Christmas drawing near not only in this country but in numerous foreign countries throughout the world, Andres B. Bigornia has written the following essay for the Argonaut, on Christmas in the Philippines.

"There is a heart-throbbing current in the throngs of Christian people these gay days, as Christmas comes in. Life sparkles. Even strangers smile at each other with eyes that glow with happiness like bright candles in a window of the soul. All Christendom quickens with adequate Christmas spirit, a spirit that diffuses its warmth through every heart.

In the Philippines we look forward to Christmas with the same longing and anxiety as the children of Santa Claus in the Occidental countries. We don't hang our stockings by the chimney piece nor do we play in the snow. The thought uppermost in the minds of our folks at home these gay days is to attend the so-called Misa De Gallo, a 4 o'clock mass every day for nine days. In spite of the cold, chilly wind and the darkness and silence of the early moon, the people, especially the young men, stroll to the nearest church to attend the mass. After the mass and on their way home, the younger set take a walk around the moonlit streets, and awaken the lazy neighbors with their merry laughers provoked by the pokes of the smart live-wire young men. Nor do these happy young men forget to patronize the rice-cake and "poto seco" dealers. And while these gay people chat and eat on their way, somebody strums his guitar while another amateur-singer sings romantic songs, or plays the mandolin. This year, the writer is not sure whether our young men will use ukuleles or banjo-ukeles instead of the harp, appealing when played guitars for accompaniment of beautiful native songs.

Well-to-do and humble families build "Belens" representing the joyful scene of the nativity and adoration of the shepherds. Some people build them so carefully and beautifully that they become talk and object of many surprise visits.

#### Day of Happiness.

On the day before Christmas, e. i. December 24, all the people seem to be bent upon a common errand. Everybody puts aside his or her tedious daily piece of work and tries to forget all about it. They are just intoxicated with expectation. They don't mind the jostling crowds. In every family the wraths of jealousy and selfishness vanish as if by magic. Mothers and Father are planning the children with Christmas—with savings acquired through self-denials and actual sacrifices. Everybody plans gifts for their beloved ones in glee and secrecy. Even the little children count out the cents from their coconut shells or tin Aljancias (Banks). And while everybody plans and counts, every body too, forgets the many small sacrifices they made. Giving: That is Christmas. Not the glittering tinsel, the gayety and merry-making alone. For such are only ripples on the surface. Deep beneath is the stirring of the benign spirit of self-sacrifice and giving.

#### Food is Plentiful.

All enjoy the diversions and pleasures of the day. Talk of "eats." Why, there are the finger-burning "lechons" (roasted-pigs), poto-seco rice-cakes, Chinese ham from friend Chiquito, apples, Chinese pomegranates, grapes, choice wines and oh, a lot of other savory and mouth-watering provoking eatables. Evidently stomachs like pockets and purses of god-father-ous also with space. Kisses, tines and friends seem to be god-mothers, uncles and all relations, and sunny smiles overflow during Christmas time. Bands parade before big houses and make a swell havoc of cigars, cigarettes, wines, peso bills, and even free cholesuppers.

#### Churches Carry Part.

Late in the night the churches bells toll forth their happy tidings. Everybody in their best attire this year perhaps Oxford balloon and Hollywood fashions included, walk toward the church to hear the midnight mass. The churches at this occasion are luxuriantly decked with the best ornaments, flowers and glittering lights. God's temples are crowded to the innermost corner with rich and poor happy people together. At half-past eleven, the mass is begun and a soft strain of music steals from the church's choir, the priest pronounces "Gloria in Excelsis Deo" which is repeated "fortissimo" by musical instruments and accompanied with sweet voices of charming ladies. The organs also emit forth resonant hymns and Christmas carols which appeal to the heart strings of everybody with reverence to God Almighty. After the solemn mass, the brass bands deafen the church with its brilliant and confusion lively music. That is how, when Christmas comes in the Philippines.

### TO SUBMIT REPORT LATE IN JANUARY

#### Will Vote on Recommended Changes in Handbook Constitution

Recommendations for changes in the Freshman handbook and ASU constitution have been coming in such large numbers that it will be impossible to submit a report to a general assembly until the second or third week in January, according to Lionel Campbell. The recommendations are read and written by members of a committee of the executive board. The report is then read before the executive board for its approval before it is read to the student body. Voting for the changes will be held sometime in February. Lionel Campbell again urges that students send in their reports and comments before December 18. He wishes to eliminate disputes on the matter for good. The awarding of sweaters will probably not be given at this assembly as Coach Calland will be in San Francisco. Organizations are urged to bring forward any awards they may have whether the sweaters are awarded now or later.

### STUDENTS WORK OUT EDUCATION

#### College Runs Farm, Two Factories and Print Shop.

Working one's way through college is by no means a new story, but paying one's tuition with cows, hogs, chickens, eggs and almost everything else in the way of farm produce, except corn "kicker" is something new. The college where this is possible is the College of the Ozarks, at Clarksville, Ark. It has to observe a wide latitude in the matter of tuition because its students are the mountaineers of the Ozark whom both modern civilization and prosperity have overlooked. To the College of the Ozarks come girls in homespun, homemade dresses and underwear made of four sacks and young men in garments of equal oddity. Many of them see their first "store clothes" in the event that they make the debating team or some other team that takes them out to the wide and foreign world. They are intelligent, ambitious, athletic, with a gift for music and a burning passion for knowledge. Teachers find it satisfying to work for a lower salary at this little college and have students that are really students.

But a remarkable fact is that, though the college charges only \$325 a year for tuition, board, room and everything else, 85 per cent of its students cannot pay even that low figure and must work out their education. To permit them to do this, the college runs a farm, a canning factory, a dairy, a garment factory and a print shop, and, in addition, the students do all the work connected with the institution. On its 130-acre farm from fifteen to twenty students find employment. From twenty to forty girls work in the garment factory, which turns out "Ozark Maid" garments for city folk.

This summer, the students canned 3,500 gallons of peaches for the college's use throughout the winter. The students cook and make meals, do all janitor service, all work connected with the campus and all common labor in connection with the erection of buildings.

#### DISCUSS POLITICS OVER BERLIN RADIO

Once a month the Berlin broadcasting station organizes a series of discussion by students, which University of Berlin of different are led by professors from the University of Berlin of different political opinion. The representatives of the different political student groups are asked to come and discuss very frankly political topics chosen beforehand by students and professors. The idea of confronting in discussion two students of opposite political opinion has proved excellent, achieving a very clear and logical development of the two standpoints. The professor leading the discussion takes part in it only to the extent of saying some impartial words of introduction and conclusion, and of keeping it on the original subject.

#### DISCOVER PROBABLE

Discovery of a phenomenon by two medical scientists at Columbia university may eventually lead to a powerful preventive against infantile paralysis. The scientists—Dr. Claus W. Jungeblut and Dr. Earl T. Erzie— injected extracts from the anterior pituitary glands of sheep and rats into immature monkeys of an age similar to the juvenile period when human children are most susceptible to the scourge. Then they inoculated the monkeys with a strong dose of infantile paralysis virus from human beings.

#### DAIRY MEN CONVENE

P. I. P. A.—The fifth annual State College of Washington institute of dairymen is being planned for February 15-20, 1932. Cooperation will be the Washington State department of agriculture through Dr. Robert Prier and his state dairy inspectors and the Institute Alumni association, headed by Mr. George Wilson, production manager of the Kristeverson dairy, Seattle. This educational conference is for experienced men in the dairy industry of the Pacific Northwest.

### LACK OF INTEREST KILLS SKI PLANS

#### May Have Trail If Enough Students Show Desire.

Since there was too little interest manifested by the students in winter sports, the idea of awarding cups to the two best cross-country swimmers has been abandoned. Dr. E. E. Hubert, a great winter sports enthusiast on the campus, considered laying out a cross-country course, starting near the Memorial gymnasium, and circling three miles over hills, ditches, and fences, and ending on the football field after a jump or a steep slide through the arboretum. However, if enough students will co-operate in promoting this ski trail, Idaho may yet have a real cross-country trail, and the races may materialize, according to the first plans. The out-of-state students seem to be the only ones interested in winter sports. There are several expert skiers registered this year at the university, but without the proper facilities for skiing they cannot demonstrate their skill. The ski jump on Moscow mountain and the trails through the arboretum and on the various foothills around Moscow have been very popular for skiing so far this winter.

### MINNESOTA HAS DATING BUREAU

#### Furnishes 200 Men With Dates During Convention.

When members of Sigma Delta Chi, national professional journalistic fraternity, met on the campus of the University of Minnesota, they were afforded the services of what was claimed to be the first efficient and successful date bureau ever formed here.

The bureau was organized by Theta Sigma Phi, and Coranto, journalistic sororities, which saw to it that sufficient "dates" were provided for each of the 200 delegates to the annual Sigma Delta Chi convention. Prominent members of the United States attended the national convocation.

P. I. P. A.—Word comes from Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette, that the University Board of Trustees has definitely decided to carry out the year's program as provided in the budget—no salary cuts, no curtailments of regular expenditures despite the general current economic reversal.

### SPORT SHOP

Little can be said concerning Idaho's series with Whitman this week-end, either now or after the game. Although the outcome of the Missionaries tilt with W. S. C. last night gives some indication of their strength, "Big" Borleske, like other coaches, will doubtless be trying out his new men. Whitman has several back from last year's Northwest conference championship team, including "Buddy" Applegate. Last year Idaho took two out of three pre-season tilt. Win or lose, Coach "Rick" Fox will accomplish the purpose of the Walla Walla trip, namely, to give his men plenty of experience in fast competition before the conference season opens.

Fox has cut his squad to eleven men for the trip, but the list is by no means permanent. As fast as players show the goods, they will replace the slower members on the traveling squad. About a dozen men are planning to stay in Moscow over the holidays for some intensive workouts. Fox has in store for them. They engage Montana at Missoula on the 25th and 30th, and play a return engagement here January 2. During that time there will be a hot race between the three Vandal pivot men for the starting line-up. So far, Ed Hurley seems to be playing the smarter ball, and will probably get the call, but Fox will need the height of Grenier and Parks this year against most of the conference centers. Both are developing rapidly, and before long can be counted on to hold their own with any of the big boys.

When students return from their vacations a glistering skating rink will be ready for use. So many have expressed their desire for skating facilities that university authorities have committed to flood the tennis courts as was done last year. Washington State hockey team has challenged the Idaho skaters to a game. With all the talent on the Idaho campus, there is little reason why a new sport should not be inaugurated here to share the sporting interest with basketball during the winter.

After many weeks lay-off from intramural competition, several sports will begin in earnest immediately after the holidays, according to manager John Thomas. Lack of playing space has necessitated the postponement of several indoor events. Idaho has comparatively few sports in which intramural fans may compete. Most of the other colleges hold tournaments in everything from auction bridge to bowling. There are several sports that Idaho might well add to the intramural program to keep interest alive during the winter months.

The addition of "Irish" Martin to the western line-up in the shrine east-west game on New Year's day completes a list of twenty-two stars to represent the section of the country west of the Mississippi. At present, Martin is living at the infirmary in an attempt to get over a bad cold before leaving for California to enter training with the all-stars. He received notice to report at San Francisco not later than December 21. In the eight practice days that follow, the Westerners will be devoting their time to learning Coach Percy Lacey's Olympic club system. Coach Dana X. Bible of Nebraska picked the players east of the Rockies to play in the charity game, and will help Lacey coach the western team.


