

'Irish' Martin Concludes Brilliant Football Career

Elmer "Irish" Martin, Idaho's representative in the Shrine East-West game New Year's day, returned to the campus last Tuesday beaming with stories of good time, and admiration for friendly spirit that was extended to the football players during their stay in San Francisco.

"The most wonderful experience of my life," was his report. "The people of San Francisco, Berkeley and Oakland did everything that could be imagined for us."

Met at Train
Upon arriving in San Francisco on December 22, the players were met at the train by a caravan of Packard and Cadillac sport cars upon which were printed their names. Two men to a car, they proceeded up the main streets of the town to the city hall, where they were officially greeted by Mayor Rossi. From that moment on, the entire city of San Francisco was turned over to the players by the Mayor and the Chief of Police. Taxi service was available for them at all times, and every entertainment house in the city was put at their disposal. Beautiful leather jackets presented by the Shrine committee served as passes.

The next day, work started in earnest for the big game. Practice was held from 10 to 12 in the morning, and from 2 to 5 in the afternoon. Although the hours were long, filled with plenty of hard work, "Irish" reported it a pleasure to train under such fine coaches as Percy Looney of the Olympic club and Dana X. Bible of Nebraska. "Two as fine gentlemen as ever lived," he stated.

Present Gifts
On Christmas day, every player was presented with a wrist-watch from the Shrine committee, a miniature gold football from a Berkeley jeweler, and for the Western boys, a white wool sweater with a lettered football emblem on them. Headquarters for the team were at the St. Francis hotel in San Francisco, during the time they were working out in the Berkeley stadium, they stayed at the Hotel Grant. When not practicing and sleeping, "Irish" spent most of his time having a good time and meeting old Idaho friends, among them "Spec" Diehl, who was playing for the Olympic Club, "Chuck" Diehl, who has been in professional football, Jimmie Rafter, and Waldemar Pederson, all of past Idaho gridiron history. He also came across Bill Hurley and Elmer Schwartz of W. S. C. against whom he played in collegiate football. He also reported seeing many other Idaho alumni among them an old school day sweetheart. Special features of the entertainment afforded the players was a visit to the Shrine hospital, beneficency of the \$25,000 gate receipts of the game, and a trip to a radio station, where Irish was among those chosen to "say a few words please."

"Irish" failed to make the starting line-up on the day of the game, but soon replaced Hurley of W. S. C., and played the rest of the game, three quarters. He reported it great fun playing against such players as Miller of Purdue, Orsi of Colgate, and Russell and Marvill of Northwestern. Outstanding players on the West's line-up according to Irish were Johnson of the Haskell Indians, Beaken of the Olympic club, Toscani of St. Mary's, and his side-partner, "Turk" Edwards of W. S. C.

The final and probably the most memorable event of the entire trip was a great banquet at the St. Francis Hotel. Music by the Lofner-Harris orchestra, a bounteous feast and a friendly spirit combined to make the event long to be remembered. Everyone had a chance to meet everybody else, and a general "bull-fest" among all-stars and all Americans ended the evening.

The trip was the climax of a long and illustrious career for Martin and the realization of a long hidden ambition.

Coach Jimmy Foster's quintet from Sandpoint will go into action against the Coeur d'Alene Vikings, Saturday night, in the first conference game for each quintete. The Vikings are favored to win, but no odds are being given. Coeur d'Alene has a record of 65 consecutive wins over northern Idaho teams, and last week swamped North Central high school 31 to 21. They also have edged Harrison and Endicott to their list. Foster's men have played five games, winning all of them.

In the Coeur d'Alene the Endicott team that almost beat the Vikings, 26-27, suffered a bad defeat from Mullan. Wallace broke the Kellogg jinx last Saturday by journeying to that city and winning their first game in nine years on a Kellogg floor. At the present none of the teams have any edge in the odds.

Lewiston and Moscow in the North Central district have developed strong teams. Syb Klefner's boys, playing in the banana belt, have won all their games. Wednesday night, the Bengals took the fast Winchester team to a score of 30-18. Malerich and Haynes at forward, Brown at center, and Brett and Kohl at guard make a combination that will be hard for Gale Mix's Moscow Bears to beat. I am anxious to see that tall flashy guard in action. Brett is a three year letterman and has been steadily improving.

Moscow stepped out and added one more victory to its string of five by defeating Elk River 50-8, Wednesday night. The Bears are not independent as in previous years but have to play in the White Pine district. Lewiston and Moscow will play their first game on February 3 at Lewiston.

GRABNER BOOSTS ATHLETIC STOCK AT HIGH SCHOOL

Former Idaho Baseball Star Very Successful Coach At Winchester

Basketball stock at Winchester high school has gone up 100 per cent since Floren "Lefty" Grabner, former varsity baseball letterman, raised their team from traditional doormats to prairie conference champions for the past two years. The Loggers, under Grabner's tutelage, have lost only two conference games. Playing six games in three days, his team won the runner-up cup in the central Idaho district tournament at Lewiston last spring, losing the final to Lewiston in an overtime contest. Along with directing athletics, Grabner teaches mathematics, science, and commercial courses in the school, according to reports from Winchester.

While at Idaho "Lefty" was a pitcher on the varsity baseball team, earning letters in '28 and '29. Besides being awarded the Erb scholarship cup in 1929, he was a member of Kappa Delta Pi and was a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon.

Vandal Five To Meet Oregon Squad in Two Game Series

With five wins out of seven starts to their credit, three wins from Montana and one from Ellensburg Normal and Whitman, Coach "Rich" Fox's hoopmen are ready to open up in "big time" when they meet the Oregon Webfeet in a two-game series tonight and tomorrow night. The conference openers will be played here in the Memorial gymnasium and the students will get their first chance to see the 1931 Vandal machine in action against some stiff competition.

Good Possibilities.
So far this year the Vandal five has shown great possibilities of developing into the best club seen on the Idaho

court for a number of years. They split a pair of season openers with the Ellensburg team and duplicated the following week against Nig Borleske's Walla Walla troupe. After the first game with Montana the men started hitting their stride and showed signs of a high-scoring outfit. Stanton Hale, regular guard for two seasons, is still lost to the

squad through a bad side injury and will not be in suit for some time yet. However, the return of Pete Wicks, veteran at the forward berth, and non-scoring ace, bolstered the Vandal stock considerably and will keep the Webfoot guards on their toes full time each night.

Expect Fast Play.
Coach Billy Reinhart, tutor of the Oregon men, has developed a smart ball club out of the material at Eugene, and is bringing a squad of men here who are out to cop a Northwest championship ribbon. The Oregon team hit their pre-season games with a bang, and as dope has it, will furnish two good fast ball games to the Idaho fans this week-end. Idaho and Oregon won over Ellensburg by nearly the same margin.

Grenier at Center.
Mentor Fox is still experimenting with his material trying to locate the smoothest working combination. In the Montana series Howard Grenier showed that he had the stuff that was needed for the pivot position and is almost a sure bet to enter the Oregon contest in that place. Barrett and Herman have both been hitting a good pace in scrimmages this week and will get plenty of work at the forward berths. Nelson and Lacy have also been doing overtime work

and are sure bets to see some action when scores are needed. The guards will probably be Bill Hall and Pete Wicks. Or, Wicks may take a forward berth and one of the others moved down to his guard position. There are four men on the squad who ably fit into either a guard or forward position. These men, Herman, Geraghty, Wicks, and Nelson are all fast, clever floor-workers and close guards.

Whitman Here Monday.
Monday night the Whitman team will journey to Moscow to return the visit paid them by the Vandals during the holidays. The slate between the two teams is now one up so there is no doubt but that there will be some "playing for blood" on the part of both teams to win the decision.

SPORT SHOP

Turn out early if you want to get a seat for the game tonight. Practically everybody for several reasons is planning to see Idaho open hostilities with the Webfeet. It will be as interesting a game as will be seen on the home floor this year. One is that Oregon and Idaho use the same style of attack—a quick breaking game that furnishes plenty of action. There will be none of the set formation play that W. S. C. is using this year. The caliber and height of the players on both squads is about the same, although Idaho has more veterans. Calkins, forward, Levoff, guard, and Roberts, center, are the lettermen on this year's Webfoot five. The other forward position will be held by Watts. Coach Rinehart has been working Robertson, a lanky sophomore in the remaining guard post.

Coach "Rich" Fox has stressed guarding lately, especially with his centers. A potential "dark horse" has loomed on the Oregon squad in the person of Roberts, a center who seems to have found himself this year. In a recent game with Pacific university which Oregon won 68 to 12, Roberts, "Cap" they call him, turned in the star performance with 26 points to his credit. In an attempt to divert attention from him so that other teams would not figure him to be a dangerous man, the Oregon scorers credited him with about half of his tallies, and so the report went to most of the newspapers. One Oregon paper was not in on the secret of keeping this "light hid under a bushel" and accidentally printed the proper distribution of the points. The whole incident has caused many smiles, but opposing coaches will not now be caught sleeping. Whether he is all he is talked up to be will be discovered tonight when he faces Grenier. Although the Vandal center has the reach on the Oregon boy, it will be a good fight to watch.

The Spokane Chronicle recently carried an article concerning a major disaster on the professional gridiron last fall that concerns two of Idaho's football heroes of years past. "Johnny Vesser, who played end at Idaho under Bob Matthews, and Chuck Diehl, another big lineman from Idaho, were working out early this fall with the Chicago Cardinals. The linemen were practicing going down under punts. Diehl raced down the field, did his job, and then started walking back slowly. Vesser came racing down the field under a high spiral. Sock! He ran head-on into Diehl, and fell to the ground. They carried Vesser off with one leg broken

en above the knee, and his football was all over for the year."

In spite of the abnormal height of Parks and Grenier, the Vandal centers, no one can say that they are out of proportion. Recent inquiries led to the discovery that both of these boys possess pedal appendages that would do credit to a young dinosaur. Grenier wears a No. 11½ shoe, while Parks' foot calls for No. 12.

Oregon State and Washington also start their conference seasons tonight, at Seattle. Dope points toward another conference title for the Huskies. It is interesting to note that their coach, "Hee" Edmundson, is a product of the University of Idaho, having been a great athlete on the track and basketball teams, and holder of the northwest conference half-mile record. Later he returned to Idaho as a coach and for two years a graduate manager. Since he has been coach at Washington, he has turned out five conference championship teams, and many high rating teams. This year he is aiming toward his fifth consecutive championship.

"A promising outlook for Idaho" is the opinion of Harold Stowell, concerning the Vandal's chances on the maple court this season. He should know, for he worked out with the squad early in the season, and has been keeping an eye on the team during the practice sessions all winter. Incidentally, Stowell was a stellar forward on the Idaho teams of 1929, '29, and '30, and co-holder of the all-time Pacific Coast high-scoring record. Stowell feels that potentially, Idaho has a strong team as any in the conference. Although the Vandals have nine lettermen on the squad, most of them are comparatively green, and

lack of experience will be the only as a pretty fair basis for judging what Idaho's chances will be this year," he said. "Although Oregon lacks a veteran team, they have always been strong, but things look bright for Idaho at present."
