Al Cabone's offer made to Arthur Brisbane to find the missing Lindbergh baby, were he granted temporary liberty from the prison herm he is now serving, is indeed a "generous" offer on the part of the famous gang chieftain, but an offer the acceptance of which would establish a dangerous precedent in American criminal procedure and would admit the inability of our police system to cope with this and similar situations of crime

There is little doubt that Capone is qualified to ferret out the Lindbergh kidnappers if any other single person is. Before his recent conviction, and for that matter even since his incarteration. Capone headed one of the most gigantic underworld organizations civilization has ever known. Although it is highly probable that the abductors of the Lindbergh child are not members of his gangs, he has allies in all parts of the country who know the underworld and are best qualified to search its hiding places.

But to let Capone out of prison, even with perfect assurance of his return when the child is located, is another story. He was sent to prison for income tax évasion, a rather minor charge when compared with his other nefarious activities; the sentence met general public approval, and he should be shown no leniency in the execution of the sentence.

Undoubtedly the services of Capone will not be solicited by government officials in the search for the child. Such a request from our government would be an obvious admission of failure. It would accentuate egotism and confidence: it would be the first step in an official recognition of a value in the underworld; it would be a psychological stimulus to organized crime.-Purdue Exponent.
