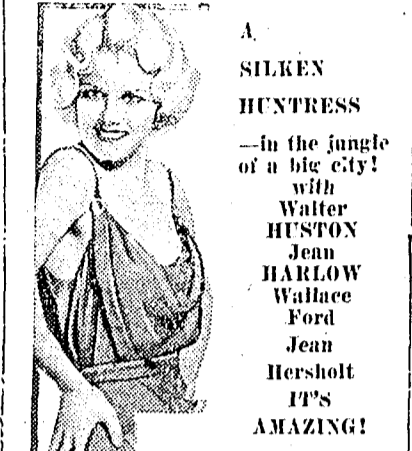

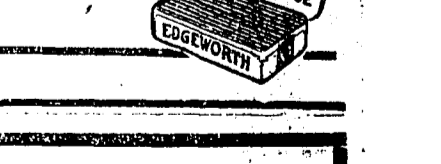

PLAN FOR THIRD PARTY ISSUED

P. I. P. A., New York.—In anticipation of the stormiest election since 1912 a four-year presidential plan issued today by the League for Independent Political Action headed by Dr. John Dewey makes an open bid for a united third party.

More than one hundred economists, political and labor leaders, social welfare workers and agrarian experts from all parts of the nation, singly and in conference prepared by the League a wide range to domestic and international affairs and demands progressive legislation on unemployment relief, tariffs, prohibition, public utilities, taxation and other major issues.

"Only a new party can restore the agencies of government to the service of the people. Such a party will take the first steps in a far sighted plan to build a new social order with stability of work, security of income, and a higher standard of living for all wage and salary earners through increased purchasing power.

"The bankruptcy of the old parties is a challenge to the courage and the intelligence of every American citizen who has not lost faith in democracy and who desires public and not private ownership of the government. This third party will recruit its strength from the ranks of workers, farmers, professional people, small merchants and those numerous other progressives who believe in a socially planned economy."

Receive Instruction in Operation of Caterpillar.
