Rated as a "dark horse" at the outset, the Vandals have been thorns in the sides of every pennant contender in the conference.

The Cougars of Washington State, rated as likely champions at the start of the season, were practically eliminated from the title chase when Idaho dropped them 40 to 20 on January 21. The Cougars had "looked better" against earlier common foes than had Idaho, but they went under by a de-

Slats Gill's Oregon State Beavers, present leaders, had extreme difficulty in winning a pair of games from the Vandals on the home court at the start of the season. When they entertained Idaho at Corvallis last week, the Orangement sailed through to an easy 46-26 win the first night.

In the second game the Vandals came back to wallop Oregon State 30 to 26, surprising them out of their young lives as well as out of first place in the northern divisions that they had gone into the hands of they commissioner of finance of the bank. 

WASHINGTON FIVE GRABS 36-35 WIN IN FINAL SECONDS

Antoncich Sinks Freak Basket for Wiining Play; Nelson Stars
