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The Band on a Good Will Tour

The Pep band, as a result of the executive board's action last Tuesday night, will take a 10-day trip throughout the state publicizing the university. Though no definite moves have been made by the band since receiving word that its petition was passed, it is quite probable that the trip will be made shortly after the Pep band show which is scheduled for March 22 and 23.

The executive board, willing to approve an advertising trip by some university organization was faced with a somewhat grave situation—that of choosing between the Vandaleers and the Pep Band. After a somewhat lengthy discussion, the Pep band was awarded the trip.

Members of the band contemplate being on the road about 10 days contacting prospective university students, athletes, and families of prospective students. The band should do a good job—a better one than the Vandaleers could, with all due respect to the latter. The principal reason is that its appeal will be wider. Presenting the typical collegiate music, light band arrangements, and the heavier classical type in the formal concert, an appeal will undoubtedly be sounded to every type of person needed to be contacted.

Tentative plans are to play before the student bodies of all important high schools in the state in a general assembly. The Pep band show changed slightly from the way it will be given before the students here in March, will be given in all of the towns where it is thought profitable. Students and families then will be presented with all types of music. Thinking it unwise to capitalize on the university's name in the form of dances, the band will rely solely on its concerts for monetary gain to aid the student body in financing the trip.

The last trip of this sort made by the band was in the spring of '30. The Vandaleers made a similar tour in '31. Last fall the band went as far as Twin Falls on its Thanksgiving trip, being in that section of the country because of the Idaho-Utah Aggies game in Boise. In the fall of '31 the Vandaleers travelled over North Idaho. Now the Pep band will re-cover its 1933 territory continuing through the southeastern section of the state hitting Ricks college, the Southern Branch, Idaho Falls, and possibly taking a northern turn to wind up in Wallace, Kellogg, Coeur d'Alene and Spokane.

The trip should do the university a world of good, and if the proposed project to be undertaken jointly by all the service organizations on the campus is carried out, an additional man will be sent along to speak to the students concerning Idaho's educational advantages, athletics, and campus life.

Good luck, band. The student body is entrusting in you the task of bringing more students to the University of Idaho.

Livingston Irving, a graduate of the University of California, says in a story in The Daily Californian: "I sincerely agree with the judgment of my superior officer, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in putting airmail flying under army control. Taking the airmail contracts away from the big aviation companies will loosen the stranglehold of these monopolies on the industry and will advance it by giving the little fellows a chance to expand."

Irving should know whereof he speaks because he is a lieutenant-colonel in the air corps reserves. He was one of the first 20 finished flyers from the university ground school to be sent overseas, and was one of the two first flyers trained to engage in actual pursuit flying.

Concerning the action of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, his fellow officer in the army air corps reserves, in remonstrating with President Roosevelt over contract cancellation, he refused to give any personal opinion.

The feeling common among commercial and army pilots, he admitted, is that the "Lone Eagle," while a smart flyer, is a very much



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over-rated young man, who has stepped out of his place in this matter.



NORMAL STUDENT ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

LEWISTON. — William Irving, 27, a popular state normal school senior here, attempted to commit suicide at 4:45 p. m. today, when he shot himself with a .45 calibre Colt revolver, through the right temple, in front of St. Joseph's hospital.

He is a son of George Irving of Bonners Ferry, Idaho. He stopped school in January and went home, but returned here two days ago.

Dr. E. G. Braddock, who removed the bullet, which shattered the skull and penetrated the brain, reported tonight that the victim had but a slight chance to recover.

Minor Sports Carnival Staged Here Tomorrow

Vandal Swimmers, Wrestlers, and Fencers Open Fire Against Washington State Athletes in First Test of Season

A minor sports carnival with Washington State college swimmers, fencers, and wrestlers will be held in the Memorial gymnasium tomorrow. Approximately 30 men from each university will take part in the all-day meet.

The swimming events, which will be held at 2 o'clock, will be the first activity of the Idaho swimming team this year. The Idaho entries in each event are: 100 yards, Bill Woods, John Morse; 50 yards, Bob Spence, Gus Dahlke; backstroke, Bob Herman, Wilbur Schroeder; breaststroke, Marvin Marshall; dives, Alec Morgan and Wes Shurtliff; 200 yards, Ellis Airola. Most of the team are without previous varsity experience, but have been working out under the tutelage of Harry Jacoby, who will be in charge of the meet.

FENCERS MEET ON ROUND ROBIN SCHEDULE

The fencing matches will be held on a round robin schedule whereby each man of the five-man teams will meet every man on the opposing team. As this will mean a large number of matches, the majority of them will be held in the morning, starting at 10 o'clock. Coach Fred Blanchard has picked these five men to compete: Bob Harris, Ray Weston, Hugo Kraemer, Morey Miller, and Frank Beyington. Harris is the only man on the team who has had previous experience. Immediately upon completion of the swimming events in the afternoon, the final eight fencing matches will be held on the basketball floor of the gymnasium.

Fencing gained much popularity here last year during the Washington State college and University of Washington matches, and Coach Blanchard expects that the afternoon matches will draw many students. The best matches will be held in the afternoon because of this.

VANDAL BONE-CRUSHERS HAVE GOOD PROSPECTS

Captain Stan Skiles will enter 30 men in the wrestling events. For the first time in two years, Idaho will present a full team with a man in every weight division. Skiles reports that 30 men have been turning out for wrestling, and 15 of these have been working hard every night.

"W. S. C. will have to send over a stronger team than the one that defeated us last year," declared Skiles. "Our team is the best in some time, and Washington State will have to provide real opposition to prevent us from winning."

The wrestling events will begin at 3:15. The Idaho team and the weight divisions in which they will wrestle are: 125 pounds, Kermit Woodward; 135 pounds, Stan Skiles; 145 pounds, Earl Eggers; 155 pounds, Ron Wilson; 165 pounds, Earl Leatham; 175 pounds, Paul Berg; 210 pounds, Jack Barbee. Barbee is the first heavy-weight wrestler the team has had for some time.

A return wrestling match with the Cougar mat men will be held in Pullman on March 3.

Lindley Hall Athletes Lead Intramural Race

In the intramural sports race Lindley hall of the B league is the undisputed leader with a total of 428 points. Phi Gamma Delta of B league is second with 211 points. The other awards are as follows: B league—Delta Chi, 202 points; Phi Delta Theta, 103 points; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 27½ points; Sigma Chi, 16½ points; Beta Theta Pi, 4 points; and the Kappa Sigma, 3 points. The Chi Alpha PIs has a minus 25 as a result of a non-entry in boxing.

House of David Quintet Specializes in Pleasing Large Crowds

University of Idaho's Vandal basketball team will take time off from the conference northern division campaign tonight to meet the famous House of David traveling basketball team at Moscow Friday night, February 24. The game with Idaho will be the only appearance of the colorful be-whiskered ball team in this vicinity this season.

The House of David basketeers

come to Moscow with the excellent record of only seven defeats in 60-odd games this winter. The bearded five are making their second western tour, meeting all comers in college and independent basketball circles, and have played to crowds double and triple the attendance of a year ago when they were comparatively unknown in this region.

Trick Artists
In addition to their string of victories, the bearded cage artists are noted for their fancy exhibitions and crowd pleasing stunts wherever they play. Buck Buchanan, the floor leader, is declared to be

the greatest ball handler in the entire country and every man on the team is a clever passer and a trick shot. Essentially showmen, the David team features comedy and weird antics on the floor while playing winning basketball at the same time. 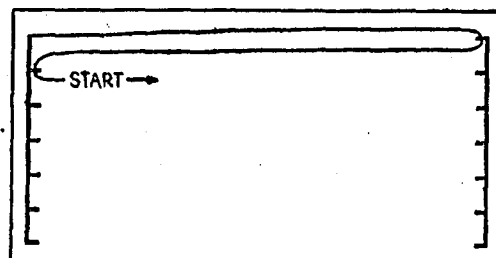

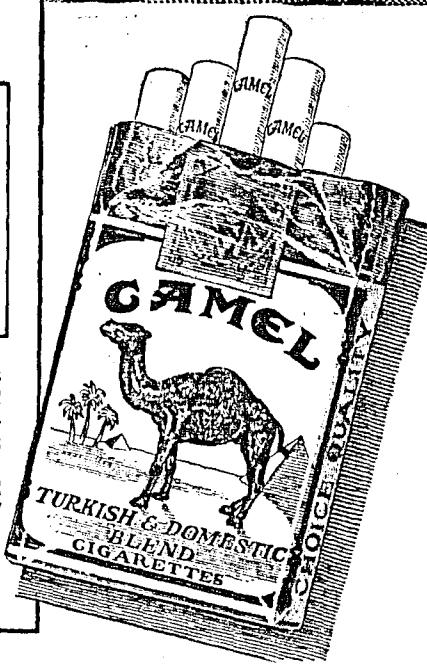
