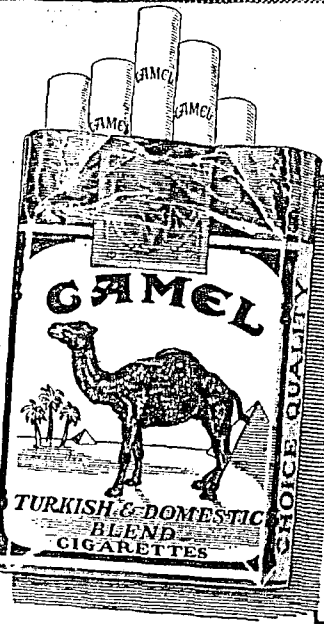

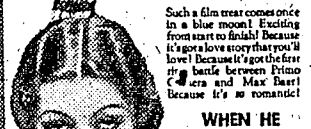

Vandals Tangle With Erb Hardware Team

Foxmen To Play Ball Club From Lewiston Saturday in Big Double Header; Boys Look Good

Idaho's Vandals versus frying pan and fishing tackle salesmen! The Erb Hardware club of Lewiston, consisting of well known and experienced Inland Empire horsehide artists, will stride out on the Idaho varsity playing field tomorrow for a brace of games with Rich Fox's boys, the first game scheduled to go seven innings and the second till nine.

That the pot and pan lads will be no set-up is evident by the fact that they have trimmed the Lewiston Normal outfit already this spring, as well as several town outfits from around the Lewiston district. On the mound for them will be Mays and Lawrence, both experienced chuckers. Mays has gained a reputation for winning games which will clash with the hard-hitting rep being built up by the Idaho nine. Lawrence, a former Vandal pitcher, spells Mays when necessary, as well as filling in at other positions when needed.

Brubaker and Newton.

"Newton and Brubaker will again handle the pitching assignment for Idaho," announced Coach Fox. "Both showed lots of possibilities in the last Lewiston doubleheader. Part of our club will be gone Saturday and with a limited number of players some of the younger member of the squad will get a chance to show their stuff."

Naslund, sophomore chucker on Fox's club, will hold down the first base sack Saturday and is slated to take the mound against Whitman next week. Barney Anderson and Wes Shurtliff are still taking turns at third base and at present their race for first string third sacker appears to be a dead heat.

Saturday's contests come near the tail-end of one of the longest pre-conference season schedule Idaho has ever had. The two with Erb Hardware and those with Whitman early next week will make a total of fourteen pre-season games. So far the Vandals have taken eight out of ten.

Whitman Plays

On Monday and Tuesday Nig Borleske's Whitman Missionaries finish their series with Idaho. So far the Moscow team has won four out of six and is determined to make it six out of eight. The boys figure Whitman copped their two games when they were already in Idaho's bag, and this time they promise that the bag will be drawn a little tighter.

Fresh from a series with Washington State, the Walla Walla club is playing sparkling ball, having blanked the Cougars three to nothing in one of their games. Cristola, Missionary hurler, did especially nice work against the Pullmanites and looks to be as dangerous as they come. Better fielding and hitting to back up the superior pitching performance is rounding the Whitman outfit into a real threat.

Higher calibre opposition should bring out local fans in large numbers tomorrow and Monday and Tuesday. Starting time for Saturday's game is set for two o'clock and the Whitman contests will begin at three.

VANDALS BEGIN REAL PRACTICE

Because of Other Activities, Many of the Linemen Are Not on the Field.

Beginning with the first real scrimmage last Wednesday, real practice sessions are in-store for Idaho grid aspirants from now on, according to Coach Leo Calland. Need to perfect the Vandal machine this spring is evident when it is considered that Idaho will face Washington 10 days after registration next fall, the game being set for September 28.

Clarence Devlin, speedy quarter from last fall's frosh club, looked good in the scrimmage as did Cooper, thickest frosh lineman. Varsity men showing up well were Paul Berg at half and Iverson at end. Lack of enough material to form two complete lines for scrimmaging is the biggest setback to spring practice, declares Coach Calland. Ap Berg's shotputting activities and big Joe Wheeler's handiness with baseball have kept the two first string linemen out of football practice this spring and with McCue busy with the discus, a large share of the Vandal forward wall strength is conspicuously absent.

May 4 is the date set for the annual game between the present varsity squad and those who made up the team last season and in the season before working with Blue Key, the athletic department is staging the event for the special benefit of the high school students of North Idaho, who will be guests of Blue Key on that day.

Practice games between a Blue squad and a Red squad will be held later on in the spring providing enough material can be found to make it possible.
