

ASUI Constitution Is Inadequate, Says Board

Plans For Revision Started At Tuesday Meeting; ASUI Assemblies Will Be Held Every Two Weeks For Rest Of Year

That the present ASUI constitution is inadequate and extensive revision is necessary was the consensus at the executive board meeting held Tuesday evening. The student relations committee was instructed by President Dave Kendrick, chairman of the board, to write to other schools in the Pacific Coast conference for copies of their constitutions with a possibility of using them as a model for changes which might be made in the Idaho student laws.

Some proposed changes will be discussed at the next meeting and definite arrangements made as to the extent of the revision. A complete study of the situation is being undertaken preparatory to bringing the present ASUI constitution up to date.

It was decided at the meeting to hold student assemblies at least every two weeks throughout the remainder of the year. Under plans discussed at the session each assembly may be called upon to handle one of the assemblies. This plan was suggested as a solution of the problem of entertainment for the student meetings. The idea is a tentative one pending further investigation of the matter.

Final arrangements for the first weekly ASUI dance, Saturday, November 17, were made at the meeting. The affair will be held in the Memorial gymnasium. If ASUI cards are presented for admittance the charge for the dance will be only 15 cents per couple. It is pointed out that the dance is not "free" as previously announced. Bill Armstrong, Bob Kerr, Orval Goodsell, and Maurine Klinghorn have been appointed by Kendrick as a committee to take charge of specific arrangements for the dance.

Fifteen cents for 15 bouts will be the admission price, with five preliminaries starting at eight and ten main bouts immediately following.

"The card will be completely arranged and ready for publication the first of next week," concluded August.

The tickets are for seats on the 30-yard line, and are the regular \$1.50 value. Tickets will be sold only to those holding ASUI cards. They will be on sale in the lower floor of the administration building by the Intercollegiate Knights next week.

Blue Key is sponsoring a special train to Pullman on the day of the game. Round trip fare will be approximately 25 cents.

Rooter caps must be worn by students in the Idaho section, at Pullman as well as for the College of Idaho game here tomorrow, according to Yell King Paul Kerr. The "Y" club has promised to enforce the cap-wearing tradition at home games.

This honorary will perform the same function as the present Alpha Lambda Delta which is an honorary for freshman women who attained a high scholastic standing during their first year.

The petition of nine university students to install this organization on the campus was granted recently and plans are being made to uphold the formal installation soon followed by a banquet. Must Have High Standing

Raise Standards Of H.S. English

Much Improvement Recently According to Dr. G. M. Miller

Dr. George Morey Miller, head of the English department, expressed himself as greatly pleased at what seems to be increasingly better work on the part of the high schools in the fundamentals of spelling, punctuation, sentence structure, and choice of words.

"I attribute this," he says, "partly to the active work of the Inland Empire council of teachers of English begun as far back as 1919. It has also been materially helped by the uniform placement test as used throughout the four states of the Northwest, and the testing of students in the minimum essentials. That there is a wide interest in these tests is proved by the large number of requests coming from high school officials throughout the state for the standing of their students in the uniform placement test. The improvement in this work ought to be gratifying to teachers of English who have cooperated to secure it during the last 15 years."

Statistics show that the percentage of those who are doing remedial work in English is gradually decreasing. Furthermore, it is believed that the standards themselves have been gradually raised. This shows that the high schools are actually doing better work in the fundamentals of English than they did a few years ago. Only 15 per cent of the total number of students taking the placement test are compelled to take remedial work, and only 17 per cent are taking partial remedial work.

Moscow high school has a failing for meeting undefeated teams and plays another in the Lewiston Bengals on MacLean field at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. The game will decide the central Idaho championship. Admission to the game will be 25 cents for university students and 50 cents for townpeople.

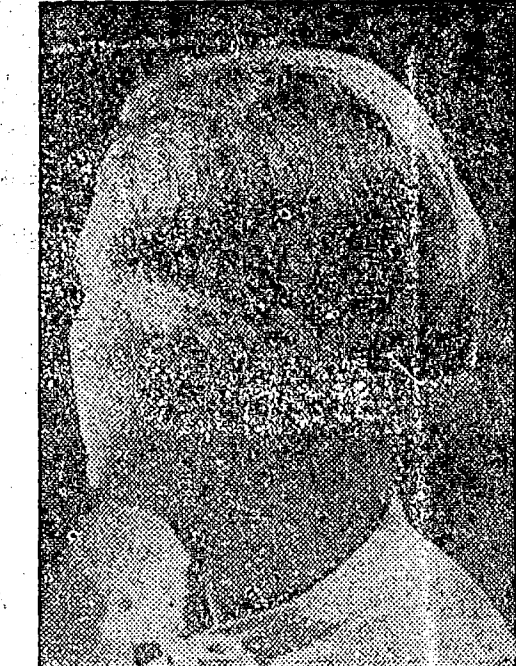

It's Going to Be Different

It isn't the usual run of non-conference "breather" games that we'll see out on muddy MacLean field tomorrow afternoon. There are several factors which will make it one of the hardest fought games this year. To the loser will go keen disappointment.

The usual non-conference "extra" means very little to the conference team, win or lose. Washington State can pass off that disastrous tilt with the Ike Peterson and his Gonzagans with a shrug; it won't greatly hinder her Rose Bowl aspirations. Oregon got nothing much out of her victory over the University of Utah except a lot of additions to the injury list and a realization that they play good football in the Rocky Mountain league, too.

It was somewhat the same way with the Idaho outfit when they went down to Caldwell last year. South Idaho supporters of the Vandals wanted to see their team in action, and expected them to outplay Coach Basler's boys. This they did, pushing over four touchdowns, two of which were called back, leaving the final count, 13 to 0.

But the Vandal fans in south Idaho considered the game a moral victory for the Coyotes. They couldn't understand why Coach Basler's boys didn't lie down and let the Vandals roll over them to the tune of a 60 to 0 score as they had rolled over the Whitman team a week before; they couldn't understand that playing at night under lights greatly hampers any team that is not used to such conditions; they couldn't understand that a football team can't get keyed up to a high mental pitch that means alert, first-class playing over an unimportant non-conference game; they couldn't understand that Coach Basler might whip together a really first-class team that could give an Idaho eleven a real workout.

This year it's a different matter. The Vandal players don't like what was said about them after their listless playing against the Coyotes last year. They detest being the victims of a "moral victory." They respect the abilities of the players they are going up against, and will be playing all the harder to prove to their followers that they deserve to be classed as a better team than the College of Idaho can send up here. They know that Coach Basler has been pointing his charges for this game tomorrow all during the season, going through their Northwest conference and other games undefeated, largely as a matter of course, just getting ready to pull the "David and Goliath" act and "beat Idaho."

What emotional set-up could be better for a "fight to the finish" battle out there tomorrow? If the fans don't get their \$1.10 worth, it won't be because the Vandals and the Coyotes won't be out there to WIN.

used, and the girls are privileged to go there and practice any time.

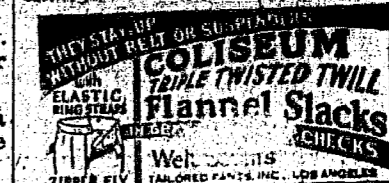

up a more redoubtable score this season.

But, with the present stories circulating as to the relative strength of the Caldwell aggregation, the Vandals have turned their attention first to defeating the college men and then turning up the score if possible.

BAZEM TOUTED TO BE STRONG CLUB

According to reports, Basler has one of the strongest teams that has been developed in the southern part of the state in years. Speed and "fight" are standouts in the Coyote attack while the line has gained a reputation for its defensive ability.

Only 20 points have been tallied against the C. of I. while they have garnered 86. Jess Swan, reputed to be fast and heavy, quarterback the team and has been responsible for most of the team's scoring. Sayre, 155 pounds, and Maxwell, 185 pounds, are the regular halfbacks, and both are dangerous ball packers. Sayre is playing his second year while Maxwell is playing his fourth. Powers, another 185 pounder, is the regular fullback, playing his first year.

Hoobler, "mighty atom," is the smallest ball totter that the Vandals will face this year. He tips the scale at 130 pounds, boasts a lot of speed, and has been alternating with Swan at quarter.

The Southern Branch has been the only team that has been able to crack the Coyotes forward wall to any extent. Coach Guy Wicks' team piled up a 14 point total, but the Caldwell men rallied to win 19 to 14. Albany college garnered the other 6 points which blemish

the college's record. WEIGHT AVERAGES UP TO IDAHO HEFT

Basler's starting forward line averages close to 190 pounds. The ends, Hayman and MacReynolds, weigh 190 and 185 respectively. Glasby and Kyle, the tackles, hit 185 and 210. The guards, Esson and S. Tyson are 170 and 205 pounds. Smith at center tips the beam at 200.

With the Montana victory chalked on the wall, a new spirit has taken hold of the Vandals this week, and although they have been faced with miserable rainy weather in which to practice, they have shown more zip and pep in the sessions than they have produced since early in the season.

VANDALS WORK ON COYOTE "BAD MEDICINE"

For the most part the team has been drilling on the C. of I. plays with Rich Fox handling a squad of blues against the regulars. Special study has been given to the defensive tactics which the Vandal linemen will face. Basler has a system in which his linemen often lineup two or more yards from the ball in order to thwart the charge of the opposing offensive linemen.

Another aspect which is characteristic of Basler's team is the roving halfback who is apt to dart in some direction shortly before the ball is snapped.

Only a few changes have been made in the attack of the Vandals this week, and with the weather man promising more rain it appears that new and fancy forma-

Charlie Erb's 1926 team romped to a 30-0 victory and in 1930 Calland's proteges won 30 to 6 and last year 13 to 0.

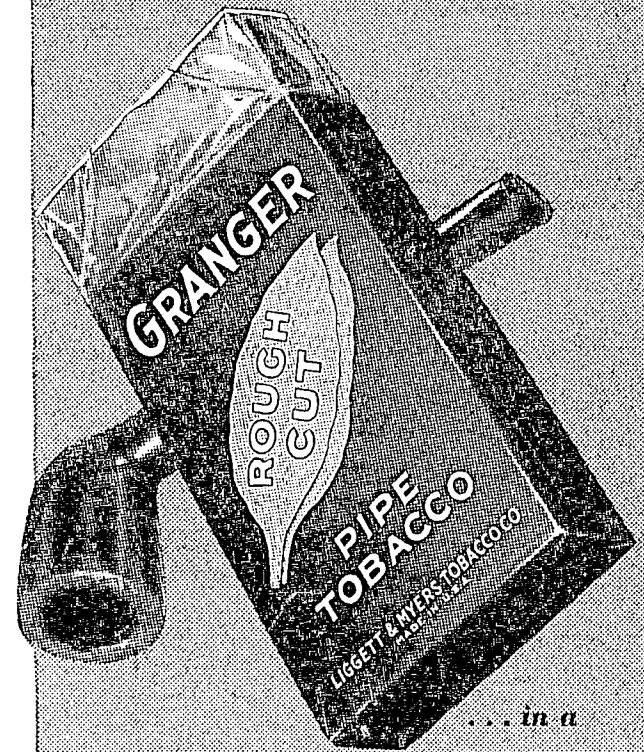
