Women's Rifle Squad To Commence Practice

Team to be Chosen After Three Week's Practice; Hart Will Coach

The 1935 women's rifle squad will be under the coaching of Lieutenant Charles H. Hart, Jr. of the military department. A squad of 24 will be picked at the end of three week's practice—six members being chosen from each of the four classes.

Weekend Features Sub-zero Weather

Thermometer Skids to 19 Below; Warm Winds Raise Mercury

Old man mercury took a long ride down hill last Saturday night and hit a shivering low of 19 degrees below zero, which is just 32 degrees below normal for this date as compared to other years.

January 20 this year is the coldest on record for that date with the exception of one other year; while January of last year is the warmest ever recorded at the university station.

The year 1934 was the warmest year on record at the university weather station with a mean temperature of 51.6 degrees. The normal mean is 47.

The 19th of this month came in for its share of cold weather with a low temperature of nine degrees below and a high of 11 above. The mean for the day was 23.6 degrees below normal for that date.

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Caution Is Needed On Cold Mornings

Beresford Warns Motorists Against Warming Motor in Closed Garage

Death awaits with open arms for the motorist who warms up his engine in a closed garage, says Hobart Beresford, agricultural engineer at the university.

Carbon monoxide, a deadly exhaust gas formed by imperfect combustion, and therefore plentiful during cold weather, is one of the most insidious dangers to confront motorists. Invisible and odorless, it strikes without warning, seizing its victims with an overpowering drowsiness, often before they realize they are in danger.

Ventilation is the sure way to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Being heavier than air, the gas collects in closed spaces unless allowed to escape. Keep the garage door open when the motor of your car is running.

First aid for carbon monoxide poisoning consists of giving the victim plenty of fresh air, oxygen if available, and rest. If the victim has lost consciousness, apply artificial respiration, and call a doctor.

Nasty Old Bedbugs Visit Best Homes

"Judy O'Grady or the colonel's lady," both can have bedbugs in their homes, according to Dr. Claude C. Wakeland, head of the entomology department at the University of Idaho.

Having bedbugs is no disgrace, but it is a disgrace to have them very long, says Dr. Wakeland, quoting the homely philosophy of Bill Nye. The pests are so widespread and easily transported that before the housewife realizes it, the insects can infest the finest house on Snob Hill or the poorest cottage across the railroad tracks.

Wae Willie Smith Hails From Wilks; Gets Home Via Mule

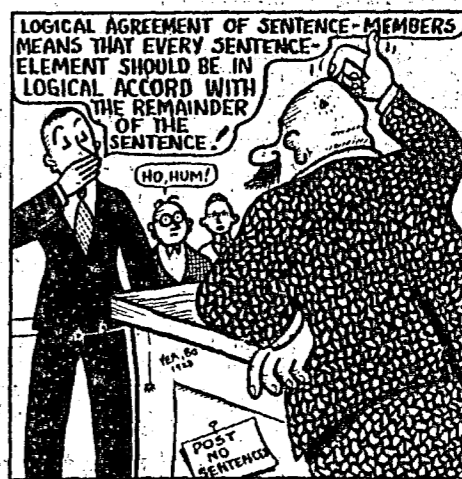
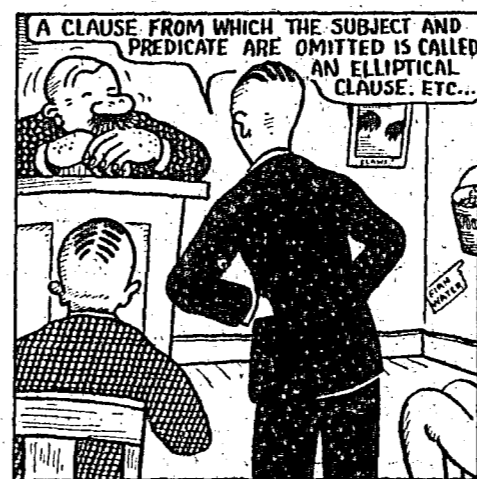
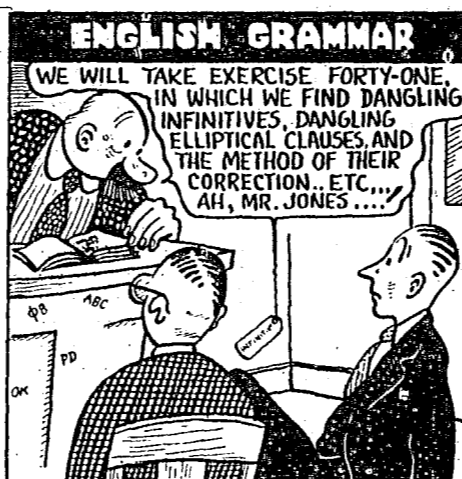
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
