Enrollment Hits All Time Record Officials Report

First official registration figures point to a new all-time enrollment record at the University of Idaho.
The resident total at the end of the second day of the first week was 2632, as compared to 122 less, or 2510, on the corresponding date a year ago. Last year the bulk of the graduate school students, who have three weeks in which to enroll, is yet to come.
Last year's resident high mark was 2,704 students actually on the campus at one time. Best guessers on the figure for this year place it somewhere above the 2,800 mark, with a total registration for both semesters of 3,000 not unlikely.

R.O.T.C. Officers Direct Traffic

Completing plans for handling the extra traffic and parking connected with the Homecoming game, state highway patrol officers and representatives of the Moscow police department met with Captain Hart of the military department last Thursday afternoon.
According to Captain Hart, he and 10 cadet officers will assist the police in parking the anticipated 1200 cars. All parking will be at the west end of Neale stadium with the entrance on west Idaho avenue. There will be absolutely no parking on the Pullman road. Two exits will be open after the game, one leading north on Idaho avenue to Moscow proper, and the other leading past the dairy barns.

Just after the accident happened, Beery thought he would be in bed for only a week or ten days at the most. But the wound is so slow in healing that he will be confined to bed for at least two weeks longer.

Beery planned to leave Los Angeles Thursday and fly to Weiser. He was to leave Weiser Friday morning and be met by Perry Culp, director of the ASUI news bureau, and a group of alumni. From Spokane he was to motor to Moscow.

The movie villain and godfather of the Idaho Vandals said in his letter, "If any of the boys need any guns to use on Oregon State, let me know because I have eleven of them like the one I shot myself in the leg with."

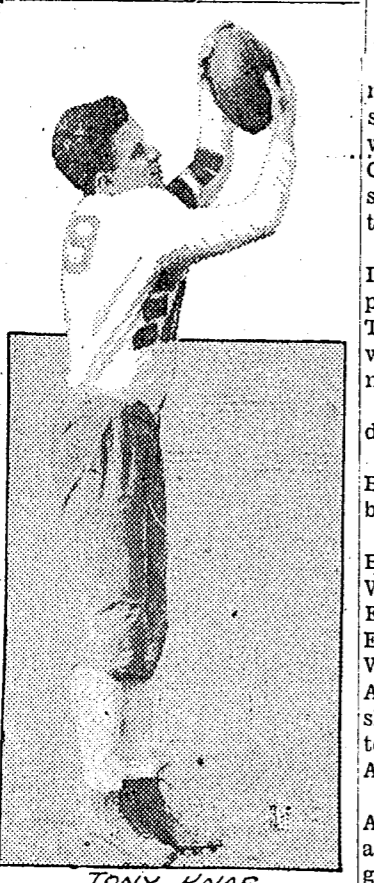

Idaho-O.S.C. First Crashed On Wet Field, Thanksgiving, 1913

When Alexander's Rag Time Band" was beginning its long run of popularity; when football players wore high necked sweat shirts and handle-bar mustaches and a BIG football squad claimed all of 22 members, Idaho and Oregon State began their meetings on the gridiron.

On a muddy, rainsoaked field at Corvallis on Thanksgiving day, 1913, the Vandals and Beavers started their series, of which this Saturday's game will be the 16th. During the 24 years intervening since that first game when the Corvallis boys took the measure of the local stalwarts by a score of 3 to 0, the two teams have met 15 times. Idaho has taken the Beaver Boys into camp six times, and the Oregonians copped the remaining nine games.

Tony is one of Ted Bank's bright spots on the Vandal eleven. He plays left end on the Idaho lineup. Tony expects to have a busy afternoon in Idaho's encounter with O. S. C. Saturday.

When the Vandals first tackled the Oregon Staters, their opponents hailed from "Oregon Agricultural College." "Pink" Griffith was the head man at Idaho. From all available information, the Idaho line played the entire game without a substitution. In the backfield, a versatile young man by the name of Jim Lockhart who hailed from Brookings, South Dakota and was named on the All Northwest Team that year, played at right half, left half, and full during that game. The Idaho players included: R. E. Samms, R.T., Kinneson, R.G., Captain Favre, C., Hayes, L.G., Groniger L. T., Phillips, L. E., Jack Johnson, quarter, Purdy, R.H., Brown, Lockhart, and Ross, L. H., Lockhart, Judine, and Knudson, Full, Knudson, Lockhart, and Judine.

Giving only about 16 inches to the complete story, the Argonaut said, "The mud and water was ankle deep which made anything except straight football impossible, and that could be followed with little success. The only score was the result of a punt out of bounds by Kinnison caused by the slippery conditions of the ball. Because of the conditions of the field, the speed of the Idaho team counted for nothing, and weight of the O.A.C. team gave them a great advantage."

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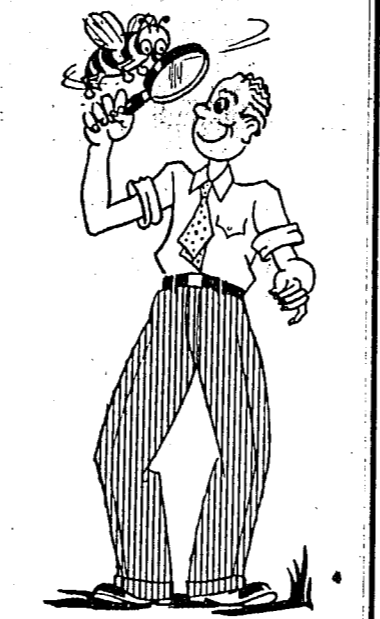

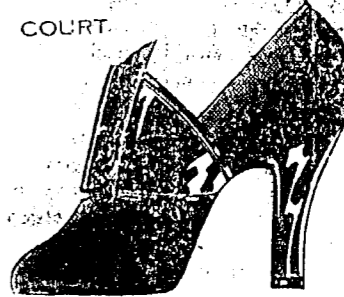
