





When Alexander's Rag Time Band" was beginning its long run of popularity; when football players wore high necked sweat shirts and handle-bar mustaches and a BIG football iquad claimed all of 22 members, Idaho and Oregon State began their meetings on the gridiron.

On a muddy, rainsoaked field at Corvallis on Thanksgiving day, 1913, the Vandals and Beavers started their series, of which this Saturday's game will be the 16th. 


