Grid Critics Predict Idaho Victory In Tomorrow's W.S.C. Game

U. S. Party Sweeps ASUI Class Offices

Winning both executive board positions and sweeping in all class offices, the United Students smothered the Campus party Wednesday in the first ASUI election of the year. Mary Sullivan and Bill Kramer were elected to fill the vacancies on the board.

Stonko Pavkov was elected president of the senior class by defeating Earl Ritzheimer. This was the closest contest in the voting, Pavkov winning by a majority of 25 votes.

Final tabulation by the election committee showed a total of 1,444 ballots cast for the executive board positions. Members of the victorious party voted 862 straight ballots. Campus party supporters came through with 535 straight tickets, while 47 split ballots were counted.

The NYA agricultural group will be composed of young men from Idaho farms, announces William Gartin, Boise, state NYA director.

Helldivers Club To Hold Tryouts Week After Next

Agile mermaids and mermen will cavort in the university pool week after next in tryouts for Helldivers' club.

"To be eligible for membership each applicant must hold a senior life saving badge," says Irvin Rauw, club president.

Eliminations will run for two nights during which form diving will be judged. After that time those swimmers who meet the standards of the club will be asked to join. Anyone interested is eligible to try out. This season, in contrast to former years, emphasis will be placed upon form swimming rather than diving.

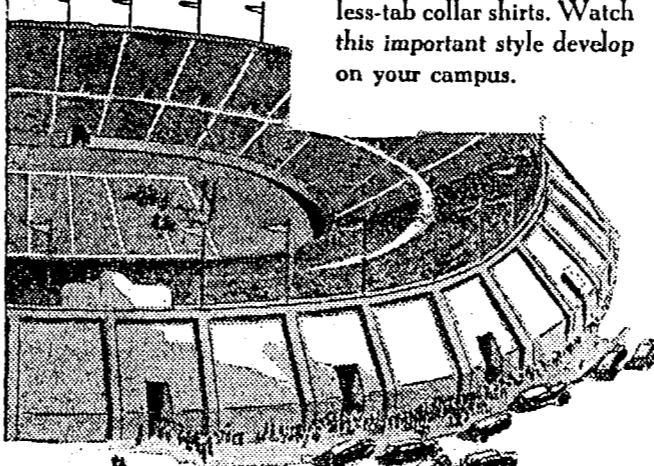

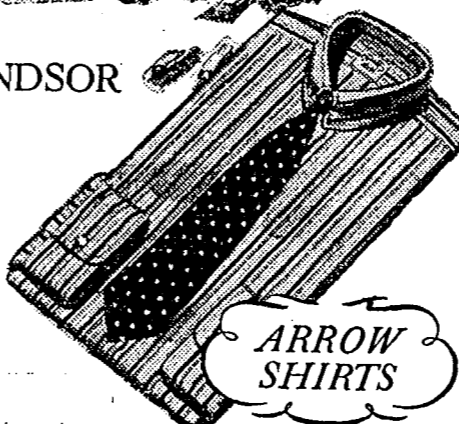

Track Men Called By Ryan; Training Starts Monday

Coach Mike Ryan yesterday issued a call for all men who contemplate turning out for either intramural, intercollegiate, or cross country track to report to him not later than Monday evening to receive their equipment, and to start immediate training.

A special meeting of all candidates for either freshman or varsity cross-country running has been called by Ryan for 10:30 a.m. Sunday in room 105 of the Memorial gymnasium. Training schedules and forthcoming meets will be discussed.

"Because we have no field house in which to train during the winter months, it is necessary that we take advantage of all the good weather we have in the fall. Track season at Idaho has begun, and men who wish to represent the university or the group houses in track, either during the winter or spring season, must commence training now," said Coach Ryan yesterday.

The first meet on the fall calendar, the freshman intersquad struggle, will be held October 13 and 14. The next week will find the freshmen and sophomores tangling their annual interclass meet.

Besides the intersquad, interclass, and intergroup meets to be held this fall, the athletic department will probably schedule cross country meets with W. S. C., Montana, Whitman, and a full squad will be sent to Portland to represent the University of Idaho in the Pacific Coast Championships.

Idaho Rated 38 In Week's Poll

The University of Idaho Vandals were rated 38 with 84 per cent by Paul B. Williamson, national sports critic, for this week. The order of the 10 leading teams was made according to the importance of the games played. Williamson's system was 38 per cent correct disregarding 10 "called upsets," but counting nine upset ties.

The University of California rated number one position on Williamson's football list with a score of 99 per cent. California defeated St. Mary's college last week 30-7. Santa Clara ranked fourth in the top ten leaders with 96 per cent.

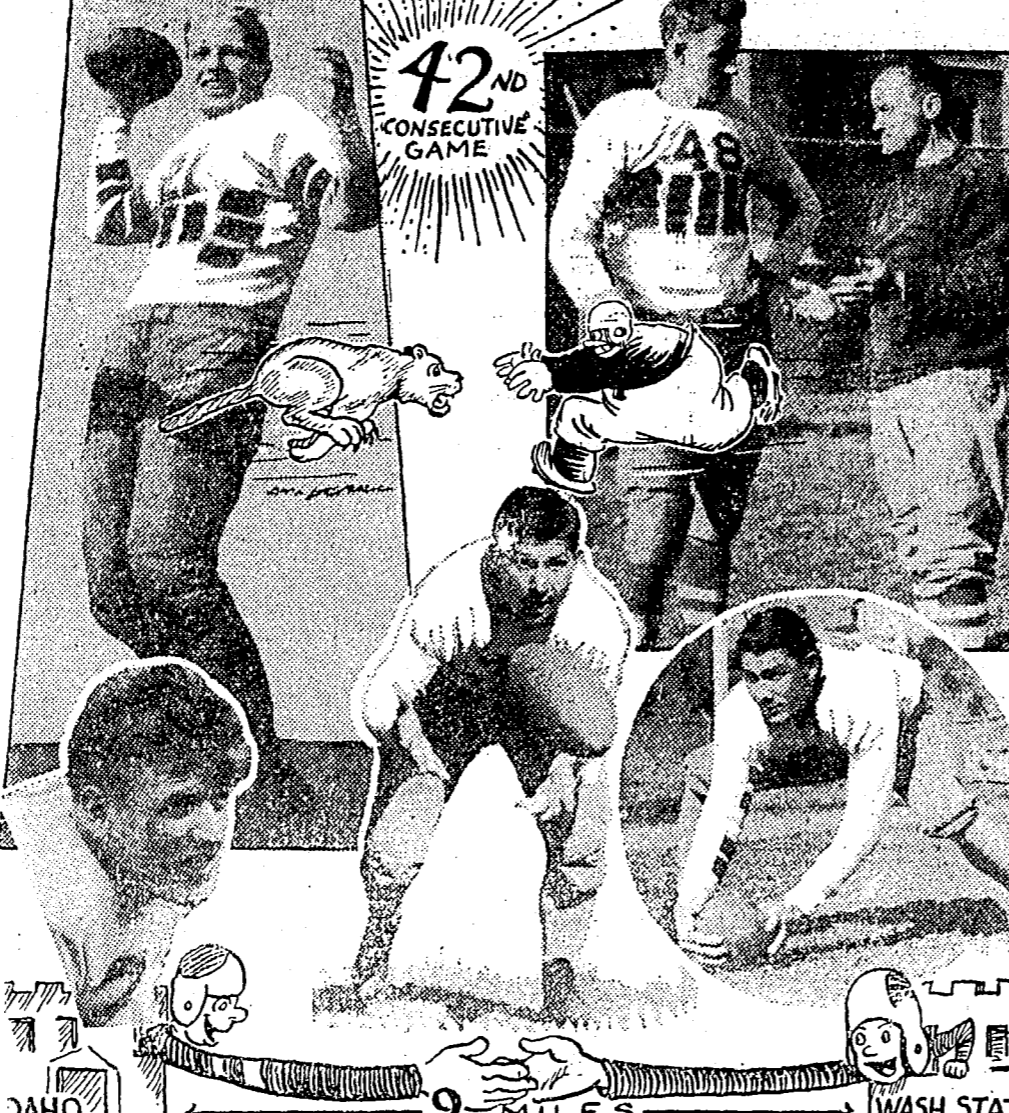

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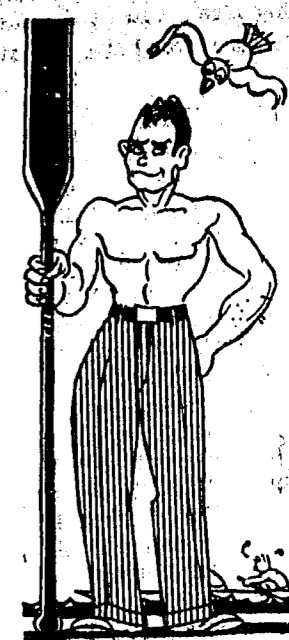

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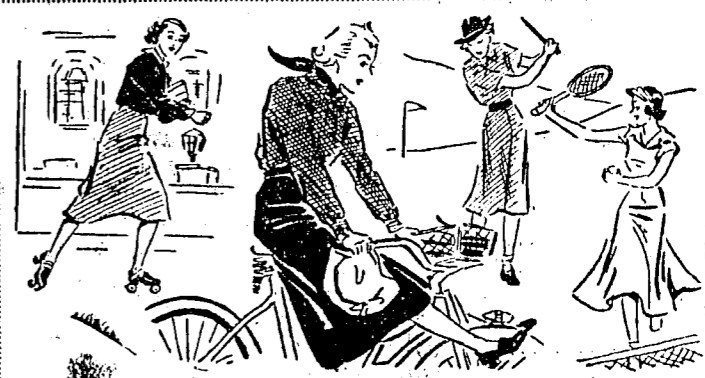


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
