

Vandals Invade Husky Lair This Saturday

A full week of practice against Washington formations will be handed out to the Vandals before they pull out from the Northern Pacific station Thursday night bound for Saturday's game with the Huskies in Seattle.

Several injuries, incurred in the St. Mary's game last week and in previous games, will weaken the Idaho squad. Merle Stoddard injured a shoulder in the Gael game and will not play against Washington. Steve Belko, halfback, held out of the St. Mary's fracas with a hip injury, will probably not be available this week. Lyle Smith, center who re-sprained an ankle last week, may not play. Stonko Pavlov, tackle, still nursing a sprained ankle, is on the doubtful list.

Practice this week will be in the form of scrimmage against Washington plays which were brought back from a scouting expedition by Forrest Twogood, assistant coach. No changes will be announced in the lineup from last week until Coach Bank has had an opportunity to see how the men work in scrimmage this week.

The traveling squad, insofar as is known now, will be unchanged from last week's crew. The team will leave the Northern Pacific depot about 6 o'clock Thursday night and will work out in Washington stadium Friday morning. The game starts at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Washington's record, which includes victories over Iowa State and U. S. C., a tie with Washington State, and losses to Oregon State and Stanford, will give them the edge in pre-game ratings. Idaho, playing its fifth consecutive away-from-home game, will be attempting an upset.

The next two runners, Bottegi and Fluharty, finished within 15 yards of the first men in Cunningham, Peterson, Millette, Probst, Mohar, and Snyder were all named by Ryan as standing a good chance of breaking into the first squad.

Final trials for the Montana meeting which is slated for November 6, at Missoula, will take place next Sunday morning. The Vandal leather lungers have also carded a meet with Whitman Missionaries to be run on the Moscow course November 12, one with W. S. C. on the 17th, and are scheduled to compete in the Pacific coast championships at Portland on November 24.

Idaho Drops Game To Galloping Gaels Of St. Mary's

Unique Officiating of Close Game At San Francisco

A last-period Idaho passing attack, good for a 48-yard march, was stopped on the St. Mary's 20, and the Galloping Gaels held a 6 to 0 lead when the final gun barked in Kezar stadium in San Francisco Friday afternoon.

Except for the second quarter, when St. Mary's made good on a 75-yard touchdown drive, the game was played on even terms. Idaho had the edge in the last half with Dean Green and Tony Knap starring on the receiving end of Harold Rolse's passes, but the big Gael team successfully defended their goal line.

St. Mary's scored the winning touchdown from the 6-yard line on an end-around. Another touchdown in the second quarter was called back because Left Halfback Rimasassa's pass over the Idaho goal line was thrown too close behind the line of scrimmage. An attempted field goal that fell short in the same period was the Gael's only other serious threat.

Harold Rolse, quarter, and Dick Trzuskowski, fullback, shared individual honors for both teams. Rolse's passing was Idaho's chief threat throughout the game. Nine Vandal passes were completed to one for St. Mary's. In first downs the teams stacked up about equal with St. Mary's gaining 11 and Idaho 10. Only in yardage gained from rushing did the heavy Gaels have any marked advantage over the Vandals.

The game was played before about 12,000 spectators, most of whom were San Francisco school children taking advantage of special kid's day prices. Among the children, the sentiment was all for Idaho. They organized an Idaho cheering section and did their best to master some Vandal yells.

One of the most unusual features of the game was a slip-up among the officials which gave St. Mary's five tries to make a first down and later gave Idaho the same privilege. In neither case was the extra down enough to make it first and ten.

Another phase of Coach Ted Bank's weekly problem of finding replacements for injured fullbacks begins this week with the announcement that Merle Stoddard, regular quarter and most recent candidate to help Dick Trzuskowski with the line crashing assignments, goes to the bench for at least three weeks with an injured shoulder.

The announcements of several papers that Harold Rolse played the St. Mary's game as substitute fullback were misprints. Rolse was playing at his regular halfback post when he threw the passes that were Idaho's big threat against the Gaels. At fullback was "Big Truck," and before a shoulder injury took him out, Stoddard. Trzuskowski's work against St. Mary's was one of the outstanding pieces of individual play in the game. He turned in his best performance since he was shifted out of the line last spring. But the loss of Stoddard as an alternative puts the Vandals back in the spot they have been in ever since the Washington State game. Unless Coach Bank makes some more shifts this week, only George Willott will remain to take over the heavy replacement duties if "Truck" is hurt in the Washington game.

The coaching staff, far from pessimistic over the Vandal's showing against St. Mary's, has, however, nothing to say about their prospects in the Washington game. Forrest Twogood, assistant coach who has just returned from Seattle where he scouted the Huskies in their game with Stanford, helps this week working out plays and defenses to stop them. Coach Bank makes no predictions.

"We played the best ball against St. Mary's that we've played since the Oregon State game," he said. "If the boys keep it up, we may do something."

The Vandal spirit, probably better now than at any time since the Washington State game, makes it quite probable that they will "keep it up." The team is apparently finding itself again for the first time since the loss of "Sparkplug" George Chrape. Washington has fallen a long way from its pre-season rating as likely Rose Bowl repeaters, but it has a fine team. The Huskies will be the favorites Saturday, but don't be too surprised if Idaho springs an upset.

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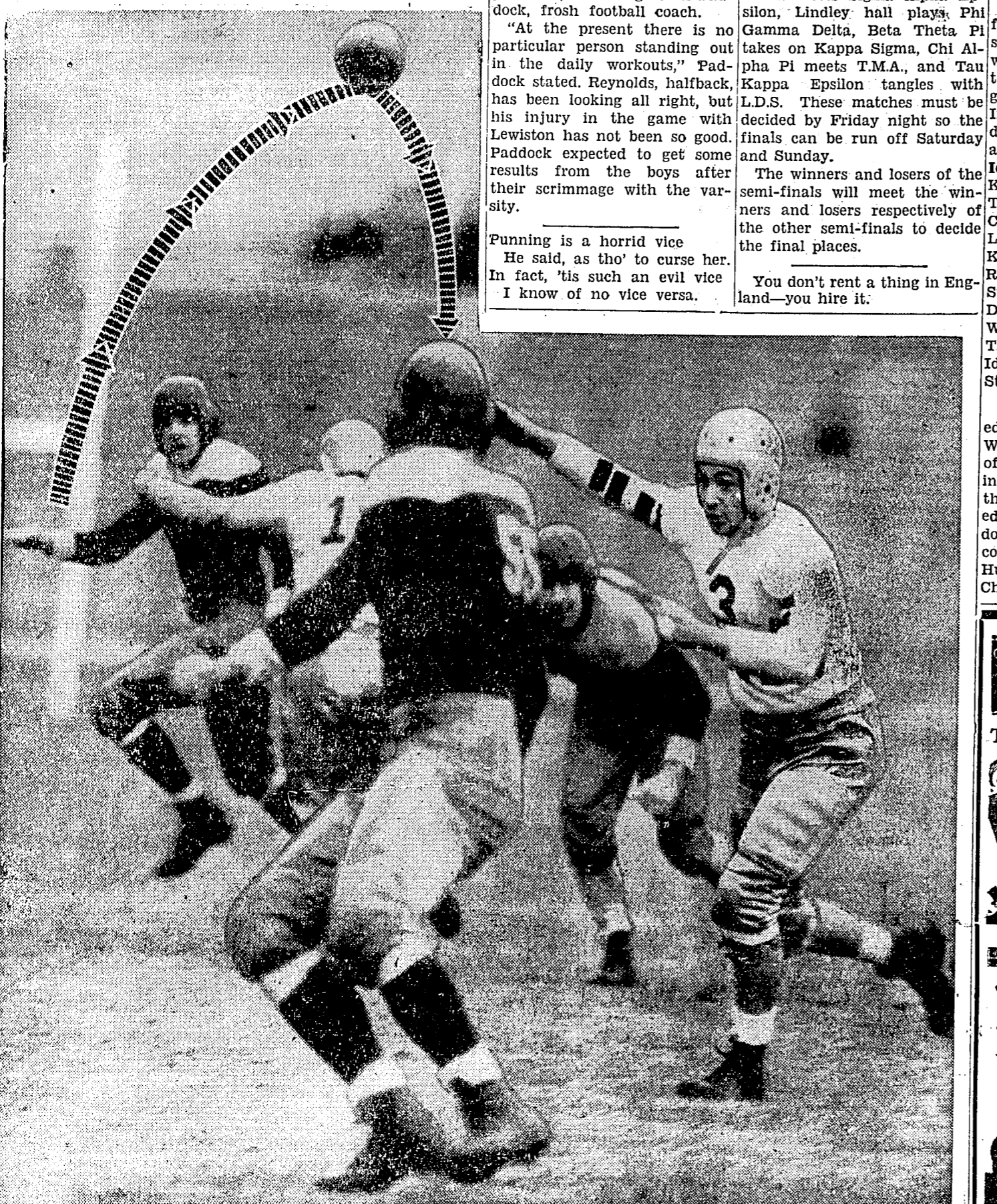
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Gaels Complete Pass To Beat Idaho

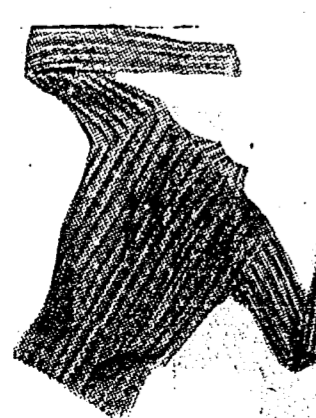
