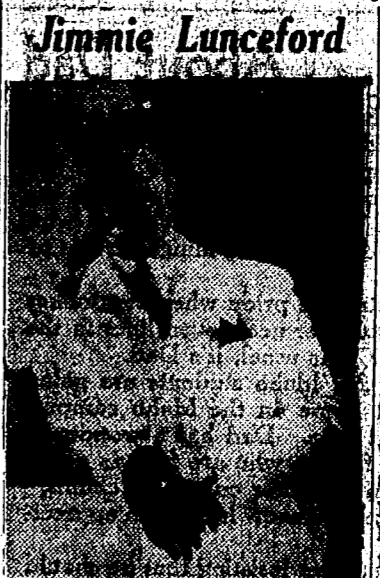

You may think I am a sour-grumping advanced R.O.T.C. student who is disgruntled because he wasn't pledged into Scabbard and Blade, which might be true, but isn't.

In the first place, I haven't got 20 dollars with which to pay fees, and besides, I wouldn't belong to an honorary organization which, to anyone knowing anything about it, stands for a group of selfish, arrogant students who think their band of particular friends are being honored by being pledged into an organization which will accept no one else, anyway.

Members of Scabbard and Blade have issued statements of the qualities a man has to have to be included among the chosen few, and then proceeded to pick their political party members with no regard for their qualifications, nor the qualifications of those left out.

One thing I can say for the Blade members, they didn't make any attempt to conceal their political patriotism. There is not a single "Independent man" member of Scabbard and Blade, which means they are all united students, and they chose every pledge a united student. Proportioned very neatly, too. Out of 11 pledges, seven fraternities got one man, and two fraternities got two men.

Grades, officering ability, extra activities, and general interest in R.O.T.C. work are supposed to decide a man's eligibility, but does it seem logical that, with about half the advanced students independent men, none of them should equal the mighty fraternity men? And that one "super man" should fall so conveniently per fraternity seems a strange coincidence, indeed.

I can match every man they pledged with one who is better with more qualifications. There are better football players taking advanced military than were pledged, men who have more extra activities, who are making better officers, and who will get better grades. It is significant that scabbard and Blade always pledges before the grades come out; their men can't be chosen on grades either.

The men who made the rifle team received nary an offer; and I make free to presume it was because they didn't belong to a fraternity. The highest cadet officer, Bill Guthrie, is not a member of Scabbard and Blade—he lives in Willis Sweet. All this sums up to the fact that if you are a united student, you can be pledged to scabbard and blade, and if you aren't, you won't be, regardless of the fact that Scabbard and Blade parades under the false colors of being composed of men who deserve to be in an honorary, and who earned their place in it.

They earned their place, yes, when they paid their fraternity dues. It is unfortunate that this clause is between the lines, and not written in their constitution as then more people would see them in their proper

light. Everyone is gradually coming to realize their falsity, and their original purpose is submerged beneath petty jealousies and political ambitions some students can't control. I, for one, favor putting the pledging power into the hands of some responsible parties, who would make more fair and reasonable choices.—J.E.

## Bullpups Defeat Idaho Yearlings

Idaho freshmen drew first blood against Gonzaga's yearlings in Spokane Saturday, but the Bullpups took advantage of a blocked kick, an Idaho fumble, and a 35-yard scoring drive in the last two quarters to score three touchdowns and win 21 to 6.

### Score in Second Quarter

The lone Idaho score came early in the second quarter when Barney Hayes, diminutive halfback, passed and ran the ball from his own 48 across the Gonzaga goal. The first pass in the drive, Hayes to Acuff, moved the ball to the Gonzaga 38. Two plays later, Hayes went to the 28 on an end run. Another pass, this time to Anderson, was good for the touchdown.

The Vandal yearlings threatened again late in the game when they blocked a punt on Gonzaga's 10, but they were forced to surrender the ball on downs.

Gonzaga's first touchdown was scored in the third quarter when Reese, Bullpup halfback, blocked a kick on the Idaho 30 and went across the goal. Gonzaga scored again on a series of runs from Idaho's 35. The last touchdown came after Reese recovered an Idaho fumble on the 10-yard line. Bryant kicked extra points after all of the Gonzaga scores.

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
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
