#### Dean Is Opposed To Date Breaking

Dean of Women Asks Cooperation of House Mothers To Prevent Date Breaking

The prevention of date breaking by campus women was asked by Dr. Evelyn Miller, dean of women, in a meeting of house mothers and hostesses yesterday afternoon.

"It is a sign of bad manners," Doctor Miller said, "when a woman breaks a date with a young man. It is easy for the women to break dates because there are twice as many men on the campus, I don't agree with it at all."

This matter was brought to the attention of the house mothers with particular amphasis that women are not to do this. Women will be watched closely on this and may be subject to rules in case of violations.

Doctor Miller talked to the staff about what had been suggested to her by house mothers and fathers with whom she talked recently on her extended tour of southern Idaho. Many regulations that are in force were suggested by the mothers.

Several additional rules are to be enforced in the future. The rule requiring women to have special permission from home before allowed to drive cars will be one of the regulations to be watched more closely, Doctor Miller urged the house mothers to see that women get more sleep than formerly.

Special housing facilities will be arranged for women students who are remaining on the campus over the Christmas vacation. according to Doctor
