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## The Four-Year Question

In 1939 the Idaho legislature will meet again, maneuver politically, probably passesome cow rustling laws, and argue over the abolishment of radios in cars.

Bound to coze from the political muck stirred up by that body of little "big shots" will be the bi-ennial annoyance—"Let's make the southern branch at Pocatello a four-year, degree granting university.'

If the bill to expand the southern branch passes, many un informed persons in this state will credit the legislature with a masterful measure. To those who know and realize, the passage of the bill would constitute the greatest political blunder in the state's history. Educationally, instead of one outstanding university and a ranking junior college, Idaho would then have two mediocre colleges, very mediocre.

The southern branch bugaboo may seem to some students too far removed from our campus life-but it's a problem much closer to home than most realize. Should the expansion program bear results, those who are now freshmen in Moscow may find themselves being graduated from an institution here in 1941 that has been relegated to the ranks of mediocrity through an act lobbied past a grass-roots legislature by a selfish bunch of Pocatello business men.

The tinderbox is being planted close to home. We, especially the upperclassmen, should fight against it and talk against it at every turn, prevent it from exploding under our very feet in 1939. Letters home, enlightenment to the home town editor, and information to those who moan, "Isn't it too bad that we can't have a fouryear school at Pocatello?"-all these student approaches

They'll help to reproach the cynical inroads of Pocatello business men, some of them University of Idaho graduates, who right down deep want a four-year university at Pocatello for just one reason—to put a heavier feathering in their own, greedy, money nest.

Really pin one of these leeches down, and he'll tell you just that. But that real reason never goes out in southern branch expansion propaganda. They wail about Pocatello being the center of the state's population; they yowl about the exhorbitant travelling expense to reach Moscow from the South; they contend that many student are leaving the state owing to Moscow's remoteness.

But the propagandists never mention the fact that travelling expenses are so infinitesimal compared with the total cost of going to college as to be virtually negligible; they never allude to Idaho's not possessing enough wealth to appropriate sufficiently for one four-year school now; they never consider the magnificant financial outlay already made in Moscow. Finally, they suppress the possibility that, once the expansion bill has passed, the cream of the state's youth will mosey outside the state for their education rather than attend either of the lowly rated institutions Idaho would have to offer.
