Phi Gamma Deltas Are Victors In Indoor Intragroup Track Meet

Willis Sweet Hall Second; Records Broken in Last Night's Meet

Phi Gamma Delta, Willis Sweet hall, and a powerful group of independent runners waged a nip and tuck battle last night which saw the Phijs pull out on the final event, the relay, to win the Third Annual Intragroup championships in the Memorial gymnasium.

Phi Gamma Delta rolled up a total of 34 points to check the Independents who faltered 32 markers. Willis Sweet was third with 26 points. Following on the heels of the three leaders were Chi Alpha Pi and Idaho club with 11 markers each, Phi Delta Theta with 10, Delta Chi 7, ATO and Lambda Chi with 6 each, Colleague hall, Sigma Nu, and T.M. A. with 5 points apiece, Delta Tau Delta and Lewis Court with 3 points, and Lindley hall with 1 point.

Hankins Sets Record
Five new indoor records were established in the course of the meet, and a sixth was tied by an evening of flashy performances. Hankins won the 45-yard high hurdles in 6 flat to record a new standard for the race. The old record of 6.3 was set by Bill Powers in 1936. Durham tied the 40-yard dash mark of 4.7 which was first set by Poole in 1936.

Don Johnson, outstanding Idaho weight man, again cracked the 16-pound shot record with a mighty toss of 46 ft. 7 in. His old mark was set last year at 44 ft. 1 in. Ellison came back from last week's performances to win out over Tony Kamalevich in the 35-pound weight throw, and regain the record which he lost to Kamalevich last week. Ellison's new mark is 40 ft. 7 in.

Kilby Perkins' old record of 39.3 for the 300-yard novice run which he set last year was tossed into the discard by Robinson when he turned in a 39 flat race. The sixth record of the evening went to Bernt of the Independents who was clocked in the fast time of 1:25.3 for the 600-yard run. The old standard of 1:31.5 was made by Fowler in 1936.

Probst Hard Pushed
Besides the series of new records the tracksters set up, the highlight of the evening occurred in the running of the mile and one-half lung buster. Little Bobby Neal, Pennsylvania cinder burner, pushed a strong group of veterans to an exceedingly fast run for the early season.

Running nicely all the way, Neal stayed up long enough to run the entire field of varsity men save Pat Probst into the boards. Veteran Probst was pushed all the way to win his specialty, but managed to pull out on the last lap to lead Neal to the tape by three yards.

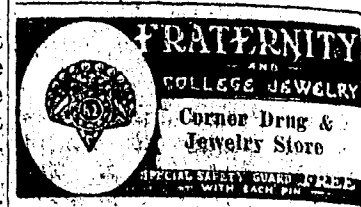
The fast-moving action and witty dialogue of the play proved very popular with metropolitan audiences.
