

"I USUALLY eat a baked potato when I sit down to write. Some of my finest ideas come while putting in the

The above quotation is a recipe for authorship advanced by a poet of no less renown than Percy B. Shelley. Students who have given more than superficial attention to The Cloud, Autumn, and Adonais already may have detected the "potato motif' in his poems, and know that his method is laudable and worthy of emulation.

Yet, although Shelley's adherence to such a formula proved successful, and although it possesses obvious postic and gastronomic advantages, your correspondent requests his reader's permission to abandon the bard's well-tried recipe for reasons financial and epicurian, be permitted to serve up his own culinary inspiration.

If such is permissable, it will appear, unfortunately, in this column.

Your correspondent will then present, and the reader can expect, from time to time, disassociated anecdotes and occasional "epigrams" that may not have been warmed over but which still lack the pungency and high seasoning of either impropriety or riotous wit. Also included in this literary repast will be a sort of journalistic hash consisting of casual observations of campus affairs and less casual but not derisive or disparaging criticisms of campus scholastic activities and campus social frivolities. In addition, for a dash of piquancy and flavoring, there may possibly be a humorous hors d'oeuvres-of a humor not like chuckle, chortle, nor guffaw-but something perhaps faintly, quaintly, funny-funny.

The method of preparation will not be objective or reportorial but rather of a subjective and personal nature.

Finally, when this fearful yet magnificent concoction has been allowed to stew sufficiently and is actually ready to be served, your correspondent sincerely hopes that it produces the desired inspiration and not a disagreeable, emotional indigestion. So be it!

The recommencement of political activities upon the Idaho campus coming almost coincidentally with Chancellor Adolf Hitler's internationally broadcast speech on Monday makes comparisons between the German feuhrer's political and oratorical technique and that of the Idaho campus politician not altogether impertinent, in spite of the general supposition that the methods, ideology and appeal of fascism and democracy are diametrically opposed to one another.

The German dictator and the local "politicker" both attempt to justify their stand by emphasizing the rectitude of their own position while, at the same time, directing their strongest epithets towards their enemies and opponents whose case and policies are presented as malicious, opportunistic, founded on fraud, and dictated by greed. Characteristic of both is their appeal to prejudice and factional interest, and both attempt to develop a state of intense emotionalism among their followers.

Significant it is that many of the feuhrer's words might well find application on the Idaho campus in the coming



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
