## Price Pleased With Frosh

Frosh Coach Walt Price today expressed thinly veiled optimism in a discussion of freshman football prospects. "They're green, but they're willing," said Price after viewing the Babes' display of strength in playing defense against the varsity, "and that's the stuff that makes great ball clubs."

Coach Price explained that of the 65 boys who turned out, many had never played, others were seasoned high school veterans, and one had never seen a football game. The mentor believes that there is some excellent future varsity material in the squad.

started from the Idaho 35. Chrape smashed off 15 yards to lead the attack, and he and Eddie Wilson carried it down to the 37 behind beautiful interference. Hal Roise hacked off 10 to the 27, and then passed to "Muzzy" Howard in the 18-yard stripe. Roise then hit the line for two more, and on the next play Eddie Wilson tore around end for the touchdown on the old hidden ball play.

Late in the third quarter Chrape intercepted a Beaver pass on the 33-yard line to put the Vandals in scoring position again. After failing to gain materially, Roise attempted his field goal.

Oregon State attempted a drive late in the fourth quarter, but the Vandal line stopped it cold. Durham, fullback cannonball, put Idaho back into scoring territory with a 23-yard gallop. Roise punted on the Beaver 2 yard line to put them in a dangerous hole. Oregon State punted and Roise returned it to the Beaver 30. **Linemen Good**  
Large credit was dished out by Coach Bank for the effective work turned in by the Vandal forward wall. Led by Lyle Smith, Walt Musial, Jack Donovan, Tony Knap, Ray Smith, Trzuskowski, and Ray Kaczmarek, the Idaho linemen literally ran circles around their heavier opponents.

Outstanding work was turned in by Hal Roise—blonde bullet—Eddie Wilson, "Bull" Durham, Mac Beall, and George Chrape in the backfield.

Reports from Mike Ryan, trainer, yesterday indicated that the entire Idaho team would be in first class shape for the Husky encounter in Seattle Saturday. Durham and Chrape each received minor injuries in the Beaver fray, but none were designated as likely to keep them out of practice work.
