Behind the Idaho Pep band and Yell King Bill Moats, 1,200 students joined in a parade and pep rally at the Union Pacific station last night as the Vandal football team entrained for Eugene. Walt Musial, honorary captain for the game, was called upon by Moats to speak to the crowd. "We expect a fight, but we'll tell you more about the game after it's over," was his comment. Gordon "Whitey" Price and Eddie Wilson, both halfbacks, were others who spoke.

Starting in front of the Blue Bucket, the Pep band commenced a circle of the campus which carried them past each of the group houses. After picking up representatives at each house, the crowd went to the station where several hundred townspeople joined in singing Idaho songs and giving Vandal yells.

Members of the new committee appointed from the executive board include President Max Kenworthy, Walter Olson, Leonard Arrington, Ray Givens, and Mike Sullivan. Graduate Manager George Horton will serve as an ex-officio member.

The Senior ball with plans now well under way will be the first class function on which executive board auditors will work. Larry Duffin, as general chairman, directs this affair—assisted by Gerald Ridgeway, Keith Thompson, Belva Budge, Jerome Wesler, Homer Davies, Dick Hutchison, John Young, Vincent Wells, and Harold Oldson in charge of the various committees. Steve Belko is president of the class.

"The newly-elected governor of Idaho will be invited to the seniors' annual formal ball," Duffin said. "A 13 piece Pep band orchestra has been signed to furnish the music, and December 9 has been definitely chosen for the affair."

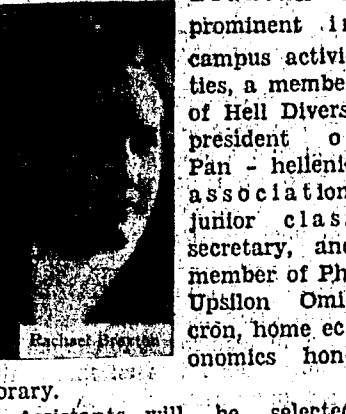

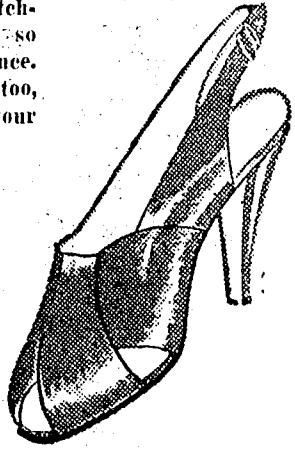

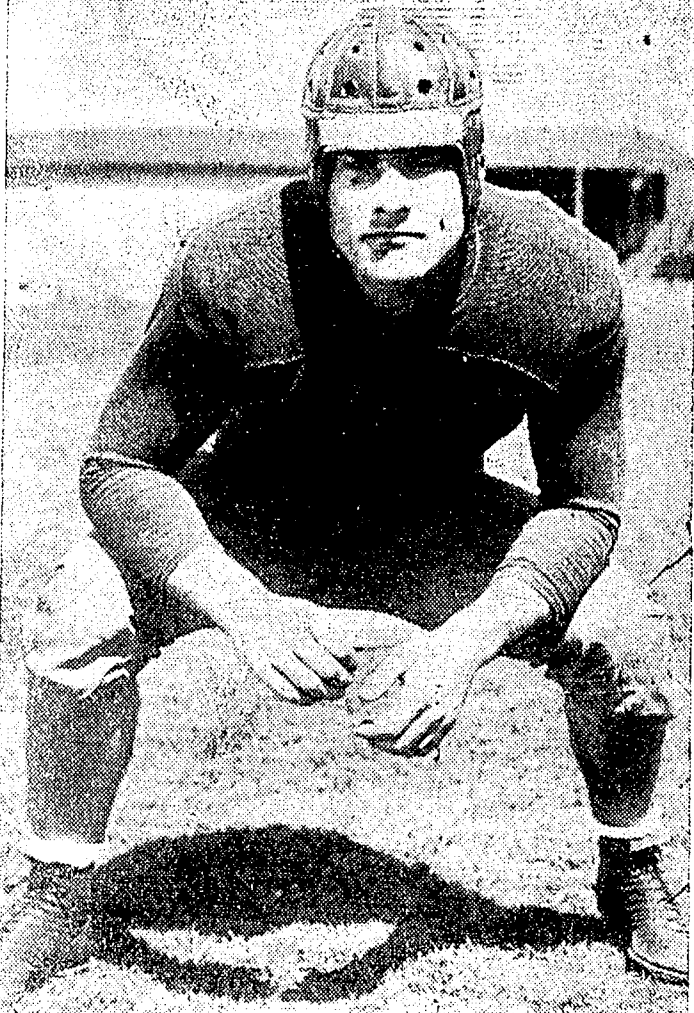

Wisecracs Concede Idaho Men Even Chance With Oregon

An even chance to return home victorious was accorded Ted Bank and 33 of his Vandal gridders last night as they left for Eugene, Ore., to meet the University of Oregon Saturday in what is expected to be one of the most closely contested battles on the coast.

Although Fred Rettberg and Harold "Bull" Durham were left behind because of injuries, the Idaho team was expected to be ready physically for what Coach Bank termed "one of Idaho's toughest games."

"If we are to stop Oregon's hard running backfield, the team must tackle harder than they did against the Grizzlies," the coach warned. "With Ted Gebhardt, Jay Graybeal, and Jim Nicholson, Coach Tex Oliver has plenty of speed and power to use against us."

End-Fullback Cause Worry
 Principal worry to the Idaho coaching staff concerned the available men for the right end and fullback positions. Merle Stoddard, alternating at the fullback spot with Mac Beal, injured an ankle in Wednesday night's scrimmage, and indications were that Beal would carry the load at that position against the Ducks.

Ray Smith, regular right end candidate for all-Coast honors, has been out of heavy scrimmage work for nearly two weeks. 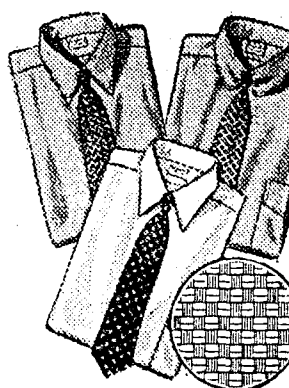
