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Vandal Hoopmen Work for Oregon Invasion; Cougars Triumph

Twogood Expects An Even Break On Trip; Overtime Period Was Disastrous Saturday

Beaten in their last four conference starts, but with hopes riding high for victory, University of Idaho's hoopmen entrain Thursday evening at 7:20 o'clock for Oregon where the Vandals meet University of Oregon and Oregon State college in five days.

Silver and Gold cagers meet Oregon's Ducks Friday and Saturday and Oregon State the following Monday and Tuesday.

"We have our toughest job ahead of us this week at Oregon, and I think the boys realize that," Coach Forrest Twogood said today. "You can disregard, too, what everyone says about Oregon State not being a tough ball club. They are a greatly improved team."

"We are not going down a beaten club before we start. We expect to knock over Oregon once and beat Oregon State once, maybe twice. We have had the tough breaks in our last four games."

Practice will be intensive drill on both offense and defense this week.

"We have been getting past opponents' defense the last two games but have been missing the setups when we do get in, and still this week will be centered mostly on sinking those setups," Twogood said.

"Hopkins and Ramey have been playing good ball this week and are pressing the starters for positions. The team is in good physical shape now with most of the men, with the exception of Barrett, recovered from their colds."

Oregon State Coach "Slats" Gill has switched his traditional Beaver offense from a slow break to a fast break in preparation for the invading Vandals.

The traveling squad is still indefinite but it was believed that it would include: Steve Belko, Breiden Barrett, Lyle Smith, Ronnie Harris, "Chick" Atkinson, Roy Ramey, "Hoppy" For-

kins, Cartee Wood, Shirley Lund, Whitey Price, Bill English, and "Rook" Hilton.

The Vandal courtmen will return Thursday morning, February 18, at 8:45 o'clock.

Vandals Lose Thriller

Washington State Cougars left Memorial gymnasium Saturday night, victorious in a hard-fought, overtime basketball thriller, W.S.C.'s second victory over the Vandals. The score was 39-35.

After trailing by one or two points during most of the game, Idaho tied the game after Jack Jennings, Cougar center, fouled Bren Barrett of Idaho with 20 seconds remaining in the contest. Barrett sank the first of his two free throws to knot the contest, but the second rolled off the rim of the hoop with the Cougars recovering too late to get the ball to the Vandal basket.

Roy Ramey, Vandal forward, shoved the Twogood team out in front with a basket shortly after the extra period started. Buckets by Pete Hooper, Jennings, and Ed Kerpa pushed the W.S.C. team out in front once more. Barrett tallied again on a free throw; and Ronnie Harris, Idaho forward, followed with another basket; but a basket by Kerpa and a perfect gift toss by Hooper sewed up the contest for the Friemen.

Washington State led at halftime, 13-12. Barrett captured high point honors with 13, and

Glass Backboards To Be Discussed at Meeting

Formal adoption of glass backboards for all basketball courts of the northern division has been planned to be introduced at the next meeting of the northern division, according to Ray Eckmann, University of Washington athletic director.

Adoption of glass backboards would permit spectators to sit at ends of the court with a clear view of both baskets.

All available space already has been turned into seats in every northern division gym except directly behind the wooden backboards. Adoption of glass backboards would increase attendance, according to Mr. Eckmann.

Oregon players who used the glass backboards on their trip east this winter insist that there is no difference between board and glass.

Idaho's frosh courtmen banged out a 28-26 victory over the Washington State yearlings Saturday night to ring up their first victory in two years over the Cougar frosh.

The Vandal greenies were never in danger until late in the second half when the State frosh tied the score at 19-19. Then Jim Foster, diminutive Vandal forward, dropped two quick lay-up shots through the laces to send the Idaho frosh into a lead they never relinquished.

Classy ball-handling by the Idaho first-year men, and a sturdy defense aided them in registering their fourth win of the season against five defeats. The Idaho defense was almost airtight—so tight, in fact, that the State did not score a point until midway in the first period, that a free shot conversion. Cougar frosh had to be content with shooting long howitzers over the heads of the Pricemen from near mid-court.

Idaho led the Cougars at half time by a score of 16-13. A sudden scoring spurt by the W.S.C. frosh just before the half brought them within striking range of Idaho. Mike Trbovich, Vandal forward, led the scoring for both teams with nine points. He was closely followed by Gebert, Cougar frosh, who scored

eight points to lead his team.

Teams Meet Again

Practice this week will be devoted to developing further technique on both offense and defense. Friday the two teams will meet again here; Saturday they will play in Pullman.

Iron man of the team so far this season is Kenny Lynk, who has not had a man substituted for him this year. Coming in for plenty of comment from Coach Price is "Stilts" Nelson, who is gradually developing into a scoring threat.

University of Idaho swimmers churned out a 39-29 victory over a hard-working team from the University of Montana last Saturday in the first winter meet between the colleges.

High point man with 15 points and mainstay of the Idaho team was Dick Slade, who swam to first place in the 100-, 220-, and 440-yard dashes. In the 100-yard sprint, Slade was clocked in 61.3 seconds, 1 of a second under the pool record.

Twogood Quells Rumors About U.C.L.A. Job

"No, I have not received any offers from U.C.L.A." With that terse comment, the Vandal basketball and baseball coach, Forrest Twogood, yesterday quelled rumors circulating in Spokane papers to the effect that he might succeed "Caddy" Works, resigned mentor for the Bruin college.

"I feel that there is more work to be done here," the Idaho coach continued, "and so far, I am satisfied. Naturally, money would be an important factor in determining the acceptance of an offer any coach might get. I am satisfied, however, at Idaho."

Twogood came to Idaho three years ago, last year coached the Vandals to a tie for third place in the conference race.
