Recently, Mr. Nye came out with a scathing attack upon the sale of planes, to France and Englarid. Not onfy was
Mr. Nye concerned over what he thought was the divulging :of military secrets to foreign nations, but he was equally
dutspoken in denouncing the partiality of the administradutspoken in denouncing the partiality of the administra-
tion in selling planes only to France and England. tion in selling planes only to France and England.
The honorable senator shudders when he thinks of the United States arming the democracies at the expense of
the dictators. He, perhaps, feels that the rulers of Italy and the dictators. He, perhaps, feels that the rulcrs of Italy and
Germany would be Fighly offended at this apparent disapproval of their policies and might res ort to war.
Mr. Nye may still be laboring under the delusion that we ment of about a billion and a half dollars made in the form of loans to facilitate the purchase of war supplies in this
country by the Allies. These loans were well secured and eventually paid back. Certainly, he caunot be naive enough and England are paying cash for thbir purchases-some
thing which Herr Hitler and Signor Aussolini are reluctan

tion in a war with France and England. Nor could one hold
that Mr. Nye would sit idly by on the sidelines and yawn in order to maintain his objectivity. The senator 1 I from
