As yet, opponents for Sam Zingale, Vandal 145-pounder, and Ted Kara, featherweight, are the only two named. Zingale has been rematched with Gordon Woodhouse, Canadian welterweight champion. The two fought four rounds to a draw in January.

Bird Study Shows Habits of Fowl

Brush and upland game birds are as inseparable in the open farm fields of Latah county as the ham and eggs which the typical sportsman prepares for himself before venturing out at dawn with dog and gun in the hunting season.

Chinese pheasants and Hungarian partridges make use of brushy draws and fence rows as communication lines and protective cover against their natural enemies. This is strikingly shown in the report of the second annual field survey conducted in the Moscow area last fall by school of forestry game management students under direction of Dr. A. B. Hatch.

Purpose of the survey was to determine bird preferences for different cover types and to learn how abundance fluctuates over a period of years. Supplementary census cards were returned by 140 local sportsmen on results of one-day trips. Hungarian partridges were considerably more numerous last fall than they were the season before. The 1937 census gave 23.4 miles as the distance per bird brought down, in comparison to 5.6 in 1938. Chinese pheasants likewise were either more numerous or easier to find. Last November local hunters tramped 2.35 miles for each Chink they brought home, as against 4.7 miles in 1937.

Swimmers Offer Prize For Carnival Theme

Last year, Kramer began his pro ball career with Sloom Springs, Ark., of the Arkansas-Missouri league, a class "C" league. After hitting .349 for the first half of the year, he was transferred to a class "B" team, Mayfield, Ky., of the Klamy league. He finished the season there with a .345 hitting average.

Uberuaga was too strong for his middleweight opponent, Solinsky's aggressiveness won him a very close decision in the 175-pound division.
