

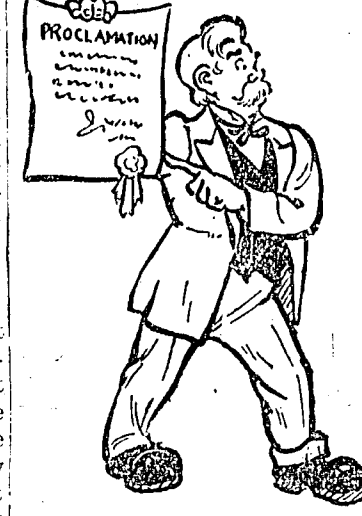
## Daisy Maes To Race For Men, Prizes

## Prof. Smith Recommends Formation Of University Theatre Group

Professor Smith was that the university cooperate with radio station KWSC at Pullman. Professor Smith criticized the university for "the poor housing facilities for the fine arts department, especially the music department."

In his auditorium speech, Professor Smith lectured on the relation of the creative artist to the public and the state. In a democracy, he said, the artist must look to the whole people for his support. A democracy can best give its support by safeguarding, through law and public opinion, the right of the creative artist to his intellectual and artistic property, and the returns for its use or performance by others. At the luncheon, the professor discussed "Broadway Tackles Politics." This was a running sketch of the recent topical reviews and musical comedies. "Of Thee I Sing" and "I'd Rather Be Right." "Pins and Needles" and others. Not partisan politics, but fun, he said, constituted the Broadway "causes."

"The War Machine," Fortune, November, second of a series dealing with the German government; "The End of Armistice," and "Communications: The Fourth Front," Fortune, November, the beginning of a new series. The latter article describes cables, radio, and telegraph control in Germany. "Vigil at the Microphone," by John Gunther and Patrick Maitland, The Living Age, October, divided into section. Two radio commentators, situated at vantage points, give their impressions of the crisis that turned to war.

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## Experiment In Education

An educational plan which is attracting considerable attention has recently been instituted at Oglethorpe university. Under the plan 12 outstanding high school graduates, including Miles Carlson, Rigby, Idaho, will attend Oglethorpe university for six years, taking an average of 25 to 30 hours of class work a week. At the end of the six years the boys will have studied every course given at the university, and, theoretically, will possess the knowledge of every member of the faculty.

Starting with a chronological survey of all education since the ancient Egyptians and Greeks, the 12 scholars will finish with the most modern and up-to-date information on every subject taught at Oglethorpe. That will entitle them to every degree granted by the university. Just imagine it! Instead of being brilliant mathematicians, chemists, writers, or engineers upon their graduation, these 12 students will be potential Einsteins, Kreislers, Edisons, and Frankfurters all rolled into one. They'll know music, art, philosophy, economics, literature, business, politics—everything!

Here's an experiment well worth following. Always before we've taught specialization. We've insisted that each man and woman enter a certain field and become an authority in it, leaving other fields alone.

But perhaps we were wrong. Perhaps intensive training can make each person a specialist in several, or all, fields. If the experiment succeeds, it'll mean a shift in educational methods. The college student of tomorrow may have the education and knowledge of the entire world crammed, poured, and pounded into him until he is a veritable walking encyclopedia.

## Amendments

Proposed amendment to the by-laws of the constitution of the Associated Students of the University of Idaho: Be it resolved that: Section 2, Article 1 of the by-laws of the constitution of the Associated Students of the University of Idaho be amended to include skiing as a minor sport and to read: Section 2 Minor Sports. Minor sports at the University of Idaho, are hereby designated as tennis, wrestling, cross country, swimming, golf, fencing, boxing, and skiing.

To Include Skiing  
Be it resolved that: Clause 2, Section 2, Article 1 of the by-laws of the constitution of the Associated Students of the University of Idaho be amended to include: (8) Skiing. To any member who shall have won first place or six points in a dual conference meet, or its equivalent, or who shall have placed 1-2-3 in a triangular or conference meet shall be awarded a minor sports "I". To become effective for school year 1940-41.

Proposed amendment for the incorporation of the following election rules in Article 7, Section 3:

1. Ballots shall be numbered consecutively.  
2. Ballots to be approved, printed, checked, and locked up under supervision of election board chairman and vice chairman, but no political party shall be denied a representative upon presenting a petition, requesting such representative, from the executive board. The chairman and vice chairman shall be provided from different parties.  
3. Number of ballots shall be certified at printing office and checked at polls before voting begins. Numbers shall be checked after election; numbers of ballots voted checked and these totals checked against each other. Written checks must be kept by election board and vice chairman, to be presented to the executive board with report of procedure and election returns.

4. Ballot boxes shall be unlocked in the presence of the election board and locked again in their presence.  
5. Ballot box when filled shall be sealed and left at all times in the custody of the election board unless other arrangements satisfactory to all members of the board be made.

6. When polls are closed, counting shall begin and shall not stop until finished, unless otherwise specifically provided for by the executive board by a two-thirds vote, in a meeting just prior to election day.

7. Ballot boxes must be full, to the satisfaction of every member of the election board at particular poll.

8. Any election board member has a right to raise objection to election procedure, and such objection must be recorded on procedure record that is to be turned in to the executive board. (Record kept in duplicate by chairman and vice chairman.)

9. All ballots, both used and unused, and the report of the chairman and vice chairman shall be kept for one year, and upon request shall be presented for inspection to any member of the ASU.

10. Upon request of party representatives, two stamps for official stamping must be used, one stamp to be provided by each party and presented to the election board at opening of the polls.

Any dispute arising in the election board meetings over the interpretation of the rules or over election procedure shall be immediately referred to the executive board. Executive board must agree by not less than a two-thirds majority vote.

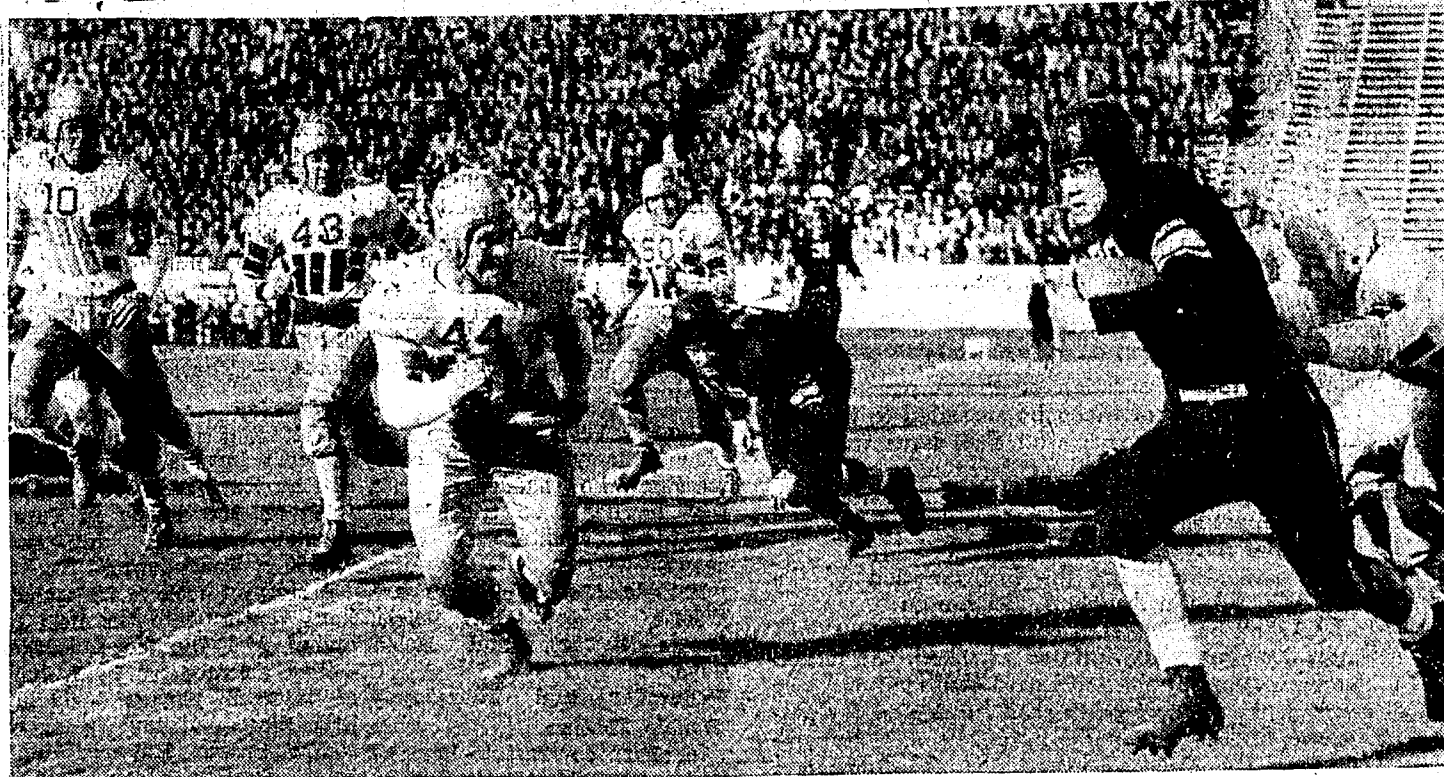
**Vandals Drop Tilt**

Idaho's varsity cross country team took its first step toward its fifth straight undefeated season Saturday morning when it defeated Montana by a perfect score of 15 to 42. Irving Alterwein, a substitute from last year's powerful team, was No. 1 man for the day. He took the lead on the first lap, was never headed.

In spite of the team's fine showing, Freshman Vic Dyrgeall stole the day's show. Unable to compete officially because a freshman, Dyrgeall ran in a special race with Phil Leibowitz, Dick Slade, and Lemarr Chapman. These four started out two minutes behind the pack in a trial run, but by the end of the first lap, Dyrgeall had caught the leaders and was going away.

He then continued his hot pace over the second lap and finished the difficult 4.4 mile course a quarter of a mile ahead of the nearest competition. His time was announced as 24 minutes 1.1 seconds, far under the competitive record of 24:58 set by Washington State's Dixon Garner last year.
